Re-Districting Plan For County Is Proposed

Little Change Locally In Re-Drawn Precinct Lines

Editor's Note: Following is a press release from the Callahan County Commissioners Court, advising of a proposed plan to re-district the county in accordance with the one-man, one-vote rule recently handed down by the courts of the land.

"After a long study of the many factors involved, the Commissioners Court of Callahan County has agreed on a proposed re-districting of Callahan County. The recent court decision requiring a county to be divided into four precincts of approximately equal population has resulted in the need for a change in the Commissioners Precincts of this county.

"Although the Court's decision does not appear to take these factors into consideration, it was necessary to attempt to divide the county as equally as possible not only in regard to population but as pertains to roads and area. Nevertheless, the heavy population of the Clyde area presented a distinct problem to the Commissioners in trying to decide how to draw the proposed lines.

"Based upon the latest figures for all poll registration, the Clyde area alone contained over 1,800 registered voters, whereas, each precinct requires approximately 1,300 voters to be divided equally. This necessitated a division of Clyde and brought about a smaller precinct for Precinct No. 1, than was desired.

"The Commissioners have studied this problem at length and have agreed that the proposal as shown by the map (at left) may be the best division possible. However, in a desire to have other ideas and opinions, they appointed Jack Scott of Cross Plains, Frank Chrene of Oplin, Weldon Edwards of Clyde and John D. Isenhower of Putnam as a Citizens Advisory Committee to look into the proposal and further study the division as regards population, roads and area."

County Commissioners and the Citizens Advisory Committee are scheduled to meet Monday to make further checks into the population balance as proposed.

The court believes, it is reported, that Precinct 4 is about right according to population, as is possibly Precinct 3, as tentatively drawn. There is a question on Precincts 1 and 2.

