BANKING SYSTEM SHOWS PROGRESS

State Bank Resources Grow More Than Three Billion Dollars in a Year

NATIONAL BANKS GAIN

American Bankers Association Gives Details of Banking Institutions and Notes Stronger Condition

NEW YORK—Continued improvement in the condition of state chartered banking institutions, with an increase of more than three billion dollars in a year in total resources, is shown in a report just issued by the State Bank Division of the American Bankers Association.

The report was propared by the division's Committee on State Bank Research from data furnished by state banking departments and parallels data issued by the Comptroller of the chore similar improvements.

A year previous, tables in the report show, there were 10.644 state supervised banks, with combined resurces of \$25.850.920.00, total deposits \$27.297.055.000, loans and discounts \$13.060.033.000 and investments \$12,582.225.000.

her lay 250 eggs, nor 173 eggs. She
will lay approximately 100.
