429 Students Enrolled Here On Opening Day

Cross Plains schools opened Monday morning with a first day enrollment of 429 students. That count included kindergarten and the 12 grades.

That was an increase of 21 students over first-day headcount for the 1974-75 school year, and five more than was on hand for the first day of classes beginning the 1973-74 session.

Of the total enrollment, 169 students were registered in high school, and 260 in kindergarten and the first eight grades. Largest class in school opening day was the freshman class with 51, and runner-up was the sophomore class with 48 students. Largest elementary class was the eighth grade with 35.

Superintendent Frank E. Rundell furnished the following

breakdown on enrollment, as provided by Principals Scot H. Edington, high school, and Arthur Boyle, elementary school: kindergarten 27, first grade 31, second grade 28, third grade 28, fourth grade 19, fifth grade 28, sixth grade 31, seventh

grade 33, eighth grade 35, freshmen 51, sophomores 48, juniors 34 and seniors 36.

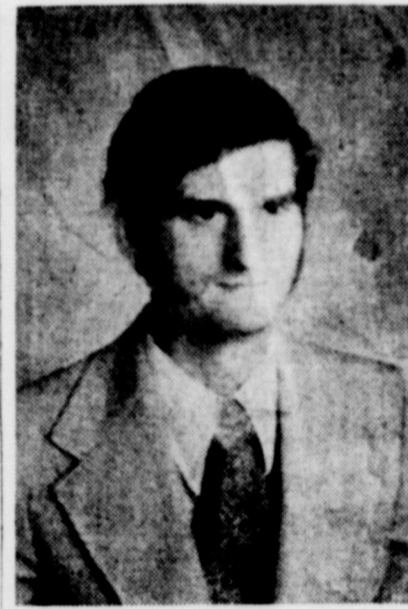
Nixon of Cross Plains, newsletter editor.

Week End Rain Shower Totals Vary Widely

Showers in the Cross Plains area during the past week ended dumped widely varying amounts of moisture. The showers could temporarily flood one area while a short distance away only a sprinkle was received.

In the Rowden area it was reported that on Friday and Saturday moisture totals in the northern part of the community ranged between two and three inches, while south of Highway 36 less than a half-inch was recorded.

Most of the moisture received in this section fell on Saturday and Sunday.

Cross Plains got .95 of an inch on Saturday and only a few drops fell Sunday afternoon.

The Edwin Erwin place in the Sabanno community gauged .80 of an inch on Saturday and another .40 on Sunday. Burkett got .70 on Saturday. About .50 of an inch was reported in the Pioneer sector in showers falling on the two days.

Cottonwood area received 1.50 to 2.00 inches on Saturday and a sprinkle on Sunday. The Roy Tatum place at Atwell got 1.00 during the week end, and measurements varied in the Cross Cut sector from .20 to .60.

Saturday's .95 in Cross Plains brings the total for August to 2.71 inches in Cross Plains. Aggregate for the year stood at 15.41 inches.

Callahan Auto Population Growing Survey Indicates

Callahan County is a highly motorized community and is getting more so all the time, a recent survey shows.

Even though local residents have cut down sharply during the last year or two on purchases of new cars, because of general economic conditions there are more cars in use now than there were five years ago.

As a result, the car density in the area as well as the number of families with two or more cars in their driveways, is greater than ever.

The overall effect has been more parking problems and heavier congestion, an increase in gas consumption and pollution, and more money spent for maintenance and service, especially so because people are trying to prolong the lives of their cars as much as possible. Their average age is now nearly 5.9 years.

The expenditure in local service stations alone, for gas, oil, repairs and incidentals added up in the past year to \$2,865,000. By way of comparison, five years ago it was \$1,889,000.

The figures show that there were 142 passenger cars in use in Callahan County per 100 families at the beginning of this year, a relatively high ratio.

Elsewhere in the West South Central States it was 140 per 100.

There has been a steady rise throughout the country in multiple car ownership, the Census Bureau reports. Its latest finding is that 34 per cent of the households in the United States have two or more cars.

The increase is attributed, to a large extent, to the progressive movement of population from urban areas, where the automobile is the basic means of transportation.

In Callahan County, at the start of this year, automobile registrations came to 4,630, as against the 1970 total of 4,210.

It represented a net increase in the five-year period, after allowing for the number of cars that were scrapped, of 9.9 per cent.
