## Sales Tax Goes Effect On Sunday

Merchants will receive an extra one percent tax on goods and services by the State of Texas, Oct. 1.

The five per cent tax in Cross Plains was approved by voters by a three to two margin on June 20. In the proposed amendment, persons buying in Cross Plains on Sunday, pay five percent instead of the one percent tax.

City officials estimate that a total of between \$10,000 and \$12,000 per year will be realized from the added one cent.

City council members did not have a particular project in mind when the election was called, but noted that current sewer and dump facilities are expected to be ruled inadequate soon, and therefore large expenditures for replacing those facilities will be called for.

It was emphasized by local city officials that only the items and goods now taxed by the state will be included in the one cent extra which will be collected beginning Sunday.

Local merchants will begin reporting the extra tax on quarterly return made to the state in January of next year.

It was noted that the first penny of the tax will now be collected on sales of 10 cents through 29 cents. Two cents will be collected on sales of 30 through 49 cents. Three cents will be paid of purchases of taxable goods of 50 through 69 cents. Sales of 70 through 89 cents will call for a four cent tax, and five cents will be collected on sales of 90 cents through \$1.09. The same pattern will apply on larger sales.

## United Fund Budget Set At \$3,300 For 1972-73

A total of \$3,300 will be sought in a drive by the United Fund in Cross Plains and the surrounding area this year.

The amount needed this year is slightly more than which was asked in 1970, the last time a door to door United Fund canvass was held in the Cross Plains area. Free-will donations were asked last year.

The budget for the 1972-73 year was established after officers and board of directors of the United Fund here met in Directors' Room of the Citizens State Bank last Thursday.

It is \$29.50 more than was budgeted for the 1971-72 year. That amount is classified as unallocated, according to a report of planned disbursements released by the local UF officials and directors.

**Area Canvass**

A canvass of Cross Plains and the surrounding communities for funds is planned this year. Mrs. J. Peyton Smith was appointed chairman of the campaign, and additional plans will be announced next week.

It was pointed out by Jimmie Lee Payne, United Fund president, that plans will be made by Mrs. Smith concerning the drive, but it is expected that a similar method which has been used here in the past will be adopted. That was a house to house canvass of the city and surrounding communities by volunteer workers.

Date of the drive and workers will also be announced next week, according to the UF president.

**Budgeted Charities**

Purpose of the United Fund is to take care of all charities in Cross Plains at one time. Ten organizations and institutions are to share in the 1972-73 local United Fund monies

if the budgeted funds are obtained.

They were listed as follows: West Texas Rehabilitation Center \$700, Medical Research Foundation \$50, M. D. Anderson Hospital Tumor Institute \$500, American Red Cross \$175, Salvation Army \$175, Texas Mental Health \$100, local and transient relief \$500, Christmas cheer program \$300, Girl Scouts, local, \$124, Girl Scouts, council, \$346.50, and unallocated funds \$329.50.

It was pointed out that in order to reach the new higher budget, almost 100 per cent cooperation will have to be attained. Payne urged that everyone at least match and wherever possible surpass the amount of the gifts made during the last campaign.

## Annual Buff-Wildcat Grid Clash Set Here Friday

The annual duel between football teams of Cross Plains High School and Rising Star High School will unfold for the 40th time in Buffalo Stadium Friday beginning at 8 p.m.

As in the past several years, the contest is expected to be a close, hard fought battle. Last year the Buffaloes won 28-16, for the first time since 1968 when the Herd took a 6-0 decision in between. In 1969 and 1970, the Wildcats claimed 8-6 and 16-8 verdicts.

Cross Plains takes the best overall season record in several years into the fracas Friday. The Thundering Herd has emerged triumphant twice in three outings. Rising Star has yet to win in two attempts.

The two squads have met one mutual opponent, Wylie, and both were humbled by the Bulldogs. Rising Star fell 46-7 in the season opener while Cross Plains bowed 27-0 in the young season's second clash.

Rising Star is the third member of District 6-B that the Herd has met this year. Both other 6-B foes fell to the Blons, Blanket 35-0 and Gorman 18-0, but both were rated to finish behind the Wildcats in conference play. Rising Star was rated fourth in the eight-team league, right ahead of Gorman and Blanket.

Never count Coach Frank Gray and his Wildcats out. The former local coach, who has been at Rising Star for 10 years, had 11 lettermen back from a 2-8 squad last year.

Nucleus of the Wildcat backfield is formed by returning monogram winners Steve Bibb, 180 pound quarterback; Kim Joyce, 155 pound wingback; Richie Schaefer, 172 pound tailback; Alvin Spencer, 160 pound fullback, and J. B. Jarvis, 170 pound halfback.

