Rev. Derrell Dossey, former Desdemona pastor, of near Ranger, and Rev. L. C. Landers, church pastor, will officiate. Burial will be in Desdemona under direction of a De Leon funeral home.

Mrs. Horan was born Aug. 23, 1948, in Gorman, and she married Ken Horan Feb. 3, 1968 in Dallas. She was a member of the Baptist Church.

Survivors include her husband and two daughters of Cross Plains; her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Roberts of Desdemona, and one sister, Mrs. Kevin Weaver of Desdemona.

## 2 Local Youths Win In Essay Contest

Two Cross Plains school students have been named winners in an area essay contest sponsored by the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Local winners are James Garrett and Dana Bains.

James, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. (Harold) Garrett, claimed first place in the eighth grade division.

Miss Bains, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Oran Bains, took second place in the sixth grade classification.

The contest, sponsored locally by the John Davis Chapter of the DAR in Abilene, included entries from all Abilene schools and most schools surrounding Abilene. Topic on which the essay contest was based was "A Child of 1774."

Garrett received a bronze medal for his first place, and it was pointed out that first place winners in each grade division will be entered in a statewide contest. He also won first place in seventh grade competition last year.

Miss Bains was awarded an engraved certificate for her entry.

It was explained that the contest drew more entries than ever before this year, and that competition was stronger than ever.

## USDA And Peanut Group Compromise

United States Department of Agriculture and the National Peanut Growers Group have reached a compromise on the 1974 peanut program.

Three of the six proposed changes by the USDA and announced in October by Agriculture Secretary Earl Butz have been rescinded, but three remain in effect.

Possibly the most significant of the changes in the compromise program in so far as concerns the Cross Plains area is that leasing, sale and transfer of peanut allotments have been re-established in the 1974 peanut program.

That means that within county transfer of peanut allotments by lease, sell or owner will be al-

lowed for the 1974 crop year. Procedures will follow guidelines established in past years.

It was noted that the final date for transfers will be April 1, 1974.

It is also believed that price support for 1974 crop peanuts will be at or above the level announced for last year.

Another change is that the Commodity Credit Corporation's minimum sales policy is revised to provide for resale level of 100 per cent of the loan rate. Previously announced change provided for resale policy level of 115 per cent.

Southwestern Peanut Growers Association at Gorman, and its counterparts in Virginia and Georgia, will continue to handle filed and supervisory price support functions.

The USDA retained three of its six proposals. They are as follows:

No price support for peanuts found to contain aflatoxin (mold). That means that grower will need to keep a closer watch on crops in the fields and possibly harvesting procedures.

An increased charge of \$2.00 per ton for storage, handling and inspection of peanuts.

No tolerance in program compliance (acreage) determinations relating to measured acreage.

It was noted that the \$2.00 per ton increase for handling, etc. will take some money from the local economy, but will not be damaging to any one producer.

It was noted by Callahan County agricultural authorities that very little trouble has resulted from over planted acreage in past years. It was explained that most peanut producers willingly comply with designated allotments.

Ross Wilson, manager of the Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association at Gorman, noted that the compromise grew out of plan put forward by the USDA and National Peanut Growers Group which met January 20 and 21. He noted that in terms of net returns to growers the plan agreed upon holds slight advantage over the grower assessment plan.

Both parties involved in the two days of discussions agreed

## Eula Water System Gets Big FHA Loan

U. S. Senator John Tower has announced that the Farmers Home Administration has approved an additional loan of \$160,000 to the Eula Water Supply Corporation in Callahan County to help finance the completion of its water system.

In February, 1973, the Farmers Home Administration had provided a loan of \$366,000 to help develop this water system to serve some 248 water users in Callahan County which included business establishments and a school in the community of Eula.

The loan is provided under the Rural Community Facilities Program administered by the Farmers Home Administration, a rural credit service of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

## NO FILINGS YET IN CITY, SCHOOL VOTING

At mid-morning Tuesday there had been no filings for expiring terms on Cross Plains Independent School District Board of Trustees or the Cross Plains City Council.

Three vacancies will exist on both boards. Terms of trustees Vernon Phillips, Noah Johnson and Roy Neil Tatom are expiring and tenures of Mayor Doyle Burchfield and aldermen T. T. Nichols and Raymond DeBusk are running out.

Aldermen are elected for two-year terms, and trustees are named for three-year periods.

Voting in both elections is set for April 6, and deadline for filing with name printed on ballot is March 6.

## Share Of \$303.8 Million Due Some Local Veterans

For Callahan County's war veterans there is some good news. According to a government announcement, they will share in a payout of \$303.8 million this year.

The money will go to veterans of World War I and World War II who hold GI insurance policies. It represents dividends that have accrued on the policies. A breakdown shows that government checks totaling approximately \$14,000 will be paid to some 180 former servicemen in the local area.

