Cross Plains Gives \$447.50 Junior Livestock Show

Cross Plains business people gave \$447.50 to help meet expenses for the Callahan County Junior Livestock Show drive conducted here. The annual junior livestock show will be held Friday, Jan. 16 and 17, at a barn a mile north of Cross Plains.

High School Cagers Drop Last 5 Games

Two varsity basketball teams at Cross Plains High School have been defeated in five consecutive outings.

The loss string began Tuesday of last week when host Dublin girls defeated Buffettes 60-37 in first District 10-A action. Local managed just eight points in each of the first three periods, trailing by 23 points after the trio of quarters.

Edith Ingram hooped 15 points to pace the Buffettes attack. Other local scorers were Leslie Wyatt 14, Bobra Dillard 4 and Sandy Bailey and Melissa Pancake 2 each. Miss Baker led Dublin with 22 points.

Buffettes and Bisons lost two consecutive contests each in Baird tournament last week end. Thursday night both local units bowed to Baird. Buffettes lost a 49-25 decision, trailing by 11 points after first eight minutes. Miss Wyatt paced local scoring with 19. Buffaloes scored only two points in the first quarter against Baird and trailed 19-2 after eight minutes eventually losing 65-28. Greg Turner and Monty Richards each had 12 points for the Herd.

In second round elimination Friday Eula girls blasted Buffettes 55-21. Eula jumped to a 28-8 halftime advantage. Miss Wyatt had 6 points to lead Buffettes scoring. Buffaloes bowed in the second half to Alban 49-29. The two teams were deadlocked 17-17 at intermission. Dennis Franke was top scorer for Cross Plains with 12 points.

2 Die In 3-Vehicle Crash In Rowden Area Friday

Two persons were killed in a three-vehicle accident in the Rowden locality, about one-fourth mile west of the Highway 36 Truck Stop, at 6:15 p.m. Friday.

Dead were a Houston couple, Donald William Martin, 49, and his wife, Kathryn Carlyle Martin, 47. They died when the top of their 1975 Oldsmobile was sheared off in hitting a flatbed trailer which was sitting across Highway 36. Mrs. Martin was driving.

The truck was driven by Rito Lopez Rosales, 43, of Idalou. He was not injured in the mishap. The Rosales truck and a 1969 Ford, driven by Jose Martinez, 27, of Lubbock had collided before the Martin car crashed into the wreckage, according to Don Gosnell, Department of Public Safety patrolman of Cross Plains.

It was reported that the Martinez car collided with the rear of the truck as both were headed west. The Martin auto was east-bound, it was explained.

Martinez and his mother, Trinidad Martinez, 53, passenger, were treated and released from an Abilene hospital Friday night. Another passenger in the Martinez car, Joe Louis Zormaz, 4 of Lubbock was not hurt.

Bodies of Mr. and Mrs. Martin were taken to a Baird funeral home until other arrangements were made.

Assisting Gosnell in investigating the mishap was Patrolman Benny Callaway of this city, and several other peace officers from Baird and Eastland.

The accident scene was just west of intersection of State Highway 36 and U. S. Highway 283 where a Brownwood youth was killed in a two-vehicle wreck on November 29.

BAIRD RAILROAD DEPOT MAY BE CLOSED DEC. 20
Closing of the Texas & Pacific Railroad Depot in Baird is reported forthcoming soon. Unofficial confirmation of the closing on Saturday, Dec. 20, was announced last week.

Only four persons are currently employed at the Baird station at which only "local" trains now stop, only about one every other day from Fort Worth and Big Spring.

Compromise Likely In Peanut Program

A compromise on peanut program for coming years looms a near certainty. The following article explains projected possibilities and reasons for steps to be proposed.

According to Ross Wilson of Gorman, Secretary National Peanut Growers Group, a new round of discussions between growers, congressional leaders and USDA personnel may lead to a compromise agreement for modification of the peanut price support program.

Wilson stated that a subcommittee of the National Peanut Growers met with House Speaker Carl Albert, House Agriculture Committee Chairman Thomas Foley, Committee Vice Chairman W. R. Poage and Representative Dawson Mathis, Chairman of the House Agriculture Subcommittee For Oilseeds and Rice on December 9. Senate Agriculture Committee Chairman Herman Talmadge was represented in the session by a staff member.

Growers raised two principal questions with members of Congress. First, Congressional opinion was sought as to whether now is the time to seek legislative program changes.

Second, growers asked whether all factions—growers, shellers, manufacturers and USDA must be in general support of legislation.

Solons advised that now is the time to prepare legislation aimed at reducing program costs. The consensus on question number two is that broad general support of all industry segments and USDA will most likely be needed to pass legislation. From previous discussions with USDA it had been assumed that two items were non-negotiable—(1) substantial reduction of allotment acreage and (2) unlimited production of peanuts for crushing and export.

A meeting with USDA officials following the session with Congressmen proved that assumption to be correct.

Congressmen pointed to the need for either passing legislation or having it moved through Committees and ready for House consideration by mid-May of next year in order to avoid the probability of refusal by the House to appropriate funds for the peanut program during debate on the Agriculture Appropriations Bill. The Congressmen expressed this fear even though it is conceded that the present USDA peanut sales policy was almost solely responsible for the high 1974 peanut crop cost and it appears that the same situation is being repeated in 1975.

