## Beef Cattle Health, Feeding Meet Slated

Local ranchers and beef producers are invited to attend a meeting on winter supplemental feeding and beef cattle health to be held Tuesday, Nov. 25, at 7:30 p.m. in the County Courtroom at Baird.

Dr. Delmer Davis, Area Livestock Specialist from Fort Stockton, and Dr. Rob Harle, a veterinarian from Baird and Clyde are scheduled to appear on the program. Greg Gerngross, county agent, advises.

Davis will discuss supplemental feeding on various classes of beef cattle. High cost of feed and short pastures make this subject one of much concern to producers this year.

Dr. Harle will discuss various livestock diseases including Vibriosis, Leptospirosis, Black's disease, Blackleg and Onchocerciasis. A herd health program will be discussed by Harle. Everyone is invited to attend the beef cattle meeting.

An upset minded Herd of Cross Plains Buffaloes finally bowed to the Bangs Dragons 13-12 Friday night in the District 10-A season ending contest for both teams.

The loss dropped the Herd's conference mark to 2-4 and a fifth place finish in the seven team loop. Bangs was third with a 3-2-1 record. On the season Cross Plains compiled a 3-6-1 record.

Three Buffs played their last football for Cross Plains. They are Joe Simpson, Ronnie Scott and Greg Turner, all outstanding all season. Joe Kemp is the other member of the Herd, but he was injured in the first game of the season, and could not return. Head Coach Donnie McMillian noted that all the seniors will be missed next season, but added fine players are coming up to fill those positions.

Commenting on the final game, McMillian said that the entire team "played a good ball game."

Taking the position of Route 1 carrier will be Wayne Dennis of Cross Plains. His appointment as a rural carrier will become effective on Saturday. He has been serving as a substitute carrier since April 1973, and has been working on Route 2.

McCord became regular rural carrier in February as a sub-

stitute carrier, beginning in 1952.

Mrs. Billie Kelly of Cottonwood will become substitute carrier on Route 2. She formerly was a substitute on Route 1.

Route 2 covers a distance of just over 111 miles, and includes Route 1 out of the Burkett Post Office. Route 1 is 75.2 miles in length.

Only changes involved in Route re-alignment is personnel. Service schedule will remain the same as in the past.

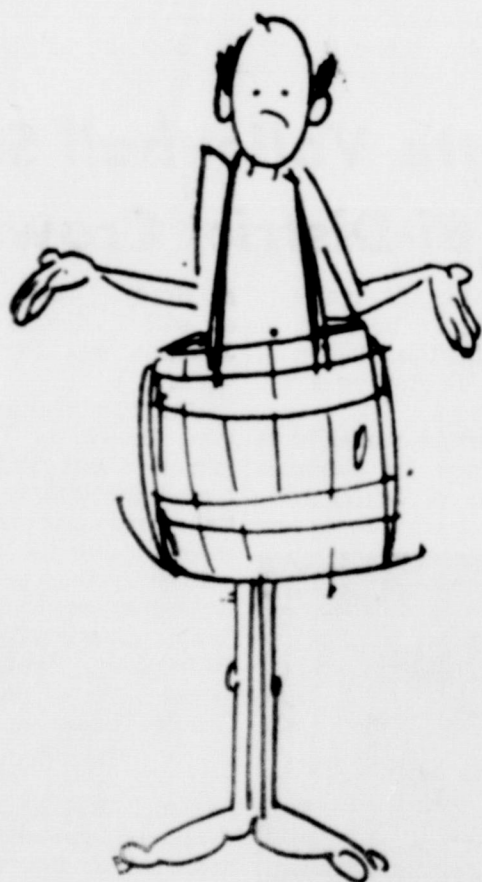

He served three times as president of the Steeplechase Club of which he was the first president, and also was the first president of the Fort Worth Children's Museum, now the Museum of Science and History.

Mr. Compton was a member of First Presbyterian Church, River Crest Country Club, and the Texas & Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association.

Survivors are his wife, the former Miss Josephine Orr, a daughter of Mrs. Thomas Cochran, and a granddaughter, Kimberly Cochran.


