

Area's United Fund Climbs Above Goal

Cross Plains Area United Fund has once again surpassed its goal. Citizens State Bank officials reported at mid-day Tuesday a total of \$4,299.08 credited to the UF account since the campaign opened just over two weeks ago.

More than 50 volunteers fanned out over Cross Plains and surrounding countryside and communities and brought in just over 93 per cent of the budgeted \$4,000.00 goal on Friday, Oct. 1, and next three days. Contributions slowed after the house-to-house canvass, but the drive chairperson, Mrs. Raymond (Veda) DeBusk, along with United Fund President Dale Bishop, expressed confidence that the goal would soon be reached. Mrs. DeBusk said that Cross Plains has always faced and met challenges head-on and would again. The 107.4 percentage of the goal raised is proof of her belief.

Mrs. DeBusk and Bishop again thanked the volunteer workers and the donors for their generosity.

The \$4,000.00 budget is apportioned as follows: West Texas Re-

habilitation Center \$1,300, M. D. Anderson Hospital Tumor Institute \$700, American Red Cross \$200, Salvation Army \$200, Texas Mental Health Association \$100, Southwestern Diabetic Foundation \$200, Christmas Cheer \$300, local and transient relief \$600 and unallocated \$400.

Mountaineers Disappoint Bison Homecomers 25-6

Santa Anna Mountaineers disappointed a large homecoming crowd Saturday night at Buffalo Stadium in pinning a 25-6 loss on the Thundering Herd in a District 8-A gridiron squabble.

Turnovers proved fatal to the Bisons as the visiting Mountaineers scored after three of the misques. Buffaloes fumbled 10 times, according to local statistics, losing half of them and throwing one interception.

Although Santa Anna also came up with some turnovers, they did not prove costly, as the Mountaineers twice took quick advantage of a Buffalo fumble.

The Herd got the first break early in the game when Ronald Hilburn intercepted a Santa Anna pass deep in Mountaineer territory. Bisons quickly fumbled the pigskin into the end zone. After Santa Anna scored, the Bisons fumbled the kickoff and Santa Anna scored again and took an 18-0 lead to the dressing room at intermission. Santa Anna's third score after recovering a fumble at mid-field.

Santa Anna's second half tally came on a long march, and conversion kick was good tacking the extra point on for a 23-0 advan-

age. Cross Plains got on the scoreboard on a 25-yard pass from Quarterback Dennis Koenig to Left End Hilburn with about 2 minutes left in the game. The drive covered about 55 yards. Key play of the drive was a long pass from Koenig to Right End Mike Newman.

Brodie Stark scored three of Santa Anna's touchdowns, and Tommy DeLeon got the other. For the Herd Koenig passed for 34 yards, and he rushed for 60. Tommy Johnson had 50 for the Bisons. Hilburn intercepted two Santa Anna aerials and Matthew Burleson swiped one.

As a team Santa Anna rolled up 20 first downs to 12 for Cross Plains and the visitors netted 220 yards rushing, plus 25 passing while Bisons made 12 first downs on 125 on the ground and 84 through the air.

The Thundering Herd will travel to Evant Friday for a 7:30 p.m. District 8-A encounter with the Elks. Reportedly Friday's hosts were 3-2 on the season, but had also lost to Goldthwaite, league leader, by a somewhat larger score than the Buffs absorbed at the hands of the Eagles.

Proposed Amendments Are Explained Briefly

Editor's Note: Following are the fourth and fifth parts of a six-part series concerning proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution, giving arguments for and against their adoption at the general election November 2. This information was provided through the courtesy of State Representative Joe C. Hanna of Breckenridge, who represents Callahan County. The study was done by the Texas Legislative Council.

AMENDMENT NO. 4
"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide terms not to exceed four years for members of governing boards of certain water districts and conservation and reclamation districts."

Arguments for:
1) Under current constitutional provisions requiring two-year terms for directors, districts are required to hold directors' elections every year or every two years. The frequency of these elections places a severe financial burden on some districts, particularly those in rural areas. The adoption of four-year terms would allow districts to reduce substantially the cost of directors' elections by holding the elections less frequently.

