Schools Will Open Doors Monday For New Term

School will open in Cross Plains Monday with a full day's schedule planned for most students.

An estimated 450 students are expected for the initial day's classes. The staff for the 1972-73 school year will consist of 16 classroom teachers, two principals, two vocational teachers, superintendent and several cooperative personnel.

Classes will begin each week day at 8:25 a.m. and will be dismissed at 3:38 p.m.

Many local high school students will be involved in vocational training courses at Cisco Junior College, and they will leave the local campus at 7:15 a.m., returning at noon. Secondary principal Scot H. Edgington pointed out that the vocational students will not meet classes on Monday, and those persons need not report to classes on opening day until noon. Vocational classes will begin Tuesday, August 22.

Elementary school: Betty Browning, kindergarten; Mattie Dixon, first grade; Ann Higginbottom, second grade; Peggy Golson, fifth grade; and Jan Garrett, sixth grade.

and reading; James Birkhimer, social studies and assistant coach; Arthur Boyle, elementary principal, high school girls basketball coach and math; Edgington, secondary principal and chemistry; O. B. Edmondson, vocational agriculture; Charlene Fleming, math; Ford, superintendent and English; Don Jobe, social studies; Rolan Jones, science; Don Lee, high school head coach, social studies and driver education; Mack McConal, junior high school head coach and science; Betty Odom, vocational homemaking; Carroll Rhodes, band and music director; Dora Smith, English and business; Francis Tyson, language arts and English.

Title I personnel include Miss Browning, coordinator; Pat Lee, half-time teacher; Wesley Ingram, aide, and Billie Frances Clausen, aide.

coordinator, and Pat Lee, half-time special services teacher.

Persons charged with maintenance are Junior Baugh and Sam Lane, custodians, and O. B. Switzer, bus mechanic.

Operating the lunchroom, which will serve a meal opening day, are Betty Lewis, manager, and cooks Frances Ingram, Jewel Purvis and Betty Weiss.

Transportation corps is composed of the following: Frank Robertson, Turkey Creek-Cottonwood route; Audrey Purvis, Burkett; O. B. Switzer, Burnt Branch-Dressy; Junior Baugh, Caddo Peak; Oral Joy, Cross Cut; J. T. Showers Shorten Old Settlers Reunion Here

Light showers shortened the Callahan County Pioneer Reunion in Cross Plains last Saturday.

It marked the second consecutive year that rain had interfered with the annual gathering of old settlers. Last year excessive rains cancelled the meeting before it got started.

Last Saturday the grounds at the City Park were damp, but festivities got underway on schedule as 350 Callahan pioneers registered beginning at 9:30 a.m. The formal program was halted at noon as light rain showers chased away most of the old settlers shortly before the break for a basket lunch at noontime. An estimated 100 to 150 more pioneers were on the grounds in the morning but did not register.

Those who did brave the unsettled weather were reported to have spent the afternoon and evening visiting and enjoying dancing and music.

It was noted that officers were not nominated for the ensuing year, that portion of business was slated for the afternoon. Recognition of oldest persons was not held. That also was to be a part of the afternoon program.

A spokesman for the association's officers said that new officers will be elected at a later date.

Oldtimers of the county began the short reunion with group singing led by Mrs. V. E. Hill and Leroy Butler of Abilene. W. R. Thompson of this city gave the invocation, and James Paul Shanks of Baird welcomed the old settlers. Response was given by A. E. Dyer, Jr., county judge. John Purvis of Cottonwood led a silent tribute to deceased pioneers. Douglas Fry introduced the speaker, Homer Taylor of Sweetwater who interestingly traced the development of Callahan County through the years with emphasis on early days.

The rains began while Taylor was speaking, and officials of the annual meeting decided that adjournment was in order.

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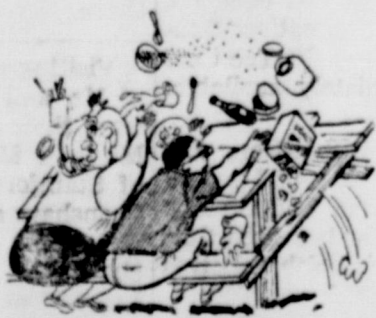