The distribution is limited to World War veterans. Other vets, who figured in the Korean and Vietnam wars, have different kinds of insurance and will not share in these dividends.

The announcement from the Veterans Administration, notes that the \$303.8 million is the largest dividend it ever declared. The previous high was \$297 million.

The increase, it is explained, results chiefly from higher interest rates earned by the insurance funds in the past year.

Most of the local recipients are holders of National Service Life Insurance, issued to those who served in the second

World War. The others are veterans of the first World War. They hold U. S. Government Life Insurance policies.

The 180 residents of Callahan County who kept their policies in force and will therefore be on the receiving end, represent only a fraction of the World War vets in the local area. The total number, based upon the latest VA tabulation, is 780.

The individual dividend checks will vary in amount, depending on the type of policy, its size and the age of the insured.

The general average, for those who were in World War I, is \$156 and, for the others, \$75. Some will receive much more than these averages and some much less.

The added \$14,000 that the local vets will have to spend will provide that much added stimulus to business in the area.

Those entitled to the dividend checks will receive them automatically on the anniversary dates of their policies.

Currently, states the VA, over 4.2 million World War vets are carrying nearly \$28 billion worth of government insurance.

## 0.6 Inch Moisture

Rain, sleet and snow fell over the Cross Plains area Wednesday yielding .6 of an inch of moisture according to records maintained at Newton, official weather-er.

## Sleet, Snow

For the month of January stands at only .11 inch of moisture. Light sleet fell over the area January 18 was gauged at an inch.

Appreciable rainfall returned here on Nov. 23, when 38 of an inch was recorded.

Conditions are approaching stage in this area of winter pastorage as small grain crops are reported to be suffering.

## Box Numbers

Postmaster Joe E. Hanke, Jr. urged all rural postal customers served by the Cross Plains Post Office to use box numbers as part of their return addresses to assure faster, more mail deliveries from customers.

Although box numbers are a regular part of most rural addresses, it has recently become the practice of many customers to omit this information.

Postmaster Hanke said, "The practice sometimes causes mail to be returned to sender because of an insufficient address. It has also been noted by publishers and other mailers as one of the major causes of duplicate mailings to customers."

Postmaster Hanke said, "they cost the big money in dollars and cents and they flood the mailboxes of everyone's mail is slow."

Postmaster Hanke said the number is as important to route addresses as the box number is to a post office box.

For a rural route address both, the box number and the route number, it is an important address and is subject to return to the sender," Hanke said.

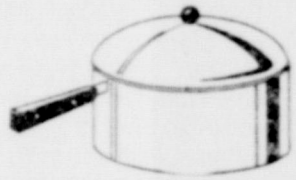

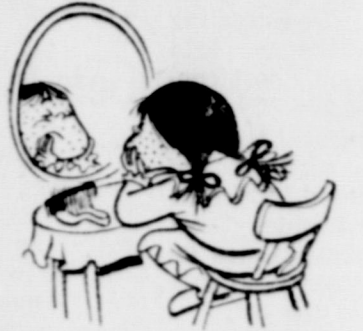

### Claim Depreciation Urges Agricultural Economist

"This may be the year for farmers and ranchers to claim as much depreciation as possible," says Dr. Wayne Hayenga, economist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"This means claiming the full amount of extra first-year 20 per cent depreciation on new or used tangible personal property acquired during 1973 that has a useful life of six years or more," explains the Texas A&M University System specialist.

On joint returns such depreciation per year cannot exceed \$4,000. The limit is \$2,000 on other returns.

The extra depreciation is taken in the same year regular depreciation is first claimed, after claiming the extra first year depreciation, regular depreciation should be claimed on the remaining value.

The extra depreciation allowances does not apply to property acquired by gift or inheritance or to property from a spouse, ancestor or lineal descendant.

"Where possible, use fast methods of depreciation on new machinery and equipment that has a useful life of three years or more," suggests Hayenga. "However, such methods do not apply to used items."

Most machinery and equipment will qualify as will breeding stock if they meet the useful life test and have not been used.

"The double declining balance is the simpler of the two fast depreciation methods," Hayenga points out. "Just double the straight line rate and apply that factor each year against the undepreciated balance. For a tractor with a 10-year life, 20 per cent of the undepreciated balance could be deducted each year."

In explaining the sum-of-the-year-digits method, Hayenga says the annual depreciation allowance is figured by applying a declining fraction to the cost of the property reduced by salvage value. In the fraction, the numerator is the remaining years of useful life and the denominator is the sum of the digits of each of the years of useful life. For an item with a 10-year life, the first year's depreciation would be 10/55 (10 plus 9 plus 8 plus 7 plus 6 plus 5 plus 4 plus 3 plus 2 plus 1 equals 55) of property cost; reduced by salvage value. The final year's depreciation would be 1/55 of this cost.