2) Voter interest in many water district and other conservation and reclamation district directors' elections is very low. It is alleged that part of this voter apathy results from the frequency of elections. The adoption of the proposed amendment would provide less frequent elections, which should generate more voter participation.

3) A two-year term is a very short period in which to develop expertise and efficiency on the part of members of a governing board. Adoption of up to four-year terms would allow members to serve long enough to become familiar with the operation of the district and to contribute to more knowledgeable and efficient administration and decision making.

Arguments Against:
1) Event though directors' elections may be of considerable expense to a district, the financial cost to the district cannot be as great as the value of the voters and taxpayers of assuring that members of the governing board will be responsive to their needs and desires through frequent elections.

2) There are times when a member of a governing board does not adequately serve his district because of illness, lack of interest or incompetence. Frequent elections to brief two-year terms provide the voters with a means to assure that those persons unable or unfit to serve on the board can be expeditiously replaced. Adoption of four-year terms will seriously reduce this power of the voters.

3) Water districts and other conservation and reclamation districts have operated since the turn of the century under the two-year term limitation for directors and do not appear to have suffered any major negative effects as a result of the limitation. Therefore, the adoption of four-year terms would not seem to be vital to continue efficient operation of these districts.

AMENDMENT NO. 5
"The constitutional amendment to abolish the office of county treasurer in Tarrant and Bee counties."

Arguments for:
1) Allowing the voters of Tarrant and Bee counties to decide for themselves whether the separate elective office of county treasurer serves their needs is in the best tradition of local self-government.

2) Merging the offices of treasurer and auditor will eliminate wasteful overlapping of functions and save scarce county revenue—a particularly worthy objective in difficult financial times such as these.

3) The idea of an appointive officer serving as treasurer of a

State Capital HIGHLIGHTS

Round two of the heavyweight debates between Republican Gov. Bill Clements and Attorney General Mark White, his Democratic challenger, could almost have been described as "gentlemanly" if you ignore Clements calling White "incompetent" and White implying that Clements is insensitive to the plight of the unemployed.

White and Clements met face to face for the second time in the campaign last week in the studios of Austin's KVUE-TV, an ABC affiliate.

In comparison to their first meeting in Amarillo, the Austin debate was tame.

In the Amarillo encounter, Clements and White traded jobs over Clements' use of a 19-year-old drunk driving charge against White and White's complaints about mudslinging. The two even got embroiled in a shouting match afterwards.

At the Austin event, however, the two gubernatorial contenders stuck pretty much to the issues and avoided personal confrontations to the point of refusing to shake hands and entering and exit-

ing the studios by different doors. Education, utility rates, highways and the recession were the main issues stressed by the candidates, with White getting in continuous attacks at Clements for being insensitive to the 600,000 Texans who are out of work.

White also blasted the Public Utility Commission for being anti-consumer and opposed any increase in state gasoline taxes which support highway maintenance and construction. Clements indicated he would sign a tax increase bill if passed by the Legislature in 1983.

White seemed to have Clements on the defensive most of the evening, but both men claimed victory afterward.

Clements claimed a poll conducted by Houston pollster Lance Larrance immediately after the debate showed Clements had won by a margin of 59 percent to 33 percent, with the remainder declaring a draw or being undecided.

White countered with a poll of his own showing 31 percent thought he won and only 20 percent were unsure or thought neither had the edge, White said.

Treasurer's Race

And while Clements and White continued their verbal battle, some of the lesser statewide races also were heating up, particular the state treasurer's race.

Allen Clark, the GOP candidate for state treasurer, announced the names of some 300 top-level banking executives who have endorsed his campaign.

Clark is opposing former Travis County Commissioner Ann Richards for the treasurer's post. Richards led incumbent Treasurer Warren G. Harding in the May Democratic primary and then gained the nomination after Harding dropped out of the runoff under fire for using state employees in his reelection campaign.

Clark and Richards have been waging one of the more interesting—even if little noticed—campaigns of this political season. If Richards is elected, she would be the first woman to hold a statewide office in Texas since Miriam "Ma" Ferguson was elected to her second term as governor in 1933 and the first woman ever to truly be elected in her own right.

Clark, on the other hand, is a much-decorated Vietnam veteran who had both legs amputated below the knee after being wounded in a mortar attack. He walks without crutches on artificial legs.

