## Bufs Grab Top Spot In Little League Play

Defending champion Bufs have taken sole possession of first place in the young 1973 Cross Plains Little League race.

The top team took two victories last week end to go with the triumph recorded in opening play Saturday, May 12. Bufs actually grabbed the top rung on Friday by defeating the Cats 7-4, and insured themselves of first place for the week by trimming the Kilowatts 8-3 Saturday night.

Cats rebounded from Friday's loss to claim second place with a 6-4 win over the Beadels Saturday to run the record to 2-1 on the new season.

Beadels trimmed the Kilos 15-8 in Friday's opener to gain third place over the winless Kilowatts.

In opening play Friday Beadels tallied 12 runs in the first two innings en route to the 15-8 beating of the Kilos. The eventual losers rallied for three runs in the third and fifth with a pair sandwiched between in the fourth. Glynn Nickerson led Beadels hitters with two singles and a double, and teammate Keith Lawrence had three singles. Bill Read led Kilowatt batters with two triples and a single.

Bufs and Cats each scored one run in the second and three in the third frame in Friday's nightcap before the Bufs counted a single run in the fourth and two in the fifth.

for the 7-4 triumph. Greg Pancake hit safely three times for the Bufs, a single, double and triple. Jerry Lunceford had a single and triple for the Cats.

Bufs used early scoring in Saturday's first game to beat the Kilowatts 8-3. The winners scored two in the first and added five the third. Kilos rallied for a trio of scores in the home half of the fifth inning. Greg Pancake hurled hitless ball for four innings against the Kilowatts, and Jackie Strickland came on in the fifth frame. Strickland had a single and triple to pace Buff hitters. Only Bill Reed and Bill McCowen managed hits for the Kilos, both singles.

In the second contest Saturday Cats counted one run in the first frame and added three in the second before Beadels rallied for four runs in the third. Cats, however, tallied a pair of runs in the same frame for the 6-4 victory. Both were scoreless in the fourth inning. Cats collected just two hits, doubles by Tan Flippin and Robby Bailey, but scored five unearned runs. Beadels managed nine safeties, led by Glen Golson's two singles.

Action is again slated for Friday and Saturday of this week but starting May 29, games will be played on Tuesday and Thursday nights. Initial action will still start at 6:30 p.m.

Early day horse traders were at best thought to be scoundrels in sheep's clothing. One had to get up very early in the morning to pull the wool over their eyes.

A smart horse trader could take homers, biters, wheezers, and fronters, work them over so that even an expert would not suspect that he had been taken in by a flim-flam man.

The worst stinging a man could get was to get stuck with a fronter, a horse that refused to back up. Many a farmer has torn down a stall to get the fronter out of it.

Some horses had the habit of biting and kicking. These were usually called a temporarily nervous horse or not used to strangers. Nevertheless, as soon as the trader had gone, the horse generally got a hunk of hide one way or another.

## Farmland In County Increases In Value

To what extent has the value of farmland in Callahan County increased in recent years? How does the local rise compare with what is happening in other areas?

Because of the mounting demand for acreage, by farmers as well as by other, there has been active bidding for most of the land that has been put up for sale. As a result, prices have been shooting skyward.

Nationally, in the past year alone, the upward surge has amounted to more than 9 percent, states the Department of Agriculture. That was the biggest annual increase since 1951. In 1971 the rise was 4.2 percent.

The developments have had their effect in Callahan County. Nine years ago, when the 1964 Census of Agriculture was taken, farm real estate averaged \$88 per acre locally. That was for the land and the buildings on it.

And, for the State of Texas as a whole, the average was \$106 per acre.

Since then there has been a major shift upward. The latest report from the Department of Agriculture lists the valuation throughout the state, as of November, 1972, as \$179 per acre.

On that basis, assuming that the average rate of increase in the state applies locally, farmland values in Callahan County have climbed to approximately \$141 per acre.

The statewide increase in Texas since 1964, 60 percent, compares with 56 percent nationally and with 64 percent in the Southern Plains States.

More than half the land that is changing hands is being bought by farmers who want to enlarge their present holdings to a size that can utilize farm machinery more effectively and profitably.

As for the remainder, most of it is being acquired for operation as a unit from farmers who are retiring or from the estates of those who have died.

In some localities, also, other

factors are influencing land. Near metropolitan and suburban areas, substantial acreage is shifting to urban use.

Rising land values are important to farmers, notes the Federal Reserve Bank of Chicago. "Such gains improve their net worth and thus their debt-carrying capacity."