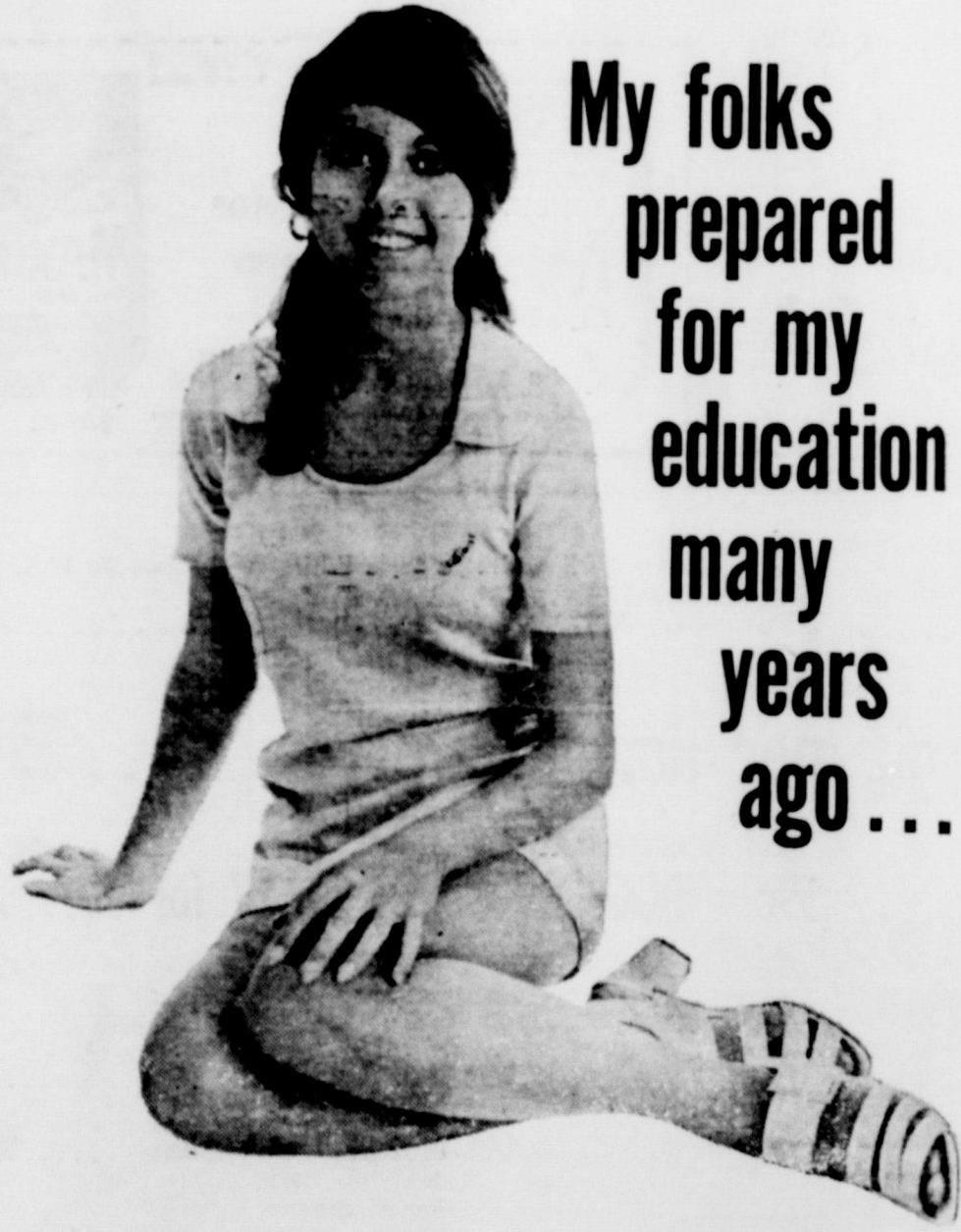

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER 5 ON THE BALLOT OF 1972
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III, Section 24, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 24. Representatives shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not exceeding Eight Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400). Senators shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not exceeding Eight Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400). All Members of the Legislature, including the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives, also shall receive from the Public Treasury a per diem of not exceeding Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first one hundred and twenty (120) days only of each Regular Session and for thirty (30) days of each Special Session of the Legislature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days. This amendment shall be self-enacting and appropriations heretofore made in the general appropriations bill for the biennium ending August 31, 1973, for the salaries of the Members of the Senate and House of Rep-

resentatives shall not be invalid because of the anticipatory nature of the legislation.

"In addition to the per diem the Members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$2.50) for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller to each county seat now or hereafter to be established; no Member to be entitled to mileage for any extra Session that may be called within one (1) day after the adjournment of the Regular or Called Session."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to provide annual salaries of \$8,400 for members of the Senate and House of Representatives."

