City of Cross Plains received a check from the state for \$5,698.11 for the one per cent city sales tax for the quarter ending June 30, 1973. That amount was for April, May and June.

It was received here last Wednesday. The most recent check was considerably higher than had been received the two previous quarters. Check for the first three months of 1973 totaled \$3,258.57, and the amount received here for the quarter ending 1972 was \$3,566.98.

Cross Plains will have a second Department of Public Safety Highway Patrolman beginning first of next month.

Mr. Hartnett and two children have taken a house on East 13th, and one child is enrolled in Cross Plains schools. The patrolman moved his family here the first of the month, but he had to return to Bishop to continue duties until his assignment here begins.

## State And County Gives Atwell Farm Road Okay

The Atwell community will have a Farm to Market Road in the future.

The Texas Highway Commission approved the remainder of the proposed route of the all-weather surface road on September 5, and Callahan County Commissioners Court okayed the project Monday.

The complete FM road will

extend from Farm Road 880, the Cross Plains to Putnam highway, eastward to FM Road 569, the Pioneer to Nimrod highway.

The latest approval covers a distance of 2.9 miles, about two miles in Callahan County and about 9 of a mile in Eastland County. The state approval hinges on okay by commissioners courts in Callahan and Eastland Counties. Duke Mitchell, precinct 4 commissioner, of Cross Plains made a motion to okay the county's participation. It passed unanimously. Callahan County must secure right-of-way at no cost to the state.

The same requirement will apply to Eastland County.

Western end of the project was approved last year, but construction was not possible due to severe freeze damage to Interstate 20 which absorbed funds for the Farm Road project.

The entire new road will cover a distance of just under six miles.

## 3-Car Pioneer Crash Injures 4 On Sunday

A three-car accident at Pioneer Sunday at 7:45 p.m. injured four persons, none believed seriously hurt.

The mishap occurred at the intersection of Farm Road 569 with State Highway 36, 4.4 miles east of Cross Plains, immediately north of Smith Grocery at Pioneer.

Six persons were involved in the three-auto crash. Cross Plains Department of Public Safety Patrolman Don Gosnell investigated the mishap.

Patrolman Gosnell reported that a 1965 Dodge driven by Albert Kanady, 42, of Rising Star was entering Texas 36 from FM Road 569 when a 1972 Plymouth driven by Willie Witt, 72, of Abilene which was traveling west, collided with the left rear of Kanady's auto. The Witt lady's vehicle bounced from the impact into the east-bound lane of Highway 36 striking a 1973 Oldsmobile driven by Ronnie Lancaster, 23, of Brownwood. Lancaster's wife and child were taken to a Brownwood hospital and Kanady drove himself to a Rising Star physician.

Gosnell said that the Kanady auto was heavily damaged, and initial estimates were that both the Witt and Lancaster cars were total losses.

## 2 Proposed Amendments To Constitution Explained

Editor's Note: Here are analyses of proposed Amendments No. 2 and No. 3 to the Texas Constitution, which will be voted on in the General Election to be held Nov. 3. This brief explanation is intended to be informative and unbiased. You will vote FOR or Against:

Proponents point out that this amendment would give adults with real property the protection and security from forced sale of their homes as is now given families and would reduce their chances of losing their property and becoming public charges. They feel that those single residents deserve the same basic protection that families enjoy.

Amendment No. 2, they say would require the consent of spouses before a major decision concerning an existing homestead is acted on. This would insure that maximum consideration be given and family harmony obtained before arriving at a major decision affecting the family such as a move to abandon a homestead.

Opponents contend that the homestead exemption was designed primarily to protect innocent family members of a debtor, not to debtor himself, and therefore should not be extended to single adults.

They point out that the homestead exemption was created when Texas was an agricultural state and Texans needed to be secure in their land so they could work, not just as the family could be protected. They claim the need for the protection has been decreased by increased urbanization. It is their belief that little reason exists

today for expansion of the protection.

They say that abandonment of the home is a matter of intention, as shown by state of mind, declaration and acts. They say the proposed changes may make the law confusing and contradictory.

Amendment No. 3 would extend the \$3,000 advalorum tax exemption to the homesteads of unmarried adults.

Proponents say the present law discriminates against single persons who do not have family relationship to qualify for the tax exemption enjoyed by married persons. They contend that tax assessors and collectors frequently are confused over facts concerning qualifications of persons seeking the tax exemption.

The say the exemption was of less economic significance when it applied only to state and county taxes, but is now a greater importance to persons 65 years of age and older in political subdivisions which elect to partially exempt taxes on such residence homesteads.

Opponents aver that those tax exemptions do not eliminate tax but merely shifts the burden to other taxpayers, and they contend that adoption of this amendment could result in greatly reduced revenues at a time when tax elimination is unwise.

They feel that modern social security, retirement systems and welfare programs have lessened the need for protection of a residence homestead, and point out that the exemption is not based on need or a person's ability to pay.



