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## Bank Deposits Hit New High Monday

Citizens State Bank reached another milestone in its steady growth in posting an all-time high in bank deposits last Monday.

L. H. (Leonard) Mosley, vice-president, noted that an all-time high in deposits was reached by the local financial institution on Monday. Deposits were listed at \$8,137,388.87 at the close of business on that day. At the close of business on June 30, end of the second quarter of this year, deposits stood at \$8,043,571.36, which was an increase of more than \$2,000,000.00 over the close of business on December 31, 1974. It was noted by bank officials that deposits here have remained near or above the \$8 million mark through the intervening six months.

Total assets of the bank have also shown a marked increase during the past 18 months, Mosley noted. They have surpassed the \$9 million mark on Monday about a quarter of a million dollars more than was shown at the close of business last year.

Jack W. Tunnell, bank president, and Mosley noted that they were extremely pleased by

the confidence shown in the bank by Cross Plains area people. They opined that pleased customers of the bank were a primary source of revenue which has allowed the bank to continue to grow.

Reflecting the growth in deposits, the bank's top executives revealed the following figures at the close of business for the past several years: 1971—\$5,030,041.21; 1972 — \$5,824,033.73; 1973 — \$6,825,503.10 and 1974 — \$7,843,311.30.

A good grain harvest was also believed to have allowed deposits to show a gain during the past several weeks.

Brother Morris is also a member of the South Texas Police Communications Officers Association, he is a standby dispatcher for the Ingleside Police Department, he is a member of the National Rifle Association of America, the Texas State Rifle Association and works on the Voice of Democracy contests.

The Voice of Democracy contest is sponsored annually for high school students by V.F.W. Post 6386 and Brother Morris tapes the entries for the students.

Brother Morris is also a member of the Ingleside Salvation Army Unit board. He has been pastor in Ingleside for almost 10 years. He and his wife, Susie have a teenage son, "Stephen".

## Old Food Stamp Deadline Extended

Food stamp recipients can use 50-cent, \$2 and old \$5 food stamps until August 31, the U. S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) has announced.

USDA introduced a new food stamp series—\$1, \$5 and \$10—on March 1 with a deadline of June 30 for spending old series food stamps at authorized retail food stores and meal services. The deadline was extended to allow recipients who were issued old coupons in March, April and May adequate time to use them.

Grocers and meal services can redeem old coupons at commercial banks through September 30.

The change, which was effectively July 1, 1975, will be published in the Federal Register on Wednesday, July 9.

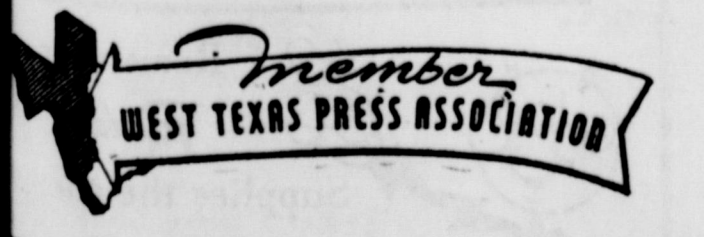

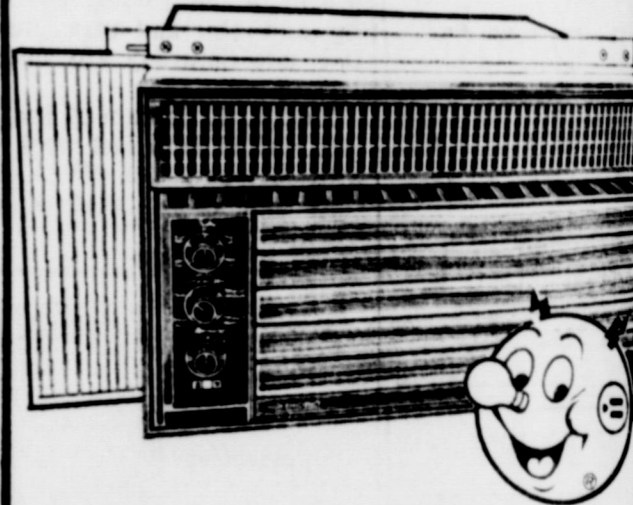
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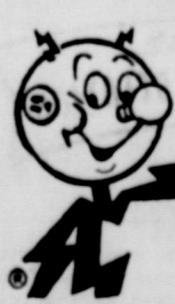

### Why Not, Indeed?

The Shah of Iran is a most interesting personality. Inasmuch as in his position as perhaps the world's only absolute monarch, he is quite open to press interviews.

In a recent TV interview he announced that probably in September the oil producing nations will again raise their prices on crude.

This means that with the dollar a barrel U. S. import duty plus the planned gasoline tax, many small business enterprises could be hurt.

A survey conducted by Family Associates for the National Federation of Independent Business shows that motor fuel is the biggest energy expense encountered by small and independent business.

But this seems to be significant. The Shah took the position that oil prices cannot be considered too high. If they are, he asked, why are not the industrialized nations doing more to open up other energy resources such as coal, nuclear energy, solar energy and other forms? This is a very tough question to answer.

Traditionally, in a free economy, when one commodity has become too expensive, a substitute is developed.

Yet despite all the fuss and storm raised in Washington over the need for more energy, so far, inasmuch as anyone can discern, nothing concrete has been accomplished to develop alternate sources.

In fact, in California, next year there will go on the ballot an initiative which if voted into existence, would stop the installation of new nuclear generating plants and in all probability close down the three that are currently operating.

The head of this drive, in a TV interview, came up with a startling rationale. He said he felt that electricity, no matter what its source, eliminates manpower, therefore he does not feel that it is in the public interest to develop electricity.

As an absolute monarch, he does not understand the working of a democracy.

It would indeed be interesting to see what would happen to any environmental group that demonstrated against his plans. Such a group would undoubtedly find the environment quite unhealthy personally.
