Supreme Court Opens With Both Barrels on Black Committee Snooping.

WASHINGTON, D. C .- "Our WASHINGTON, D. C.—"Out institutions must be kept free from the appropriation of unauthorized power," was the warning given by the United States Supreme court to the President and his associates when the court handed down its ruling that the securities and exchange commission had overstepped its authority in the much publiched Josec case, but had not the property of the model of the president has set up, and at the "fishing expeditions" into the affairs of private citizens, such as the Investigations of the Black committee.
