Porter Reynolds, 67, of Mineral Wells and Stephens County, died on March 28 in a Mineral Wells nursing home following a lengthy illness.



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S.S. Beneficiaries May Earn More Now

Persons receiving social security benefits can earn more in 1974 without having their benefit payments withheld, according to Glynn Hammons. manager of the Abilene social security office. The exempt amount of earnings has been increased to \$2,400 in 1974. In 1973, the exempt amount was \$2,100. Anyone who receives social security payments and expects to earn more than \$2,400 this year should notify the social security office if he has not already done so.

Hammons points out that if annual earnings go over \$2,400 in 1974, social security withhold \$1 in benefits for each \$2 in earnings above \$2,400. Additionally, no matter how much you earn a year, you can get full benefits for any month in which you neither earn over \$200) in wages nor perform substantial services in self-employment

Those beneficiaries whose 1973 earnings exceed \$2,100 are reminded to file a report with the social security office on or before April 15. Late filing may result in a penalty in addition to the normal withholding of benefit payments.