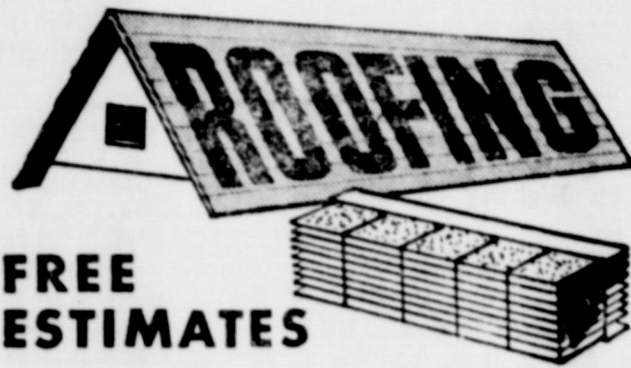
Section 1. That Section 2, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 2. (a) All occupation taxes shall be equal and uniform upon the same class of subjects within the limits of the authority levying the tax; but the legislature may, by general laws, exempt from taxation public property used for public purposes; actual places of religious worship, also any property owned by a church or by a strictly religious society for the exclusive use as a dwelling place for the ministry of such church or religious society, and which yields no revenue whatever to such church or religious society; provided that such exemption shall not extend to more property than is reasonably necessary for a dwelling place and in no event more than one acre of land; places of burial not held for private or corporate profit; all buildings used exclusively and owned by persons or associations of persons for school purposes and the necessary furniture of all schools and property used exclusively and reasonably necessary in conducting any association engaged in promoting the religious, educational and physical development of boys, girls, young men or young women operating under a State or National organization of like character; also the endowment funds of such institutions of learning and religion not used with a view to profit; and when the same are invested in bonds or mortgages, or in land or other property which has been and shall hereafter be bought in by such institutions under foreclosure sales made to satisfy or protect such bonds or mortgages, that such exemption of such land and property shall continue only for two years after the purchase of the same at such sale by such institutions and no longer; and institutions of purely public charity; and all laws exempting property from taxation other than the property mentioned in this Section shall be null and void."

(b) The Legislature may, by general law, exempt property owned by a disabled veteran or by the surviving spouse and surviving minor children of a disabled veteran. A disabled veteran is a veteran of the

armed services of the States who is classified as disabled by the Veterans Administration or by a medical service in which he served as a disabled veteran who is certified as disabled by the Veterans Administration. A disabled veteran has a disability rating of more than 10 percent but not more than 30 percent may be granted exemption from taxation of property valued at \$1,500. A veteran having a disability rating of more than 30 percent but not more than 50 percent may be granted exemption from taxation of property valued at \$2,000. A veteran having a disability rating of more than 50 percent but not more than 70 percent, or a veteran having a disability rating of 70 percent or a veteran who is a disabled veteran who consists of the loss of use of one or more limbs or paraplegia, may be granted exemption from taxation of property valued at \$3,000. The spouse and children of any member of the United States Armed Forces who loses his life while in active duty shall be granted exemption from taxation of property valued at \$2,500. A deceased veteran's surviving spouse and children may be granted exemption which is equal to that to which the decedent was entitled at the time he died. Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment allowing tax exemptions to disabled veterans, their surviving spouses and surviving minor children of disabled veterans." The Legislature may, by general law, exempt property owned by a disabled veteran or by the surviving spouse and surviving minor children of a disabled veteran. A disabled veteran is a veteran of the

The Rev. E. V. Brooks, pastor of the First Baptist Church here, officiated, assisted by Rev. Andy Foster.