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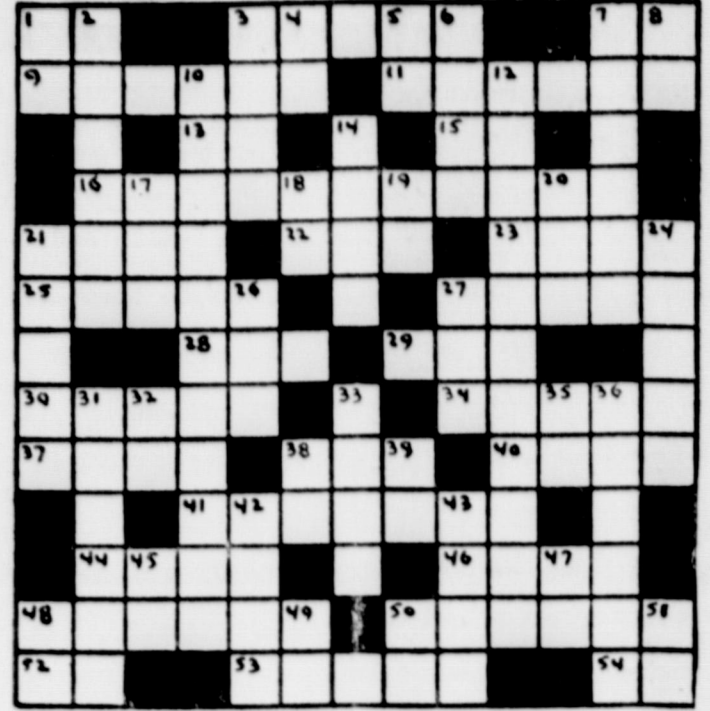

Two students, who were juniors in the 1972-73 school year, have entered advanced education schools.

They are Charlie (Chuck) Pennell, son of Mrs. Lou Brown, and Suzie Koenig, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. D. (Dick) Koenig.

Miss Koenig, 17, lacked only two credits to be able to graduate from CPHS at the close of school last year. She entered a summer program at Tarleton State University at Stephenville, posting better than a B average. She was accepted as a regular freshman there this fall. She made exceptionally high grades on a test similar to a college entrance examination. The 17-year-old girl may take the General Education Degree test when she becomes 19 and get her high school diploma. Miss Koenig's case was the first of its kind requiring approval of a state board and rule change before her application to enter TSU could be accepted.

Funeral for Mrs. Mabel A. Carrico, 75-year-old longtime Putnam resident, was held at 3 p.m. Thursday from a Baird funeral chapel. Mrs. Carrico died at 4 p.m. Tuesday, Oct. 2, in a Mason hospital after a long illness.

The Rev. Delton Fisher, pastor of the Baird First United Methodist Church officiated. Burial was in Putnam Cemetery.

Born March 2, 1898, in Bell County, she was the former Mabel Mobley and married Bert Carrico Dec. 4, 1920, at Putnam. He died in 1922. Mrs. Carrico had moved to Putnam as a young girl and lived there 65 years before moving to Mason.

She was a member of the First United Methodist Church at Putnam, and had been a practical nurse for many years prior to her retirement.

### Local FB Unit Supports Farm Product Exports

Editor's Note: Following is a statement of policy adopted by the Callahan-Shackelford County Farm Bureau at a meeting of directors and officers at Baird Tuesday night of last week. It opposes recently enacted legislation to impose controls on exports of agricultural products and supports continued trading and exporting of farm products with friendly nations in advantageous trade. The statement follows.

The president of the Callahan-Shackelford County Farm Bureau, Dale Wilson of Baird, said today that if controls are imposed on agricultural exports, the result will be financial disaster for many farmers. He made the comment in reference to legislation currently pending in Congress that would impose export restrictions.

The U. S. House of Representatives passed a bill (H. R. 3547) on September 6 to increase the President's authority to control exports of materials and agricultural commodities. The U. S. Senate is holding hearings on similar bills (S. 2053 and S. 2411).

The Callahan-Shackelford County Farm Bureau solidly supports the expansion of exports of agricultural commodities and the development of mutually advantageous trade with other friendly nations. The legislation aimed at limiting exports are much like price controls in that they divert attention from the need for a direct attack on our economic problems through effective as-

tion to reduce government spending. Consumers who are crying for export controls just don't understand the consequences of such action. The intensity that we are involved in exports is not common knowledge to the consumer.

According to the United States Department of Agriculture, the 1973 fiscal year export sales, which were 60 per cent higher than a year earlier, required the output of 85 millions acres of U. S. cropland—or the production of one of every four acres harvested. The sharp rise in exports is contributing significantly to the expected increase in farm income from the record of \$20 billion in the calendar year 1972 to an estimated \$24 billion in 1973.

If the U. S. were suddenly not able to continue export of three-fourths of its wheat production, two-thirds of its output, around half of the soybean crop and cattle hides, and nearly two-fifths of the U. S. output of tobacco, cotton, tallow, and almonds the result would be financial disaster to the farming and ranching industry. Texas farmers and ranchers share of the 1973 fiscal year export sales amounted to almost \$800 million.

The Callahan-Shackelford County Farm Bureau believes in the "supply and demand" type of economy. When the demand is restricted or cut off, the farming and ranching industry would suffer immediately; but the end result would be that all Americans would suffer from this needless legislation.

Everybody, especially Farm Bureau members, are urged to write to Senator Lloyd Bentson, Senator John G. Tower, and President Richard Nixon, asking them to oppose passage of the export controls legislation.

Greg Turner, who played offensive quarterback for about one-half of the game, romped 57 yards on the second play of the game for six points. Halfback Bruce Barnes cracked over for the two-point conversion.

With only 2:25 gone in the first stanza Fullback Darrell Sanders hit paydirt on a 8-yard run. Conversion failed. The tally was set up on Flanker Rex Beggs 43-yard run to the Early eight.

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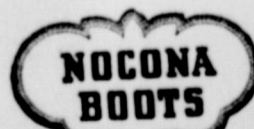
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