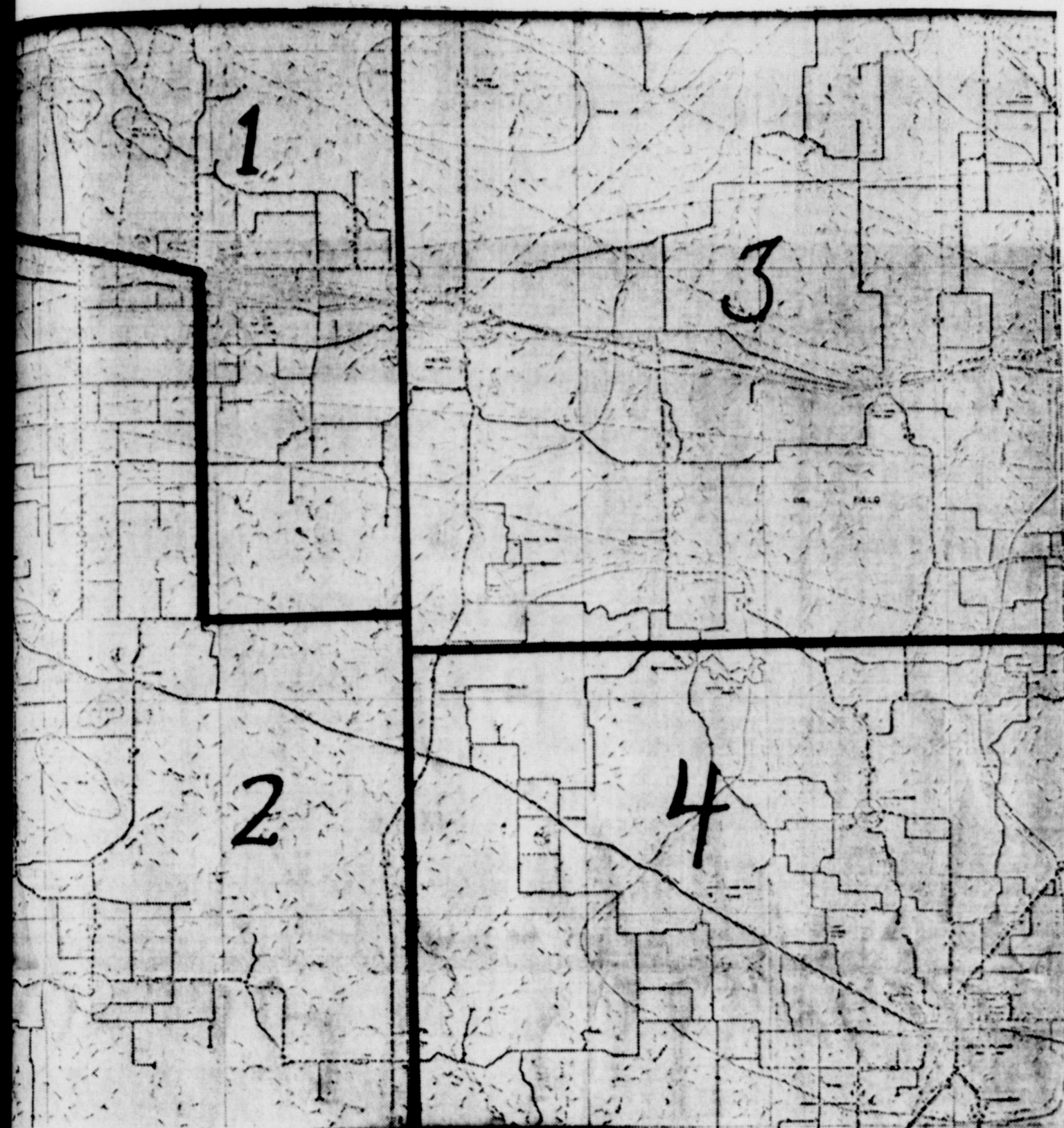
Precinct 4, encompassing

Cross Plains, Atwell, Cottonwood and adding Rowden, will include all the Rowden community. It will extend from east county line westward to longitudinal line 99 degrees and 25 minutes, which splits the county north to south. The northern boundary was squared and runs just north of Spring Gap Mountain.

Precinct 3 includes Baird and Putnam as proposed. The western line runs along the western city limits of the county seat town, which is longitude 99 degrees, 25 minutes. As proposed Precinct 1 in-

cludes about two-thirds of the City of Clyde. The suggested southern boundary starts where Interstate Highway 20 enters Callahan on the west to its junction with Farm Road 604, shooting a straight line through Clyde, and again joins 604 south of Clyde. It follows that path to a point about 4 miles north of the junction of Highway 36 and Highway 283 and several miles west of that point, where it turns east to Precinct 3 line.

Precinct 2 will include about one-third of Clyde, the western portion, Eula, Denton Valley and Oplin.

Buffaloes Open '74 Grid Wars

Host Wylie Friday

The season will open Friday at 8 p.m. as the Buffaloes play host to Wylie Bulldogs of District 8-A.

The Herd will attempt to regroup forces after a loss to Merkel, another 8-A game last Friday in a scrimmage session here.

Badgers battered the Buffaloes in the controlled session four times while the Buffaloes did not tally. Cross Plains coach Sam McBrierty said the scrimmage was successful for us for one thing we found out our errors and hopefully can correct them.

Turnovers hampered Buffalo efforts. McBrierty said fundamental errors caused local players out of position, and it was the Merkel team always the spots. The head coach said Cross Plains had six fumbles, many turnovers, and intercepted two passes. He hopes to have those mistakes corrected by the Wylie game.

The Buffaloes did put a good stand, and the players carried good. One Bison was hit by the Herd's Badger 8 before the game. Highlight of that was the running of Halfback Pancake who had a long run in the drive.

The Buffaloes will bring a victory string over the Herd here Friday night. The Herd was the team which fell to the Bull-

dogs 20-8. Cross Plains has not defeated the Bulldogs since resuming non-conference wars back in 1968. Year-by-year scores on contests between the two schools since the renewing of games after an absence of some time, follow with Wylie's winning total first: 1968—19-13, 1969—39-0, 1970—12-0, 1971—14-6, 1972—27-0.

Although Friday's visitors are not rated, in pre-season polls, quite as tough as Merkel many of last year's Bulldogs return to the squad this year. A strength listed by Wylie Coach Joe Longley is better maturity and depth.

There were no major traffic accidents, although local Department of Public Safety Patrolman Don Gosnell reported two minor mishaps. There were no injuries.

Many local families hosted relatives and friends during the week end and Monday, and local persons traveled to homes of kinsmen and friends.

