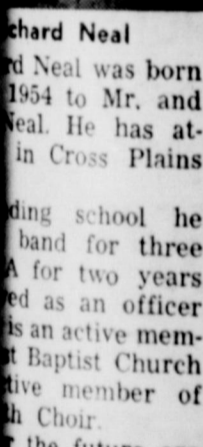

After graduation he plans to live with Mr. and Mrs. Gene Thornhill of Dallas. He plans to work with TXI in that city. He has no plans for college.

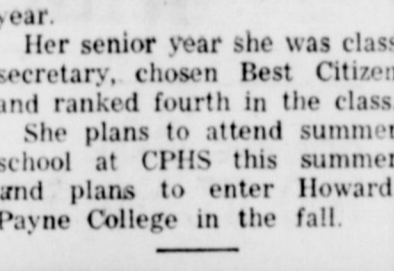


Susan Elizabeth Holland

Oliver plans to enroll at Texas State Technical Institute at Waco. There he will study Automotive Technology.

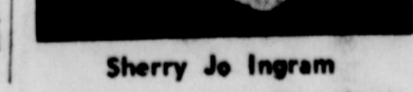


Sarah Charlotte Weiser

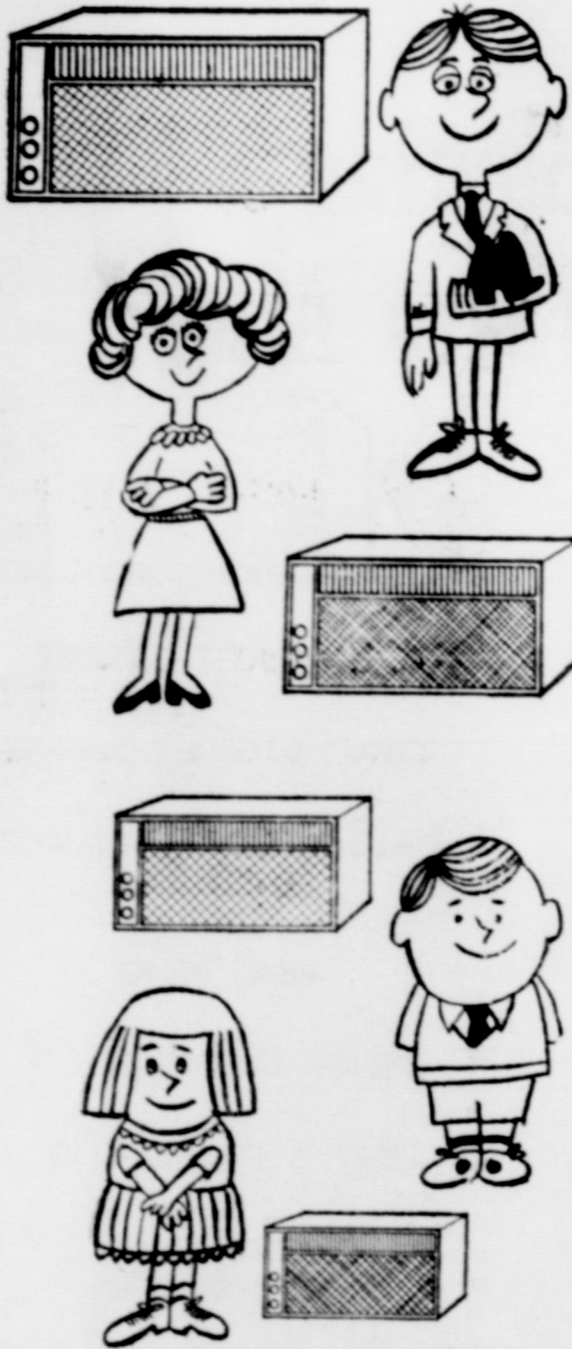
