Lynn Nabers Appointed Sesquicentennial Director

Former Texas State Representative Lynn Nabers, longtime resident of Brownwood and well known in the Cross Plains area, has been named executive director designate of the 1986 Texas Sesquicentennial Commission, Chairman Erwin Craddock announced last week following a meeting of the full commission.

Nabers will replace Randy Lee who resigned the post last week.

Lynn Nabers logged a long and distinguished career as a member of the Texas Legislature from 1968-1982. During his tenure he was named one of the top ten legislators by Texas Monthly and also by Texas Business magazine. Nabers served as chairman of the Health and Welfare Committee and also the Criminal Jurisprudence Committee.

"I am pleased to have the opportunity to participate in what I hope will be the grandest event ever held in Texas", Nabers said. "Our responsibility will be to see that the good work done toward this event moves for-

ward and to involve Texans across the state in a meaningful celebration".

"On behalf of the entire Sesquicentennial commission I want to wish Mr. Nabers the best of luck and offer our full support as we forge ahead in 1986", said Chairman Craddock.

Nabers has recently moved to Austin from Brownwood where he was a practicing attorney for many years. He became Brown County Democratic Chairman after retiring as state representative. He is still actively involved in various business in Brownwood, and he is a director of the Citizens State Bank in Cross Plains.

He is married to Mary Scott Nabers who was recently appointed by the governor to the Texas Employment Commission. Mrs. Nabers is the commissioner representing all employers in the state. The couple has two sons (Scott, a student at Baylor University and Tim, a student at Westlake High School in Austin).

TEXAS GARDENER TIPS

It's Time To Plant A Fall Garden

Many Texans think fall is the best time of year to garden in Texas and planting time for most fall crops is just around the corner. As with any gardening endeavor, though, success with a fall garden depends on proper preparation and planning, followed by good cultural care. Here are some tips for a successful fall garden.

•Free the garden soil of pests by turning it over several times before planting. As you harvest your spring crops, simply till the soil and then till again several more times during the summer.

•Select hardy, disease-resistant seeds and transplants, and pay close attention to planting dates in your area. Frost will be a concern later in the year and mature plants or seedlings are more susceptible than "teenaged" plants are.

•Fertilize and water regularly.

•Plan the location of your fall

garden to make optimal use of what little sunshine may come your way during winter.

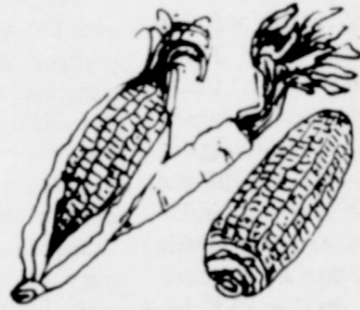
•Plant varieties that are fast maturing.

•If setting out transplants, do so late in the day when temperatures are cooler to protect the tender plants from the stress of a full day of sunshine.

•Shade your young plants, such as tomatoes, peppers, broccoli and similar crops, from the hot afternoon sun.

•Mulch your plants thoroughly to help retain moisture and keep roots cool while temperatures are hot. Mulching also will be beneficial when the temperatures begin to drop.

There are many cool-season crops which will thrive in Texas throughout much of the fall and winter, depending on where you live and what you plant. Some



crops that will do particularly well in the fall are broccoli, carrots, corn, potatoes, squash, pumpkins and all types of greens.

White Rips Feds

Governor Mark White told a Congressional hearing last week the Interior Department shortchanged Texas by some \$800 million in a seven-year dispute with coastal states over offshore oil and gas revenues.

The federal agency wants Congress to give the states a 27 percent share, but Texas, Alaska and the other states are pushing for 37.5 percent, a difference of \$1.9 billion. The Reagan Administration opposes any increase, and this issue could surface in the '86 political campaigns.

Candidacy Announced

The Republican chairman of the Texas House Energy Committee said last week he will run for the Railroad Commission seat expected to be vacated by Buddy Temple.

In his announcement, Ed Emmett said the state's trucking industry is archaic and costly, and he promised to get unsafe truck drivers off Texas highways.

He also promised to be an advocate for the oil and gas industry which he said is not overregulated.

Short Takes

Former governor Bill Clements says he is "95 percent certain" he will run again.

David Young, of Austin, who has previously run for governor and U.S. Senate, announced against Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby, complaining there's been too much government "of the lobbies, by the lobbies, and for the snobbiess."