Report Says Callahanians Are More Accident Prone

Do residents of Callahan County lead safer or more hazardous lives than people in other parts of the country?

Are they more liable or less liable to be involved in an accident of some sort—automobile or otherwise—during the course of a year?

According to government statistics, local people seem to be more accident-prone than the average.

The accident figures for the local area and for communities in other section of the United States were compiled by the Public Health Service as part of its annual vital statistics surveys.

All types of accidents were taken into account, whether they occurred in the home or at work, while driving, swimming, boating or hunting.

Based upon the last three annual reports, fatal accidents in Callahan County have been averaging 9 per year, with 4 of them attributed to automobile.

Included in the figures are all accidents in which local persons were involved, wherever they happened. Excluded were those affecting non-residents.

Related to population, the toll in the area was at the rate of 106 fatalities per 100,000 people during the three-year period.

It was a higher rate than was found in most other communities per 100,000. The rate in the West South Central States was 70.

Throughout the country, according to the National Safety Council, about 1,000 fewer persons died in traffic accidents in 1973 than in 1972.

It attributes the unusual drop to the fact that people did less driving and traveled at reduced speeds toward the end of the year, because of the energy crisis.

Accidents have been responsible for a huge economic loss in recent years, it finds. The average over the last three years is placed at \$29 billion a year. This takes into account loss of wages, medical expenses, insurance payments, reduced production and property damage.

Callahan County's proportionate share of this cost, applying the average loss per accident locally, is approximately \$2,268,000 a year.

New Veteran Life Insurance Program

Some 2.7 million Vietnamese veterans are eligible for a new low-cost Veterans Group Life Insurance program which offers as much as \$20,000 coverage for \$3.40 per month to young veterans, but they must apply before Aug. 1, 1975, the Veterans Administration pointed out.

The nonrenewable, five-year term insurance is available for veterans discharged from military service since April 2, 1970. The new Veterans Administration-supervised program, authorized May 24 under the Veterans Insurance Act, also offers coverage in amounts of \$5,000, \$10,000 and \$15,000. Rates for the maximum \$20,000 coverage are \$3.40 per month for veterans aged 34 and under and \$6.80 for those 35 and over.

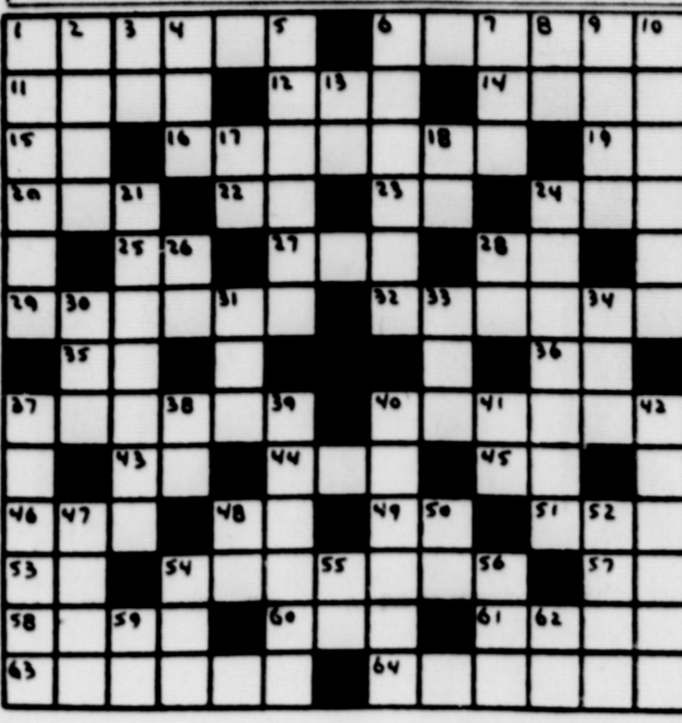
Application forms for veterans discharged prior to Aug. 1, 1974, are available from VA offices or from the Office of Servicemen's Group Life Insurance, 212 Washington St. Newark, N. J. 07102. Applicants must furnish evidence of good health. However, VA-rated service-connected disabilities will be waived.