Experience is also available in most line positions. Back are such stalwarts as Andy Robinson, 170 pound tackle; Jim Carpenter, 160 center; Dale Wolf, 195 tackle; Johnny Turner, 192, and Johnny Cook, 170, both ends, and Steve Turner, 200 pound tackle.

## THINK ABOUT THIS

(An Editorial)

For years this publication has stressed "Trade at Home". This is rightly needed and is a mainstay for a healthy community.

Tracing of a dollar spent in town has shown how one businessman, spending his dollar at another local establishment and on down the line, results in that dollar remaining in the local economy.

But let it not be thought that any community can exist for long without growth, and growth can come only from a fresh, new supply of dollars brought to the area by outside interests. It is true that a township can maintain a somewhat normal and routine existence without outside money, but the inevitable end is loss and a slow death. Look around and pay heed to towns within minutes reach which, once being thriving trade centers are now desolate and in near "ghost-like" condition.

Liken Cross Plains to a well-bottomed stock tank, which holds and holds its water, but lacks effective watershed to enlarge or get it by in a time of extreme drought. The tank, although slowly, begins eventually to dry-up and during this slow evaporation, becomes stagnant and lifeless.

The opposite, a pond with a good supply of "run-off", catching water from miles around, lives and grows in depth and surface area.

What keeps this community alive is without doubt Highway 36, which itself brings in what foreign currency exists. It is the local economy's savior and backbone of more than 50 per cent of commercial enterprises. We are thankful, as we should be in having such a friend, but we should be knowledgeable of the fact that routes of highways change and if this happens it would knock a large and one of the last remaining blocks from under local economy.

Look at neighboring cities of Baird, Cisco, Eastland and Ranger, which once had major traffic routes through the hearts of their business districts. Now they are lacking this aid, and those that weren't prepared with progressive self-help programs have felt the impact dearly. Any of those cities, however, was not nearly as dependent on highways as Cross Plains, two of which are county seats and one a near suburb of growing Abilene.

In the fable, the ant worked feverishly all summer and fall to supply himself for the soon to come hard winter, but the smug, unthinking grasshopper basked in his nice "present" world, not thinking of tomorrow and actually thinking the busy little ant a fool. It would be impossible to inquire of that grasshopper his present thoughts on the subject, for he didn't make it through the winter.

Realization of need for a more progressive attitude is a necessity. Until local citizens can unite in efforts to plan, build and prepare, there is little hope for more than the township holding its own. If there are those who can and will see the need, unite and work together, stand up and face the task of building and growing, then the problem, in this case which is actually not as much progress as it is survival, can be at least partially solved.

Evangelist for the revival will be the Rev. J. B. Chick,

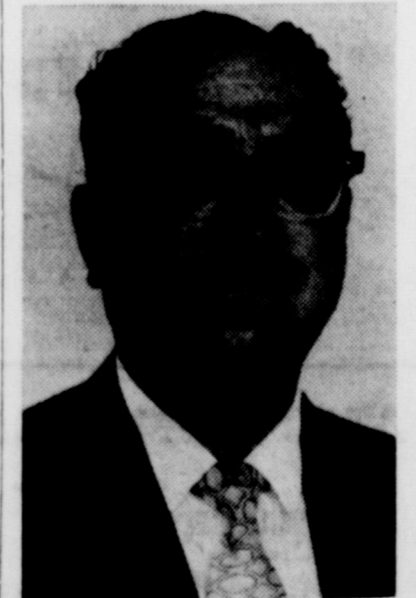
pastor of the First Baptist Church in Bangs.

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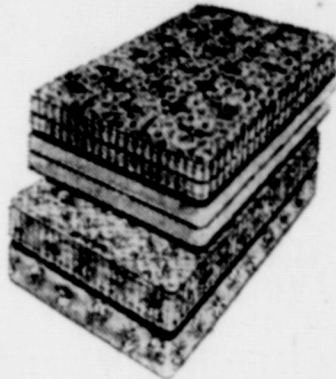

## Amendment Analyses Begins

Editors Note: During the next six weeks the Review will publish analyses of the 14 proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution each week, in the order in which they will appear on the official ballot to be voted on Nov. 7. These brief analyses are intended to be unbiased.

You will vote FOR or AGAINST:

Amendment No. 1, amending Article III, Section 24, of the Texas Constitution to provide annual salaries of \$8,400 for members of the senate and the

house of representatives. This would increase the annual salary of members of the Texas Legislature from \$4,800 to \$8,400. No changes would be made in mileage or per diem allowances.

Proponents say the legislator can no longer be considered a part-time official, and that time spent on official state duties leaves legislators little time to devote to private business and the present annual salary is inadequate to meet present-day living costs.

They contend that raising the

salaries of legislators to a more realistic level would provide a greater incentive for public service, and would attract more qualified persons to become candidates for legislative seats.

