Little League District Tournament Underway

Little League all-stars from four area cities are participating in the District 28 playoff tournament in Cross Plains this week.

Action was scheduled to begin Tuesday night as Baird and Breckenridge were to have battled. The Callahan County all-stars defeated Albany to gain the tourney berth, and Breckenridge decided Weatherford in an area playoff contest.

Wednesday at 8 p.m. Clyde elite and Coleman all-stars are to tangle. Clyde defeated Cross Plains for the tourney spot, and Coleman triumphed over Cisco in the area playoff game.

A double-header is on tap for Thursday night. Starting at 6 p.m. there will be a consolation game between the two losing teams in the games on Tuesday and Wednesday nights. At 8 p.m. the District 28 cham-

pionship will be decided as winners of the first two nights action square off.

All Little League fans are invited to view the action at the Little League Park in the Edgewood addition. It is the first time Cross Plains has been chosen host city for the district meet.

Harold Garrett, local Little League president, will serve as the tournament director.

Clyde Little League Stars Bop Local Unit

Clyde Little League All-Stars took a lead in the first inning Thursday of last week and emerged a 15-6 victor over visiting Cross Plains All-Stars.

The initial frame spelled what was to come as the first three Clyde batters scored on four hits.

Cross Plains countered as Joe Hale hit a 1-0 pitch to left field for a double. He scored on hits by Brad Waggoner, Steve Baugh and Glenn Wooten.

Clyde again pushed a trio of runs across in the top of the second, while Nikki Wilson and John Schaefer tallied for the local unit.

Greg Pancake, who went the route on the mound for Cross Plains, struck out the side in the third, and Cross Plains cut the deficit to 6-5 with a pair of runs. Glenn Nickerson and Wilson tallied on safeties by Jerry Lunceford, Hale and Waggoner.

Clyde rallied for a pair of runs in the fourth on S. Holcomb's homer. Again the local unit cut the margin, 8-6, as Pancake scored after walking following hits by Wilson and Schaefer.

Clyde iced the win with three runs in the fifth and four more

in the sixth. Cross Plains threatened in each frame but could not choss home pate.

Clyde collected 20 hits, and locals got 15. Hale and Wilson were leading local batters, each hitting safely three times. Baugh, Lunceford and Schaefer each got a pair of hits.

Pancake, in absorbing the loss fanned a dozen Clyde batters.

Coach Jack Strickland said he was well pleased with the effort given by the local stars.

Members of the all-stars are asked to bring uniforms to Strickland or Edwin Schaefer during the district tournament and pick up birth certificates as uniforms are turned in.

Average Callahan County Family Income \$6,567

Average family income was \$6,567 in Callahan County, in 1969, compared with \$8,490 for the State, according to a report on the 1970 census by Bureau of the Census, U. S. Department of Commerce. Per Capita income for the county amounted to \$2,264, the report shows.

The 1970 census counted 8,205 residents in the county; 0.2 percent were foreign born and 2.0 percent natives born with one or both parents of foreign birth.

Among the county's 7,726 inhabitants age 5 and over in 1970, 1,480 were living in a different county within the State in 1965, and 267 in a different State.

In the population age 16 and over, 68.9 percent of the men and 32.7 percent of the women were in the labor force. Among the employed, 34.5 percent

were holding white collar jobs, and 17.7 percent were government workers.

About 37.1 percent of the married women with husband present were in the labor force, and 37.7 percent of these wives had children under six.

There were 1,973 persons 3 to 34 years old enrolled in school. In the 25-and-older population, 34.3 percent of the men and 38.5 percent of the women were high school graduates.

Showers Dump 2.27 Inches Of Rain Here

Heavy, brief showers three days last week netted Cross Plains 2.27 inches of rain, according to the official weather gauge maintained here by F. C. Newton.

Tuesday afternoon of last week 1.23 inches were measured in two showers, and late Wednesday afternoon another 51 of an inch was received. Saturday evening another 53 of an inch was measured.

The rains were of a very scattered variety and some sections received heavy downpours while others remained dry.

Through Tuesday noon 3.15 inches have been measured in the city during July. Aggregate rainfall for Cross Plains through noon Tuesday totals 11.65 inches, according to records kept by Newton.

Utility gas was used to cook the meals in 1,400 households, electricity in another 707, and bottled, tank, or LP gas in yet another 870.

There were 3,195 housing units with complete kitchen facilities and 3,223 with complete bathrooms, both for the exclusive use of the households. The number of bedrooms in all housing units ranged from none (in 19 units) and one (in 317 units) to four or more in 194 units.

Owners occupied 2,417 units, renters 561 units, and a total of 472 units were vacant year round with 52 for sale and 67 for rent.

New Fishing Laws Now In Effect

As a result of recent action by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission, several laws concerning sportsmen go into effect July 22 in all regulatory counties in which commission action is subject to approval by the commissioners court.

The daily bag limit on largemouth, smallmouth and spotted black bass was changed to 10 in the aggregate with a possession limit of 20 in the aggregate. The fish must be at least 10 inches long. The possession limit does not include fish processed and stored at the fisherman's permanent residence.

The 11-inch minimum length for catfish was removed.

All trotlines that remain in public fresh water must be redated at the expiration of each 90-day period and Texas Parks and Wildlife Department enforcement personnel are authorized to remove expired and undated trotlines.

"Spear" was deleted from the section on legal methods for taking fish, and "spear gun and spear, bow and arrow," was substituted.



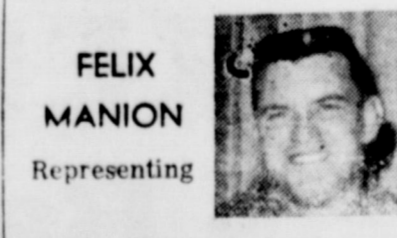

Peanut Certifying Last Day Is Aug. 1

August 1, is the final date for farm operators to certify the acreage planted to peanuts in 1972 according to J. C. Earp executive director of the ASCS office in Baird. Accuracy in certifying peanut acreage is very important. Farms on which the peanut acreage is found to be in excess of the allotment will be subject to marketing quota penalty.

The preliminary rate of penalty is 10.5 cents per pound and is subject to later adjustment. In addition, where the peanut acreage exceeds the allotment by more than the tolerance, none of the peanuts produced on the farm are eligible for price support.

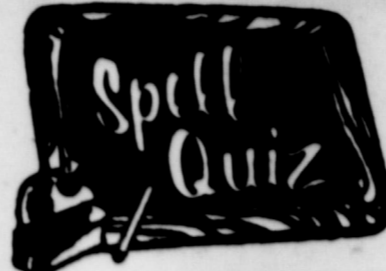