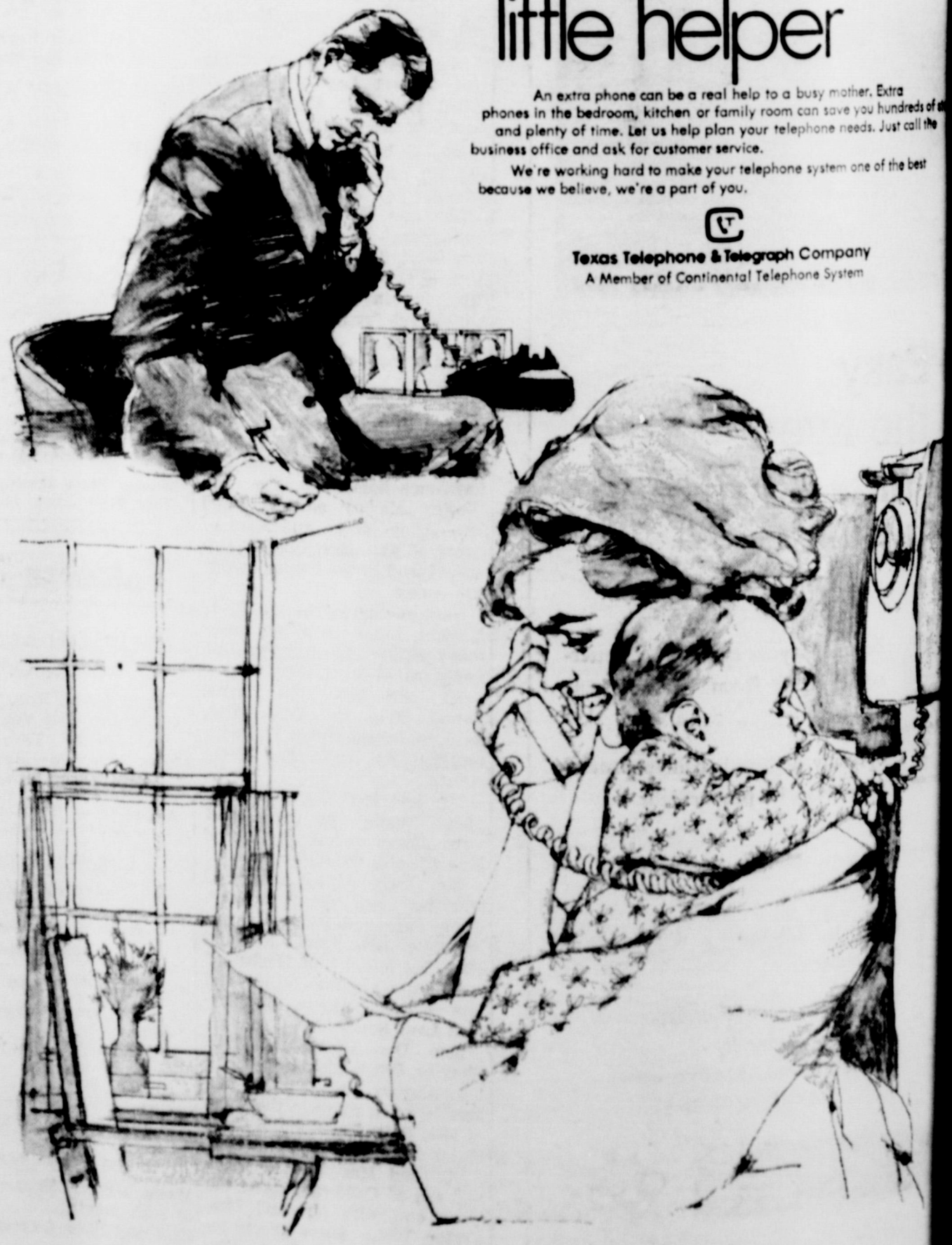
He was born Oct. 7, 1895, in Talking Rock, Ga. A resident of Cross Plains the past 12 years, he formerly lived at Weatherford.

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PUBLIC NOTICE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 6 of Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be and the same is hereby, amended so as to read as follows: Section 6. On the effective date of this Amendment, the Lamar County Hospital District is abolished. The Commissioners Court of Lamar County may provide for the transfer or for the disposition of the assets of the Lamar County Hospital District.

PUBLIC NOTICE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 2. That Section 40, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: Section 40. No person shall hold or exercise, at the same time, more than one Civil Office of emolument, except that of Director of a Soil and Water Conservation District, Justice of Peace, County Commissioner, Notary Public and Postmaster, Officer of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States and enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States, and retired officers of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, from holding in conjunction with such office any other office or position of honor, trust or profit, under this State or the United States, or from voting at any Election, General, Special or Primary, in this State when otherwise qualified.

That Article IV, Section 17 of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows: Section 17. If, during the vacancy in the office of Governor, the Lieutenant Governor should die, resign, refuse to serve, or be removed from office, or be unable to serve, or if he shall be impeached or absent from the State, the President of the Senate, for the time being, shall, in like manner, administer the Government until he shall be succeeded by a Governor or Lieutenant Governor. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 7, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to provide a salary of \$22,500 for the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives."

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER 14 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 57) General Election November 7, 1972. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article VII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a Section 6b, to read as follows: Section 6b.