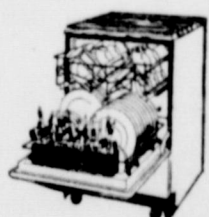

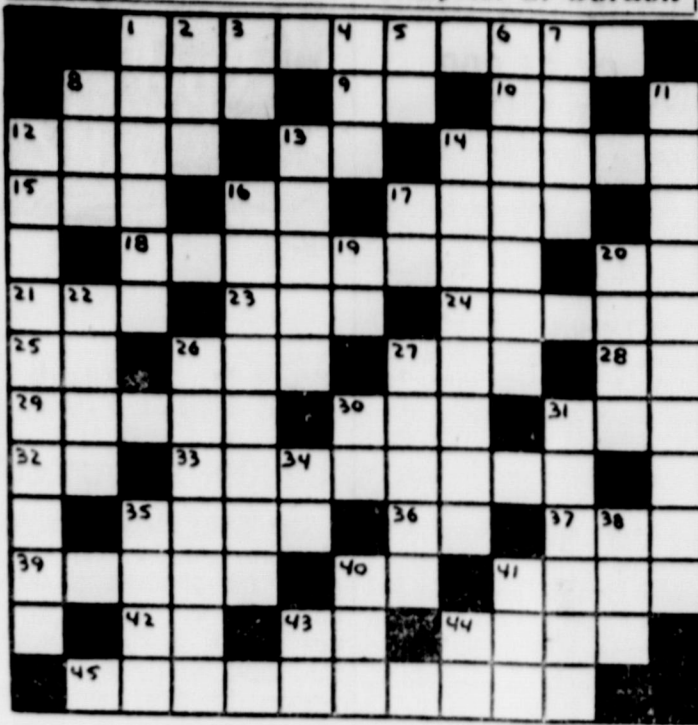

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**CAPITOL REPORT**

By Rep. Lynn Nabers

The House of Representatives recently passed HJR 15, by Gene Jones, which proposes a Constitutional Amendment allowing for annual sessions of the Legislature and calling for a salary of \$15,000 a year for all legislators. Judging by the response to the referendum last November it is doubtful that the voters in the state will support such a pay raise now. The last suggested pay increase was \$8,400, and it is inconceivable that the voters would accept one of \$15,000.

Also approved by the House was HB 946, by Representatives Hale and Kubaak, dealing with school financing. The bill proposes to set up a system of discovering the wealth of a district by six factors common to all districts. It is estimated that this plan will cost one billion, eight hundred million dollars in the next six years. In order to obtain this amount, the increase in taxes will be phenomenal. It is hoped that some alternate plan can be worked out which will be more reasonable. The bill is now in the Senate for consideration. Debate on the School Finance bill was cut off and many amendments on the Speaker's desk were never considered. It would seem that all debate should be heard when such a

major issue is being considered. It was my hope that on this important piece of legislation, all ideas could be presented before the House for debate.

The 18-year-old rights bill was passed, but after much debate, the rights to purchase alcohol and obtain abortions were removed. However, the Conference Committee report put back the right to purchase alcohol, and the House and Senate will now vote on this issue again without opportunity to amend.

Two Senate bills by Creighton have passed both houses and are now on the Governor's desk for signing. These bills would allow the voters of Comanche County to decide if they want to create hospital districts in precinct 4, and in precincts 1, 2, and 3.

## Government Funds Supply About 24% Local Income

In Callahan County, how much of the income received by local residents during the course of a year comes in the form of government checks? To what degree do the federal, state and local governments add to the financial well-being of the population? As in most parts of the country, a sizeable portion of the income they receive is traceable to public funds.

A special study of the sources of personal income, covering all parts of the country, indicates that about 24.0 cents out of every dollar received by people in the local area comes from some agency of government.

For the most part, the study represents wages and salaries paid to civil employees, benefits to those getting social security, unemployment compensation, pensions, public assistance and interest on bonds.

According to the latest figures, approximately \$6,204,000 a year is reaching the local area from such sources.

The study was made by the Tax Foundation, a non-partisan, non-profit organization. It was based upon data compiled by the U.S. Office of Business Economics.

Taking the average figures for the State of Texas and adapting them to Callahan County, it appears that the 24.0 cents of the dollar received from public treasuries comprises 15.4 cents that came from Washington and 8.6 from state and local funds.

The proportions vary widely from one area of the country to another. Nationally, 24.3 percent of income is from government sources and, throughout the West South Central States, 25.2 percent.

Some communities get an exceptionally large proportion of their income in that manner, it is noted, due to a large number of their people on public payrolls or due to a high concen-

tration of retired people in their areas.

In Washington, D.C., for example, the ratio of government payments to personal income is the highest in the country, 51.8 percent, because of the many Federal employees there. In Connecticut the ratio is lowest, 18.3 percent.

As for state and local contributions to income, they are highest in New Mexico and Alaska and lowest in Ohio.

## Nematodes Test Field Results Revealed

Texas Peanut Producers Board at Gorman has revealed that results on nematode control. Twenty-two fields were tested, and results as given by the TPPB follow.

Results for two years showed that liquid nematicides, dibromochloropropane and those containing dichloropenes, gave the best control of root-knot and lesion nematodes to the root zone. The granular nematicides tested gave good control of root-knot and lesion nematodes in the pegging zone. The granular types were more effective when applied at planting or in split applications, one-half at planting and one-half at pegging, on irrigated peanuts. Pegging applications were not tested on dryland peanuts.

Ring nematodes were also controlled by the nematicides in the same way but no increase in yield or grade were obtained, indicating doubtful economic damage at infestation levels encountered. Calcium applied as gypsum at 500, 1000, or 2000 pounds per acre in a 12-inch band 3 days after planting was superior to nematicides and fungicide-nematicide combinations in controlling pod rot in LaSalle County tests. SMK was increased up to 4 percent. Pythium was the dominant pathogen.

Lesion nematodes were present in low numbers. Some fungicides and fungicide-nematicide combinations reduced yields below untreated plots. Gypsum gave slight increases in value per acre near Pear-sall in 1971 but reduced yields at Yoakum and Prairie View, indicating the need to find out the differences between the organisms causing pod rot at these different locations.

Kathy Morris, sister of Lee, was given laurels for achievement in advanced second year office occupations.

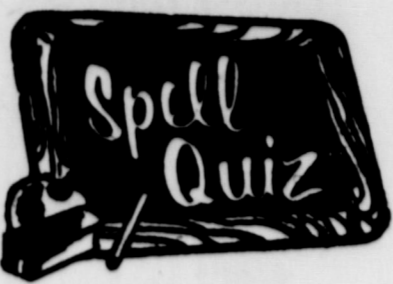
Recognized as the most outstanding mechanic was Rickey Carouth, son of Mrs. Jack Carouth.