Servicemen discharged after Aug. 1 will receive application forms automatically. VA pointed out. Personnel leaving active duty are permitted 120 premium-free days to convert Servicemen's Group Life Insurance to Veterans Group Life Insurance without medical examination.



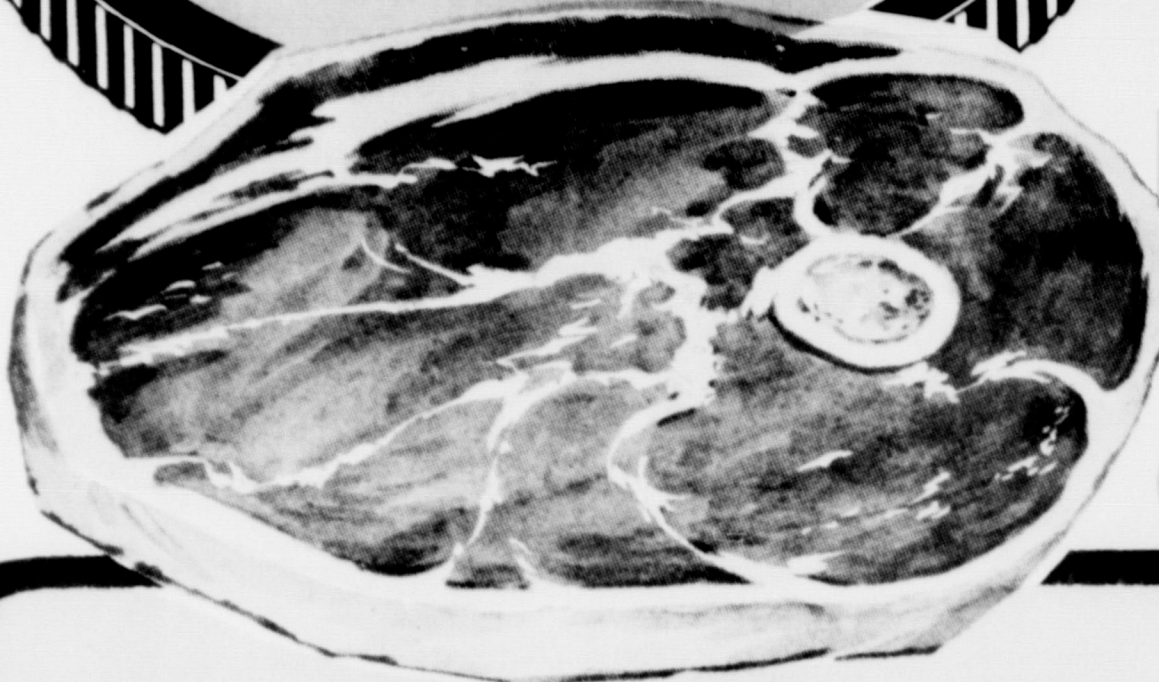

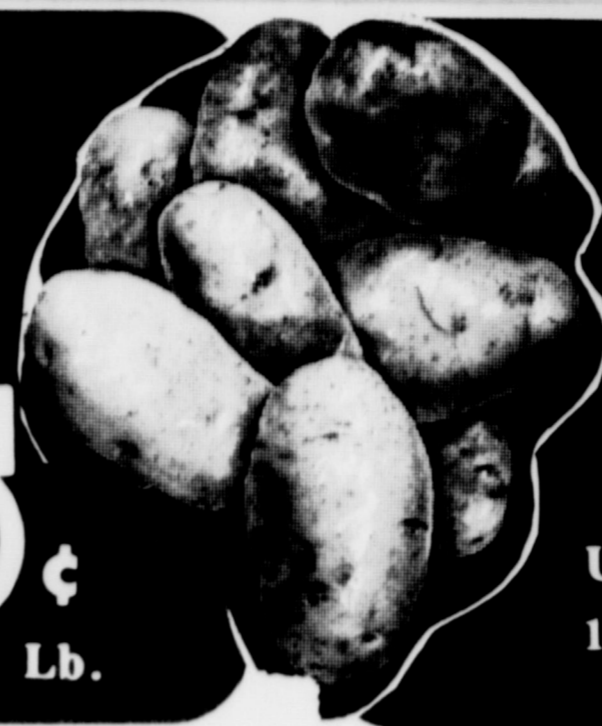