Former Pittsburg Steeler, "Mean Joe" Green, will do radio and TV spots with Gov. Mark White, promoting academics and the no-pass, no-play rule. Green is a North Texas State University regent.

The State Board of Insurance has approved increasing homeowners rates an average of 6.7 percent statewide. The new rates will become effective Nov. 15.

a few weeks of decreased competition.

Hightower said that Texas livestock shipments to Mexico this year have already doubled the 1981 amounts.

"We see Mexico as being an economic solution to Texas. This will also help the Mexican economy develop, and for the people of Texas, a healthy Mexican economy is the best thing that could happen," Hightower said.

Other Industries

Others report that the Texas-Mexico economic connection is beginning to rebuild slowly from a Mexican slump that jarred petroleum, banking and other industries here.

With the peso devaluation, loans from Texas banks to Mexican corporations are increasing on a short-term credit basis. On the border, deposits in American banks from Mexican citizens are building.

Mexico still buys oil equipment from Texas, but gets most of its daily needs from Mexico City companies. All told, the buys from the U.S. are down some 25 to 30 percent.

The overall Texas/Mexico trade balance is still about two-to-one in our favor, but the dollar amounts are less than half, so far, of the '84 totals, hurt by the decreased buying power of the peso.

\$8 Million For Port

The state will help Galveston raise \$8 million needed to bring five Navy ships to the area, and will ask the Navy to lower the state's share for a new home port in Corpus Christi.

The Legislature committed \$25 million last session to the Corpus Christi project, but in an unexpected move, the Navy also added five ships for Galveston, if the \$8 million was available.

Last week, when Galveston failed to raise the money privately, the Navy extended the deadline.

Now state officials are exploring whether part of the original \$25 million can be directed to the Galveston proj-

AUSTIN—Texas and Mexico signed an historic trade agreement last week, one engineered by Texas Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower to sell Texas products.

The signed treaty makes Texas the first and only state to have a separate bilateral trade agreement with Mexico. Mexico will buy Texas corn, sorghum, livestock and other products if commerce proceeds as planned.

For years, especially election years, farmers and ranchers have urged the feds to shore up farm prices by adding foreign markets. As often as not, the feisty Hightower has been at the lead of such urgings.

With the treaty, our state government is not waiting on the feds anymore, but is going directly to the Mexican government. After all, it's the Texas border which is affected by peso devaluations, and which shares financial hardships with a slumping Mexican economy.

Treaty Benefits

Under terms of the treaty signed in Mexico City, a joint trade committee of 19 Texans and 19 Mexicans will be appointed to find ways to increase trade.

The trick, of course, is to keep incoming products from subverting our domestic market, but generally there has been little difference in the retail prices of Texas-grown and Mexican-grown produce. The Mexican growing season is earlier than in Texas, allowing

Sorghum Producers Face Referendum On Market

The Texas Grain Sorghum Board will be conducting a referendum in all sorghum producing counties in Texas.

Purpose of the referendum is to give all producers the opportunity to vote for or against the plan and also the election of seven directors.

If the proposition is passed, all Texas grain sorghum producers will be assessed a rate not to exceed one cent per hundred pounds for financing a program for grain sorghum market

development, disease and insect control, and research. The assessment will be collected at first point of processing or sale.

Ballots have been mailed to all producers with grain sorghum acreage and extra ballots are available from the Callahan County Extension Office, according to Greg Gerngross, County Extension Agent of Baird. Producers who have questions regarding the referendum may call toll free 1-800-692-4169.

Some Getting Social Security May Be Eligible For SSI

If you receive Social Security benefits or if payments are low and you have little or no other income and savings, you may be eligible for supplemental security income (SSI) payments. The SSI program is designed for people who are at least 65, blind, or disabled.

Both the Social Security and SSI programs are administered by the Social Security Administration, but they are not the same. Eligibility for SSI is based in part on financial need, not on work in Social Security covered employment. SSI is paid from general revenue funds, not from the Social Security taxes paid by

workers and their employers and the self-employed.

A single person may have up to \$1,600 in assets (money saved and the value of things owned) and up to \$345 a month in income and still get some SSI payments. A couple may have up to \$2,400 in assets and \$508 a month in income.

If you think you may be eligible for SSI payments, you should contact any Social Security office. Delay in doing so may cause you to lose some of the money since payments cannot be made for any time before you apply. The Abilene office is located at 142 S. Pioneer.
