The annual Callahan County Hay Show will be held October 22 at Cross Plains in the Callahan County Junior Livestock Show Barn. The show is sponsored by the Crops and Forage Committee, according to Greg Gerngross, County Extension

Hay shows provide an opportunity to compare different samples of hay and help producers evaluate what makes higher quality hay. Hay is a major portion of the roughage diet of many ruminate animals so an evaluation of food value and protein content can help growers determine hay quality more easily so that livestock can be fed according to hay value.

An individual enterting hay sample will know the value of his hay when the show is over. Samples will have a protein analysis run and be physically evaluated as to leafiness, steminess, color, foreign material and maturity.

Cost of protein analysis will be \$5. Producers who would like to enter the hay show are asked to call the County Extension Office at (915)854-1518. Entries are due by October 4.

Ranger Blanks Buffs, **Baird Due Saturday**

Host Ranger Bulldogs defeated Cross Plains Buffaloes 13-0 in a nonconference football contest Friday night. It was the second consecutive loss for the Herd in as many outings of the young season. Ranger, Class AA, is 1-1.

Buffalo Head Coach Mark Davidson said of his charges, "We didn't do as well offensively as hoped. We didn't play well, and will have to make improvements." He continued, however, that the defense played better this week.

Ranger dominated the scoreboard and statistics. The Bulldogs counted 12 first down to seven for the Bisons. The hosts amassed 130 yards rushing and 110 passing to Cross Plains' 24 yards on the ground and 93 through the air. Passing percentages were about the same, Ranger hit 7 of 21 tosses, and Buffs caught 7 of 20. The Bulldogs intercepted two Buff aerials, and the Buffaloes swiped one stray Ranger pass. Both lost four fumbles, and punts were about even, each kicking six times, Bisons averaging 31 yards, and Bulldogs owning a 34-yard mean. Cross Plains was flagged 6 times for 65 yards, and Ranger was penalized 10 times for 100

The Herd played without its starting wide receiver, Jesse Sibley, a junior, who suffered a severe lacerated knee in practice and is expected to be out four weeks.

Bisons defensive standouts were listed as Linebacker Tommy Ames, Linebacker David Wilson and Defensive End Troy Harris. Ricky White was the leading receiver with one nab for 45 yards. Davidson credited Quarterback Devin Koenig with throwing the ball pretty well, completing seven passes, and receivers dripped about four others which

could have been caught. County seat Baird Bears will be the Herd's foe this week end for homecoming. The Class AA school of longstanding opposition, is also winless in two starts this year. Last week the Bears, who have not lost to the Herd in recent times, lost to Roscoe 19-7, although outplaying the Plowboys.

Athletic Director Davidson stated, "Baird has a pretty good Ball team. They have played two good ball clubs, and we will have to play extra good to win."

The non-conference contest, last such battle of the season, will begin at 8 p.m. and will be the first home game of the season.
