C.P.H.S. Seniors To Graduate Monday Night

Art Show Set For Saturday, Sunday

Thirty-eight members of the 1974 Senior Class of Cross Plains High School will end secondary education in vespers and commencement exercises at the school auditorium Sunday and Monday nights. Both ceremonies are scheduled to begin at 8 p.m.

Vesper Service will feature three local clergymen. Bill Reese, minister of the Church of Christ, will give the invocation, and the benediction will be pronounced by Rev. Curtis Simpson, pastor of the First Baptist Church. Rev. Luther J. Helm, pastor of the First United Methodist Church, will deliver the sermon.

Carroll Rhodes, Buffalo Band director, will sing a solo, "His Gentle Look", accompanied by Mrs. Alvin Hutchins at the piano and Miss Sandy Weiss on flute.

The high school band will play both processional and recessional music at the Vesper and commencement ceremonies.

Commencement on Monday will begin with the invocation by William Hines, president of the Senior Class, after the processional.

Rev. Merrill, salutorian, will speak on "Will We Preserve the American Way of Life?"

Mattie Faye Dixon, local teacher, will sing a solo, "You'll Never Walk Alone", accompanied by Mrs. Hutchins.

Miss Mary Rankin, class valedictorian, will follow with a brief speech entitled "Reflections, Observations and Aspirations".

The Rev. Logan Cummings, pastor of the First Baptist Church at Brownwood, will deliver the commencement address.

Scott H. Edington, high school principal, will handle presentation of awards, and Wayne Ford, superintendent, will present the Senior Class.

Lewis Fortune and Roy Neil Tatom, members of the school board, will present diplomas to the graduates.

Audience will sing the school song, accompanied by the band.

C. B. Hutchins, senior, will give the benediction immediately before the recessional.

In lieu of a list of the 1974 graduates, autobiographies of the class members may be found throughout this edition of the Review.

Vote Re-Count Puts Odom In Run-Off With Mitchell

E. F. (Franz) Odom will face Duke Mitchell in the Democratic run-off election for Precinct 4 Commissioner in Callahan County on June 1.

A panel of three met at Baird last Friday and re-counted the ballots polled in the first primary election held May 4. Odom received 145 votes, to take the runner-up spot in the six man race.

Initial vote totals listed Odom and Nathan B. Foster as both having 144 votes. With Odom gaining the one vote, he opposed incumbent Mitchell in the run-off.

No other vote totals were changed in the re-count, although all votes for each candidate were reviewed by the panel consisting of Mark Adair, Benny Glover and Oscar Koening.

Re-count vote totals were listed as follows: Mitchell 223, Odom 145, Foster 144, Billy Hines 140, J. E. Blanton and Lester M. Wyatt 22 each.

The panel which re-counted the votes commended the workers in the primary election on accuracy under pressing and difficult circumstances.

Cross Plains voting box, which also encompasses Cottonwood and Atwell communities, will have two races on the run-off ballot on June 1. The other is for post of Callahan County Superintendent where incumbent L. C. Cash faces challenger E. L. (Chief) Reese. Cash led in the three-man race over the county 860 to 673, but did not gain a majority as the third man in the race, Robert F. Joy, Jr., polled 345 votes.

In the commissioner's race 690 votes were polled on May 4 and seven absentee ballots were counted. Only one ballot had no choice marked in the contest.

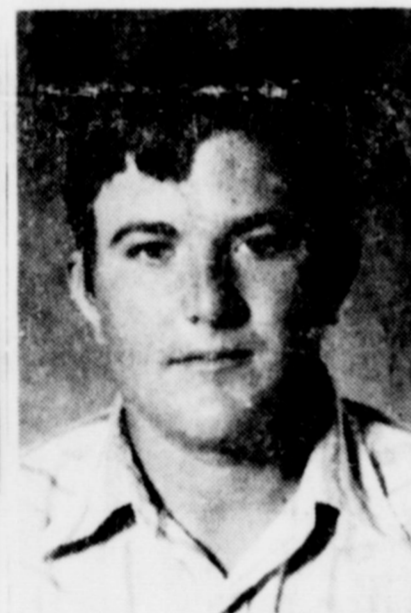
After graduation he plans to work for the Navy in the nuclear field.

She had lived in Rising Star 15 years.

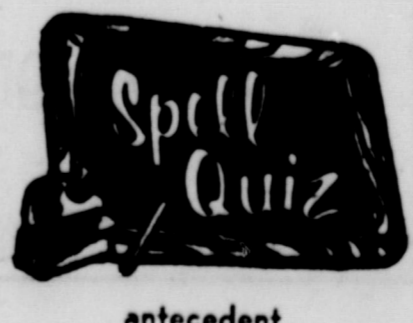
GIRL KNOWN LOCALLY IS U.I.L. ART WINNER