Wilson said the peanut industry is in a corner as a result of the peanut sales policy imposed in 1974 by Secretary Butz. It appears that 1974 crop cost may reach \$150 million and 1975 crop cost is projected to far exceed the total for 1974. Most industry leaders agree, he said, that cost of the 1974 operation could have been as small as \$10 million under the traditional method of selling CCC peanuts by competitive bids. Growers, he said, would be willing to take substantial acreage reduction in order to bring supply in line with demand and reduce program cost—but USDA will not support this approach. The Department insists that the acreage reduction be accompanied by a provision permitting unlimited production of peanuts for crushing and export by both allotment and non-allotment growers. Peanut product manufacturers and shellers also insist on the so-called "open-end" feature of unlimited production, in the event of a sizeable reduction of allotment acreage.

Congressmen advise there is no need of attempting to pass a bill calling solely for a reduction of allotment acreage to reduce cost of the program. They agree there is little doubt that President Ford would veto such a bill. Valuable time would be lost in such an effort in the opinion of legislative sources.

The Association Manager said in order to give as much protection as possible to peanut allotment holders, to restore much needed stability to the industry and to bring about program modifications that will permit a compromise with the administration.

Third-class rate (single piece)—up to 2 ounces, 13c; over 2 to 4 ounces, 24c; over 4 to 6 ounces, 34c; over 6 to 8 ounces, 45c; over 8 to 10 ounces, 56c; over 10 to 12 ounces, 66c; over 12 to 14 ounces, 77c; over 14 to 15.99 ounces, 88c.

Fourth-class rates—all fourth-class mail rates have been increased, consult local postmaster.
Airmail letter rates to Canada and Mexico—17c first ounce; 15c each additional ounce.
Airmail post and postal card rate to Canada and Mexico—14c each.

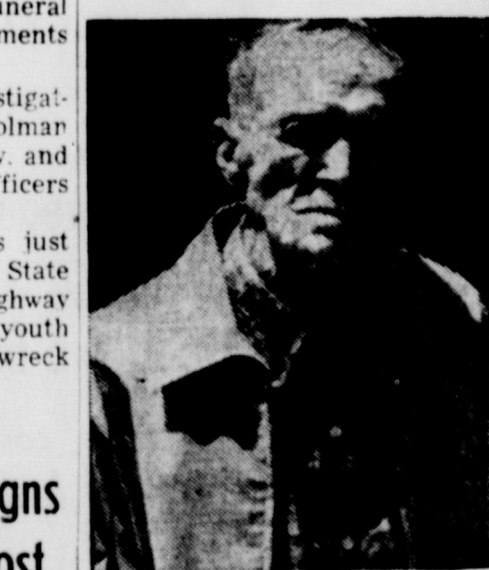
Shooting fireworks in the city limits is prohibited, but Hornsby also cautioned about the extremely dry grass being more flammable this season.

HOW TO STUDY THE BIBLE ... Continued

Number 10, Bible Study By Word, Continued.

In Gal. 6:1 Paul says, "Brethren, even if a man be overtaken in any trespass, ye who are spiritual, restore such a one in a spirit of gentleness; looking to thyself, lest thou also be tempted". Please note carefully the word "restore". Christians are commanded to "restore" those who have gone astray. "Restore" is the translation of the Greek word "katartidzo". In Mt. 4:21 the Record says, "And going on from thence he saw two other brethren, James the son of Zebedee, and John his brother, in the boat with Zebedee their father, mending their nets; and he called them". James and John were mending their nets. The nets were torn. Something had happened that caused their nets to be torn. Before continuing their work it was necessary that their nets be repaired or "mended". The word "mending" in this passage and the word "restore" in Gal. 6:1 are the same Greek word, the word "katartidzo". When a brother or sister goes astray the spiritual nets are torn, and the nets must be mended — for the sake of the one who has gone astray, and for the sake of the effectiveness and influence of the congregation.

COLEMAN C.T.O. OFFICE GETS FEDERAL GRANT

Congressman Omar Burleson has announced the approval of a \$32,814 Community Services Administration grant to Central Texas Opportunities, Inc. at Coleman, serving Callahan, Coleman, Concho, McCulloch, Runnels and Brown Counties.

Peanut Program

Education and anti-farm program members of Congress, the National Peanut Growers Group is considering emergency 2-year legislation that would include the following:

1. Reduction of allotment acreage of 12 percent annually for 2 years.

2. Support for within-quota of 70 percent of parity (net) with no deductions for storage, handling and inspection.

3. Unlimited production to be restricted to crushing and export.

4. Excess production would be supported at not more than 90 percent of the world market price as determined by USDA.

5. All excess peanuts would move through area grower association channels (Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association) in order to insure efficient administration of the program.

6. A "snap back" provision calling for reversion to the present program at the end of 2 crop years in case of expiration of this legislation.

Growers are in complete agreement that peanuts will not adapt to a target price plan which would offer no protection of consequence to allotment holders and would all but wipe out the substantial investments present growers hold in land and equipment. Although the open-ended feature of the plan under consideration is very distasteful to growers, this approach in its entirety is far superior to the target concept or no program at all.
