United Fund Drive Reaches For Goal

Cross Plains United Fund was reaching for the \$3,000 goal on Tuesday.

Contributions totaled \$2,963.65, according to drive officials and Citizens State Bank employees who are tabulating donations. That total leaves just

\$36.35 yet to be raised to reach the goal.

It was noted by drive chairman Mrs. Raymond DeBusk and Rev. Curtis Simpson, acting president of the Area United Fund, that it is believed that at least two local businesses,

which have headquarters outside the city, have pledged sufficient amount to surpass the goal. Checks have not yet arrived from those concerns, it was thought here Tuesday.

The campaign was begun on Thursday, Oct. 9, with a door-to-door canvass of Cross Plains, surrounding countryside and neighboring communities by about 60 volunteer workers, headed by Mrs. DeBusk and Mrs. Frank Ferrell. Aggregate raised that day was \$2,512.00.

On Tuesday of last week the total had increased to \$2,736.65, and since that time another \$277.00 has been turned in for the \$2,963.65 figure.

Mrs. DeBusk, Mrs. Ferrell and Rev. Simpson again expressed sincere appreciation to each donor for the generous gifts, and especially praised the volunteers for their fine job.

Budgeted total for the coming year of the Cross Plains Area United Fund is \$3,300, but it was explained that the \$300 difference in goal and budget is to be absorbed by unallocated funds which had accumulated over the years.

Funds for the current drive have been budgeted for disbursement as follows: West Texas Rehabilitation Center \$800, M. D. Anderson Tumor Institute \$600, American Red Cross \$200, The Southwestern Diabetic Foundation \$100, Cub Scouts \$100, Christmas Cheer \$300, local and transient relief \$500 and unallocated funds resigned to cover Boy and Girl Scout programs if active \$400.

Donations to the fund will still be accepted at Citizens State Bank in Cross Plains.

Care Fund Proposed For Cemetery At Baird

NEW OILER IS FINALED IN SOUTH CLYDE AREA

Callahan County Regular Field has gained a new well in the area eight miles south of Clyde. It is H. C. Oil Co. of Baird 12-A J. W. Evans, spotting 1,588 feet from the north and 150 feet from the west lines of Section 1, Block 2, SP Survey.

Daily potential was seven barrels of 40 gravity oil, plus 60 barrels of water. It is pumping from an open hole fractured with five sacks of sand.

Operator set the 4 1/2-inch casing at 1,040 feet, top of the pay. Total depth is 1,044 feet.

Some folks are saying the most amazing thing about the Beafalo may be that it's the only breed on record more than one-half bull. Most cattlemen agree the new breed may hold a lot of promise for the industry but many of them are hedging their predictions with a wait-and-see attitude. Founder of the breed, Bud Basolo, got everybody's attention last year by announcing the sale of a Beafalo bull for two and a half million dollars. And a lot of those first in line to begin raising the California-spawned breed are quick to praise the animals for rapid gain on basically forage rations, hardy adaptation to sparse land and nutritious meat. One of the problems is an extensive study done in Canada on an earlier beafalo cross which showed poor results. Promoters of the American breed say those problems were all solved with today's Beafalo which is one-quarter Hereford, three-eighths Charolais and three-eighths Buffalo.

A Marble Falls well has been completed as No. 3-B H. C. Williams by Sioux Natural Gas Corp. of Brownwood five miles southeast of Cross Cut.

It spots 2,205 feet from the north and 3,320 feet from the east lines of John Beck Survey 792.

It has an absolute, open flow of 7,000 cubic feet of dry gas daily from perforations at 2,774 to 2,801 feet. The pay was treated with 750 gallons of acid. Operator set the 4 1/2-inch casing at 2,860 feet, total depth.

Burkett Neighborhood News

Who on this God created earth appreciates a beautiful broomweed.

No, not the stock or grain farmers. They detest the take-over of this weed in the fields and pastures.

The cattle don't seem to venture out into the weeds to look for grass. So who likes them? Who can stand and admire and appreciate a broomweed?

Ill tell you. It's a wood gatherer.

There are weeds growing all over West Texas that are of no use to anyone but the person who is in this profession.

Once you become involved you will never look at a weed without seeing it's natural beauty. Then you find yourself culling and grading each stalk one against another until you find the perfect ones.

Broomweeds to most folks are just broomweeds, but to a gatherer there are different grades. Some are kind of fern-like they are bushy and thin at the top and when dried will not have much foliage left. Others are like a large umbrella at the top and covered with small yellow blooms, they stand on a sturdy stalk and its branches are heavy in foliage. This type broomweed is important to the gatherer as they are heavy with weight and the price paid for the bundle is by its weight.

I might be getting ahead of myself, so let's go back and I'll tell you what broomweed is used for, and when the season is for gathering and how it is done.