They say that under present salary provided, a legislator is forced to engage in outside employment, a business or profession in order to have sufficient income to support himself and his family, and that such employment could create a conflict of interest which could impair his independence of action as a lawmaker.

Opponents to this amendment contend that substantial pay increases for legislators would further increase costs of state government at a time when state finances are already overburdened.

They also point out that under the constitution the legislature is required to meet in regular session not to exceed 140 days every two years, thus the job of legislator is not full-time and members should not be paid a full-time salary.

Opponents also contend that because of high campaign costs, a potential legislative candidate without substantial financial resources would still be discouraged from seeking office even if the salary proposal was adopted.

Amendment No. 2 would amend Article IX, Section 6 and would abolish the Lamar County Hospital District and authorize the commissioners court of Lamar County to provide for the transfer or for the disposition of the assets of the Lamar County Hospital District.

Because of the purely local character of this proposed amendment arguments for or against will be omitted.

Since the district is no longer operational and the county would like to dispose of the assets and facilities of the district, the amendment is offered simply to make this possible.

## Man Injured In Car, School Bus Mishap

Blake Forehand, 86, of Rising Star but who had been residing with the Glenn Williams family in Cross Plains, was reported to be seriously injured when in collision with a Cross Plains school bus on Highway 36 east about 7:30 a.m. Tuesday of last week.

Forehand's pickup was said to be a total loss, and about \$400 damage was done to the bus which was driven by Carroll Rhodes.

Only three children were on the bus when the mishap occurred and some were hurt. The accident occurred as Rhodes was stopped to pick up the Ray Rankin children who had not yet boarded.

It was pointed out that Forehand's vehicle struck the rear of the bus, and the sun apparently blinded the man and he could not see the flashing lights of the bus.

It was also noted that persons must stop vehicles when flashing lights on school buses denote the bus being stopped to load or unload passengers. Motorists may not proceed until the bus has begun moving.

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# Herd Claims Victory Over Gorman

A rich second quarter scoring spree brought Cross Plains Buffaloes their second win this season here last Friday night over Gorman Panthers 18-0.

The contest centered on ground rushing, and Bisons bested the "Goobar Town Eleven" by 100 yards. Fullback Rodney Renfro headed the local aggregation's total with an individual net of 160 yards.

Buffaloes got it all together in second quadrant action, scoring 18 points in three quick thrusts after first period play failed to produce points for either varsity.

The initial score came about from a drive beginning in the last minutes of the first quarter when Buffaloes received possession of the oval pigskin on their own 33 after forcing

Panthers to punt. Back Tony Winfrey fired the drive by scrambling 24 yards to the defenders' own 39, and Renfro blasted two final gains of 15 and 20 yards for the touchdown. Point after attempt failed, and the scoreboard read 6-0 with 11 minutes remaining in the first half.

Gorman again found little to boost their end of the score and punted deep to Renfro at the 10. He maneuvered to the Herd's 32, setting the onslaught of the second Buffalo tally. The 68-yard drive consisted of eight plays with Backs Randy Hunter, Roger Crawford, Rex Mayes, Winfrey and Renfro each contributing needed yardage. Score came on a first and 10 play from the 11 yard line seeing Winfrey fight through the middle and past the red-flagged goal line. Point after

again failed, and the Buffaloes had a 12-0 advantage with 4 minutes and 10 seconds still remaining in the second period.

On the following kickoff to Panther deep men, agile Buff Rex Mayes covered a loose fumble at the Gorman 24 setting the Buffaloes in the doorway for tally number three. After two unsuccessful attempts to riddle the Panther line, Crawford went to the air on a third down six situation and hit Jerry Fortune at the five setting up a first and goal. Winfrey again went over for the six points, and the night's scoring was at an end, neither team finding the complete combination for pay during the remainder of the contest.

With two minutes still remaining in the half Buffaloes threatened twice more only to be buffeted by misfortune. Following the last score, Safety Rick Kirkham intercepted a Panther aerial at the Bison 30 yard line, but a drive was not mounted, forcing a punt in the last minute and half. Two plays later, though, Buffalo defender Jerry Fortune stole a pass, and the Herd found themselves at the mid-field marker with seconds remaining in the first

half play. A pass interference call set the ball first and 10 on the visitor 25 yard line only to see the timekeeper force the teams to the locker room.

Second half action was sporadic, neither eleven being able to score. Panthers did, however, reach with in the six-yard marker on first series in the half only to turn the ball over on downs.

Late in fourth quarter play, Bisons mounted another threatening drive, marching 65 yards to within five yards of paydirt only to lose their final chance on downs.

Bisons Tutor Don Lee stated that errors and missed assignments would be concentrated on for preparation of next week's encounter. He acknowledged Winfrey, Donny Dillard, Terry Fortune, Lynn Koenig and Johnny Joy for exceptional defensive efforts.