Clark and Richards, who had a debate of their own, have made the most of what few issues there are in the race, with Clark stressing his financial management background and Richards her experience as an elected official.

Clark is considered to be one of the GOP's best hopes to upset the Democrats, but has operated from a severe name identification problem since entering the race late.

Judicial Selection

A special House committee studying the method by which Texans elected their judges has recommended that a screening commission be set up to determine whether candidates for state appellate court posts truly have the qualifications needed to make good judges.

After heated disagreement over the exact role and authority the proposed screening commission should have, members of the Select Committee on Judicial Selection reached a compromise agreement that the proposed panel would render judgment on whether a candidate is "qualified" or "unqualified" but those deemed unqualified would not be excluded from the ballot.

There has been considerable support for setting up some type of screening system or merit selection of judges since former Supreme Court Justice Don Yarbrough was convicted of perjury several years ago.

Supreme Court Justice Joe Greenhill, who recently announced his resignation, has been one of the staunchest supporters of merit selection of judges.

The committee's recommendation will go to the Legislature next January when the 68th Session convenes.

Rustling Charges

Texas lawmakers over the past few years have been finding themselves the subject of some fairly bizarre criminal charges.

First it was Longview Rep. Mike Martin who pleaded guilty to perjury and resigned from office after

allegedly having himself shot to gain political support.

Now, Bonham Rep. David London has been charged with cattle rustling.

London, who, like Martin, was a freshman lawmaker during the 1981 session, was indicted by an East Texas grand jury for allegedly stealing five head of cattle from a Wills Point farmer.

The farmer reported to Var Zandt County sheriff's deputies that someone broke into his barn and stole three cows and two steers.

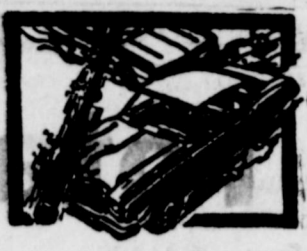
Investigators said London cashed a check for the cattle following an auction in Sulphur Springs.

London, who was expected to turn himself in to authorities, could face a sentence of from two to 10 years and a fine up to \$5,000 on the third degree felony.

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- Q. When was the last time you raised retail electric rates?
 A. WTU has had only three rate increases in its history, while it has lowered rates 14 times. The last increase was February, 1982, and it amounted to an average of just over 8 percent.
- Q. Why is WTU having to raise its rates again so soon?
 A. The rate relief granted to us by the cities and the Public Utility Commission of Texas last time proved inadequate. It did not keep up with the cost of additional plant, inflation and high interest rates. Our revenues have not provided an adequate rate of return.
- Q. What are other utilities doing about rates?
 A. Without exception, all electric utilities are having to increase their rates. Some have been filing rate cases every year. Bill comparisons reported by the Public Utility Commission of Texas show that WTU's rates are second lowest among investor-owned utilities in Texas.
- Q. Why are you building a big new plant? Isn't energy use declining?
 A. Energy use in WTU service area is growing. This summer our peak demand reached 994 megawatts. Our current generating capacity is 1,054 megawatts. The summer peak left us with insufficient reserve margin. We will purchase power from neighboring utilities as a stop-gap measure, but the time has come when we must expand our own generating system, if we are to continue providing service our customers are used to.
- Q. What would happen if you could not get a rate increase?
 A. The financial condition of our Company would deteriorate rapidly. Our credit rating would suffer. We would no longer be in position to attract capital at reasonable interest rates to finance necessary major construction. We would have to pay higher interest rates at the expense of our customers.

political subdivision is neither novel nor radical: most Texas cities, many of which have much larger budgets than either of the affected counties, have appointed treasurers.

Arguments Against:
1) The duties of treasurer and auditor are incompatible and should not be vested in a single officer. Merger of the positions will eliminate a needed safeguard against misapplication of county funds.

2) Elimination of a local elective office will diminish the voters' control over county government and make county government less attentive to the will of the people.

3) Although county government may need streamlining and reorganization, the piecemeal approach taken by the proposed amendment is not the answer. A thorough, statewide study should precede any attempt to alter the constitutional framework of local government.