The broomweed is usually the backbone for other flowers in an arrangement of dried flowers and is also used to fill in where needed.

They are used in natural color or dyed to any bright, beautiful colors to fit the season.

Some years the weed barn at Novice runs short on broomweeds so gatherers are called in when the blooms open fully and the weed is green.

Other times they can make the supply last until frost and then the gatherers are called. The season then runs from frost until some time in March.

The lighter in weight the weed the higher the price, so all balances out.

A person who works in the weeds can make as much as he or she wishes to according to how hard and fast he or she will work.

I use my hands to break the stem about three inches above the ground, taking my hand and using the middle finger and thumb to snap the stem. After snapping the weed from the root, I place the bushy part of the plant under my arm leaving the stem sticking out, never raising up I snap another place it under the arm. I continue this in rhythm until I have a load, usually around four pounds if the weeds are fairly dry. Then I place the broomweed between my knees with the stems to the front and the bush to the back. I loop binder twine around the stems twice pulling them tight with the last loop and put a knot called, I think, a half-hitch.

Then pile the weeds in stacks to be loaded on the truck after the day is over. If you liked to pick cotton or pull bolls you would like to work in the weeds as this is what it reminds me of. It just pays me a little better as I never could fill a cotton sack very fast. I have made as high as \$25 a day working in the broomweed and that was for about six hours work. Many other ladies have made as high

as \$50 and \$60 working from early to last sight of sun. But then they had a mower cut the weed and then they picked them up.

I never chose this way as I could gather best being able to see the perfect weed from the fern type, as they waved in the wind.

I can tell the world that the hands and fingers take quite a beating and there were times when you would think they would drop off your arm, but just soak them in hot water and you'll be ready to hit the field the next morning.

My trailer would hold about 900 pounds of weeds and about every fourth day I would drive from Trent, where I lived, to Novice and unload my trailer. I sure would get some stares from passers-by when they crained their necks to see for sure if their eyes were seeing right. They would kind of grin a silly grin and possibly say to themselves, broomweed? My word. Didn't you know there is gold in those weeds growing in your pastures?

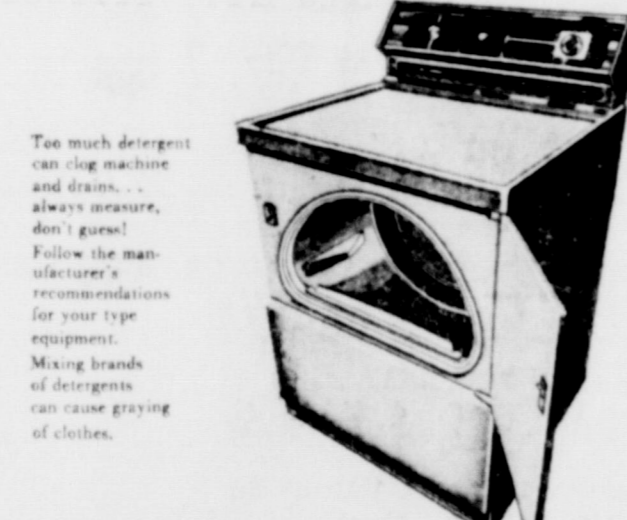

HOW TO STUDY THE BIBLE . . . Continued

In trying to visualize the Bible as a whole, one should keep in mind the four sub-divisions of the New Testament. Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John are the "books of testimony." These were written to convince men that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of the Living God. Acts of Apostles, the book of history, is the book of conversion. It was written to convert. The twenty-one epistles are the "books of edification." These were written to confirm. The Revelation is the book of encouragement. It was written to console.

In addition to maintaining a good mental picture of the Bible as a whole, one should strive to have a mental picture of each book of the Bible. If one is studying the book of Genesis, he should read the book all the way through several times. If at all possible, the whole book should be read at one sitting. One should strive to ascertain from the contents of the book its purpose and its outline. Let me suggest to you a "Skeleton Outline of Genesis." The purpose of Genesis is, to show the beginning and early development of the scheme of Redemption. Its Roman Numeral points are: **first**, From the creation to Abraham, 1:1-11:26; **second**, the life of Abraham, 11:27-25:10; **third**, the life of Isaac, Gen. 25:11-26:35; **fourth**, the life of Jacob, Gen. 27:1-36:43; **fifth**, the life of Joseph, Gen. 37:1-50:26.

One should study the Bible as he would study a beautiful painting: he should consider the whole, and then consider the parts.

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service is cooperating in offering 18 Tax Planning Workshops across the state through Greg Gertrug, County Agent.


Nearest workshop will be in Comanche on November 4 and 5 or November 18 in San Angelo. Classes are specifically for tax practitioners extensively with farmers.
