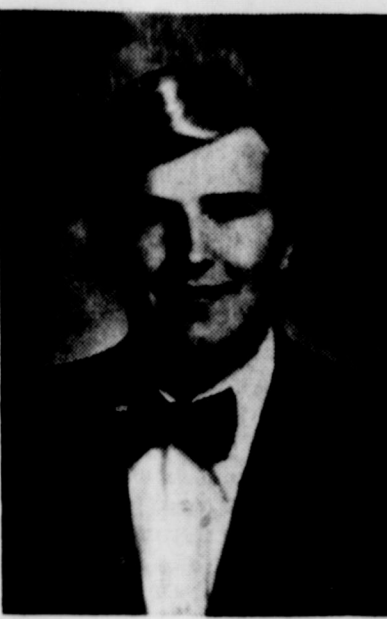

Board of Trustees of Cross Plains schools formally accepted the resignation of Superintendent Wayne Ford in regular session Monday night. A board spokesman said, "We regretfully accepted Mr. Ford's resignation." Ford, who has served as superintendent here eight years, will be associated with the Stephenville Public Schools as a tax administrator. The resignation is effective May 20. He has been with the local schools 14 years, serving as a classroom teacher three years and a like number of years as high school principal before being named superintendent. 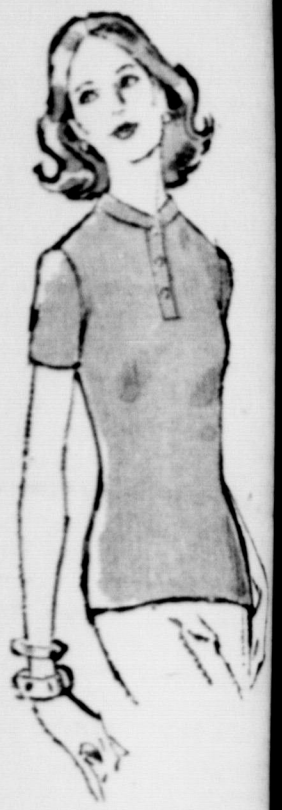

S.S. Beneficiaries May Earn More Now

Persons receiving social security benefits can earn more in 1974 without having their benefit payments withheld, according to Glynn Hammons, manager of the Abilene social security office. The exempt amount of earnings has been increased to \$2,400 in 1974. In 1973, the exempt amount was \$2,100. Anyone who receives social security payments and expects to earn more than \$2,400 this year should notify the social security office if he has not already done so.

Hammons points out that if annual earnings go over \$2,400 in 1974, social security will withhold \$1 in benefits for each \$2 in earnings above \$2,400. Additionally, no matter how much you earn a year, you can get full benefits for any month in which you neither earn over \$200 in wages nor perform substantial services in self-employment.

Those beneficiaries whose 1973 earnings exceed \$2,100 are reminded to file a report with the social security office on or before April 15. Late filing may result in a penalty in addition to the normal withholding of benefit payments.

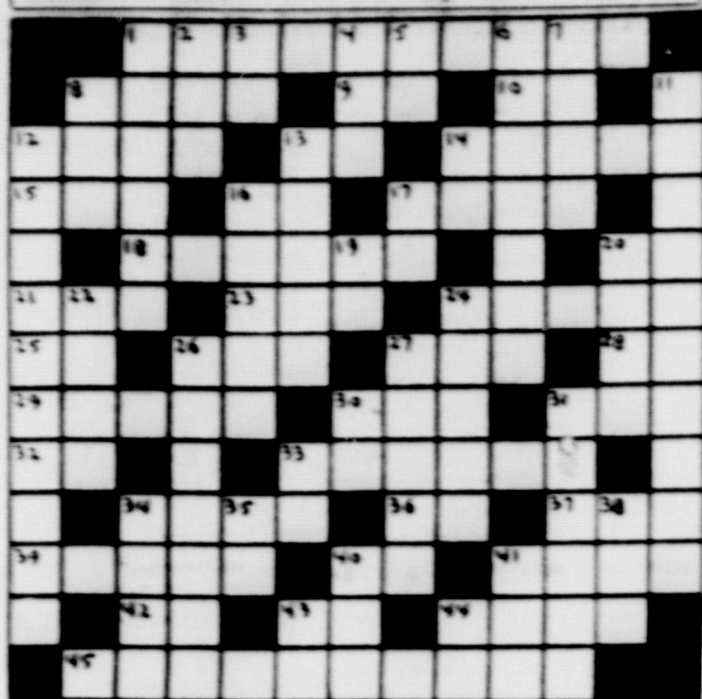

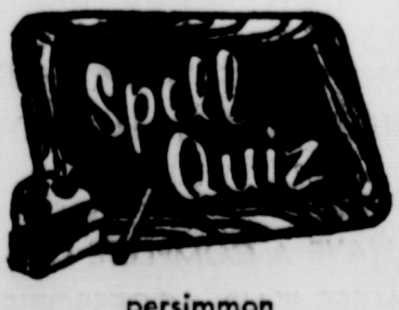
When's the last time you got goose bumps when they played the Star Spangled Banner?