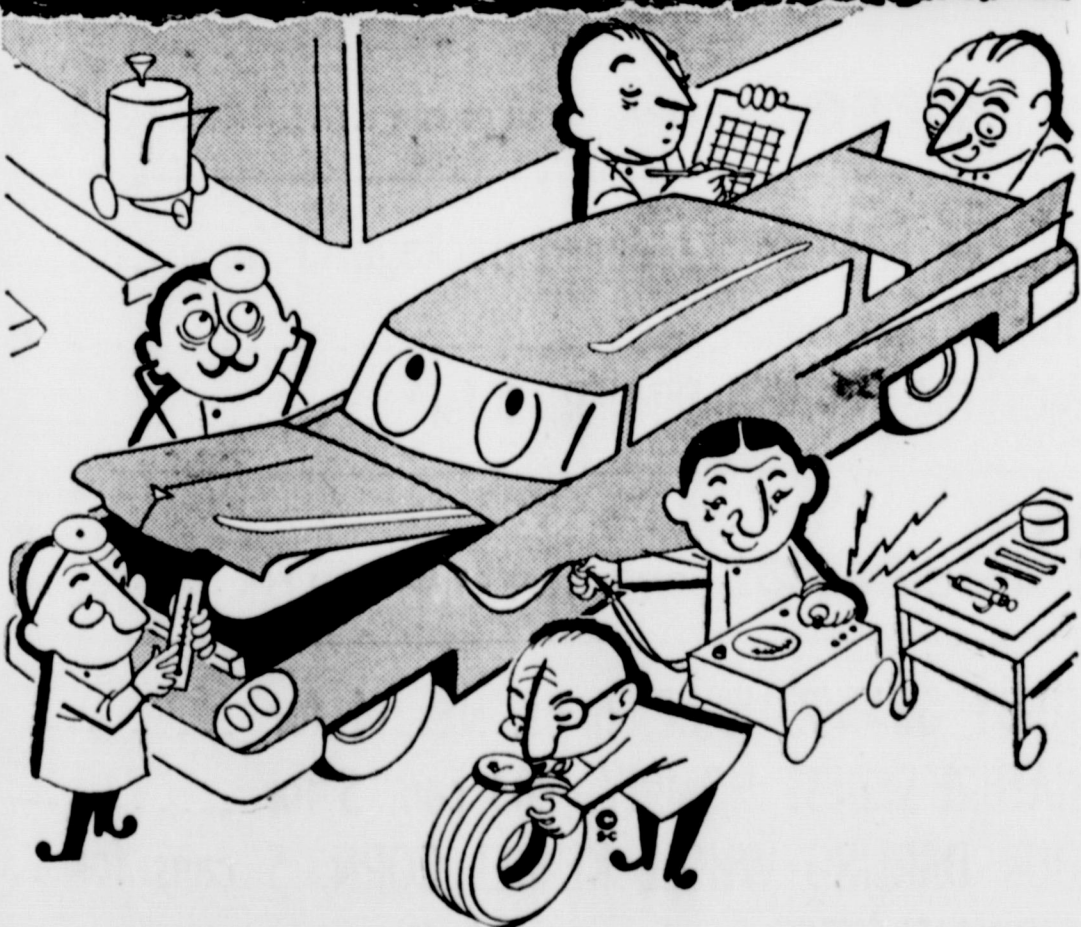

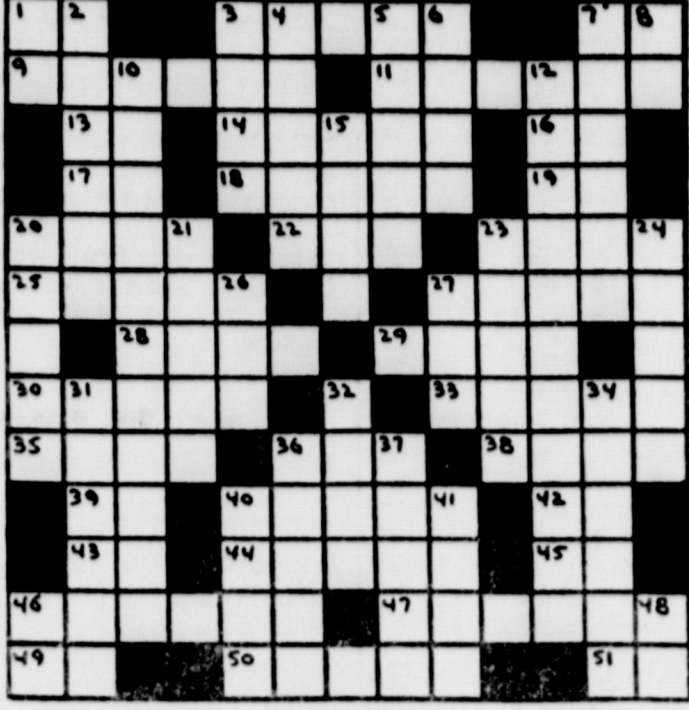

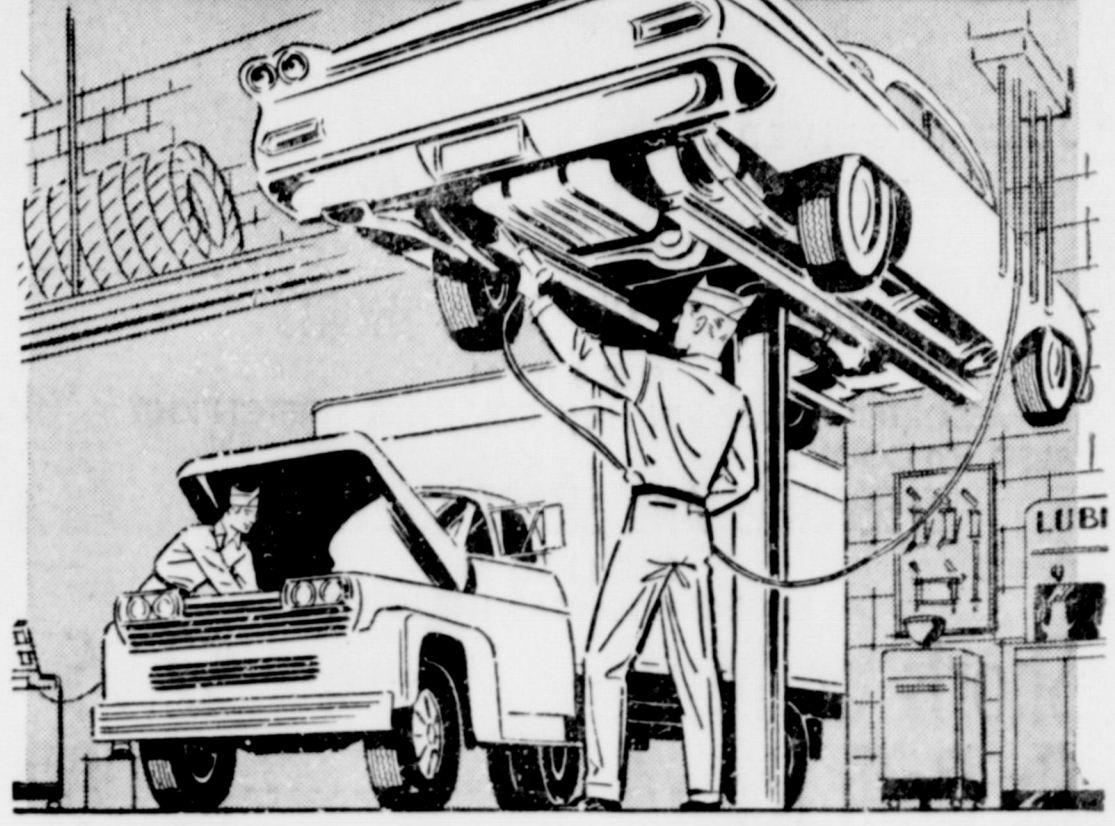

to work toward a program that would include a moderate reduction of support price, but would maintain the present 1,610,000 acres held by current growers for allotment production. Any production beyond the 1,610,000 acres would be for export and crushing uses only.

The three above changes or modifications mentioned earlier here were announced on January 25 as a result of the meeting between the USDA and peanut growers group. Wilson noted that efforts will continue to modify or reverse other recent USDA decisions announced that are adverse to growers.

Wilson credited the efforts of key peanut area congressmen in achieving reversal of these three policies. Especially signif-

icant was the firm stand taken soon after October 24 by Texas Congressman W. R. Poff, Omar Burleson, Abraham Kazan and Senator Lloyd Benson. The prime importance also was the ground swell of resentment from peanut growers, processors, buyers and area business firms as expressed to all area congressmen.

The association manager is quick to add, "Although the rescinding of these three policies by USDA is most encouraging, a monumental task is yet to be accomplished, that of moving through the Congress a revised peanut bill that must contain the provisions to safeguard growers' interests."

## 3 Local Youths In Fort Worth Show

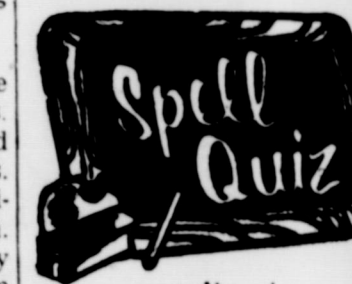
