






Changes In Student S.S. Benefits Told

Recent legislation made a num her of changes in Social Security. benefits. One change affects college and other post-secondary students between the ages of 18 and 22 who are receiving benefits on the record of a retired, deceased or disabled parent. A post-secondary school is a college, university, or approved vocational school.

Under the oid law, these students could receive Social Security cenefits as long as they were full-time students, unmarried, and under age 22. The new law is gradually phasing out these benefits. By April 1985, the only students eligible for benefits will be those under age 19 in a high school, junior high school or elementary school. Children under age 13 will continue to receive benefits regardless of their student status
