Eisenhower 34th president, born in Denison, Texas, in 1890; Theodore Roosevelt 26th president, born in New York City in 1858; Statue of Liberty dedicated in 1886; John Adams, second president, born in Braintree (now Quincy), Mass. 1735.

Drug Store Transported To Arp Draws Notoriety

An old-fashioned drug store that had its beginning in Cross Plains 60 years ago and later moved to Arp, seems destined to become for East Texas what the Buckhorn Saloon was once to San Antonio.

H.D. Mitchell who ran the little drug store here during the "Roaring Twenties" in a small wooden building at the corner of Main and 7th Streets - having bought the property from the late Dr. John Tyson - is converting the legendary business into a museum. "Mitch", as he is remembered by old-timers, and his brother-in-law Earl Forbes, a Cross Plains native, are owners of the historic business. Both have long since passed ordinary retirement time but wish to keep their place intact.

The idea of making the business a museum when the two veterans quit, has become a clamor throughout East Texas. Already, people drive from distant places to visit their store. They like the nostalgia, to sit at the old fountain and sip a frosted soda, as did their forebears generations ago. It's genuine Americana, much as was the old Buckhorn Saloon in San Antonio, back when the Alamo was young. Not only are the people of Arp demanding the store be "museumized", such newspapers as the Tyler

Morning-Telegraph and the Overton Press are leading the charge.

Stepping through the big glass and wood doors to the drug store is like walking into another era. Most furniture and fixtures in the business are originals. Some of the antique cases that line the walls are 100 years old. None of the mahogany wood used to plentifully throughout the store has ever been refinished. Yet it gleams brilliantly.

Perhaps the most interesting feature of the store-museum is the soda fountain. It has one of the first Coca-Cola fountain machines ever made. Mitchell believes it to be the only one of its kind still in operation. Customers still come in to sit at a fountain-stool, or at one of the quaint little tables with triangular-shaped chairs to enjoy refreshment from an antique, tulip-shaped glass.

Truly, the Mitchell-Forbes drug store is the last of its kind.

When Mitchell left Cross Plains, he was succeeded in business by Clyde and Moulton Sims. After a short while they moved the store a few doors North and Sims Drug became a legend in its own right. That, though is another story, one deserving to be told in full detail at another time.

Good Effort Lifts Mites To First Football Victory

Mighty Mites of Cross Plains Junior High School recorded their first football victory of the season Thursday besting the host Lometa Hornets 28-0.

Cross Plains tallied three touchdowns in the first half en route to the initial triumph in three outings, and used a stout defense to keep the locals' goal line

from being crossed.

First touchdown counted by the Mites en route to the 22-0 advance at halftime was a 15-yard halfback pass from Daryl Bates to Chad Bagley. Fullback Conda Odom scored the two-point conversion on an off-tackle play for an 8-0 lead.

Second touchdown by the Mites came on a 20-yard toss

Area United Fund Canvass Raises 84% Of Goal

Volunteer workers who canvassed the City of Cross Plains, area communities and much of the rural countryside between those communities deposited \$3,874.69 to the Cross Plains United Fund account at Citizens State Bank Friday upon making the drive.

The \$3,874.69 is just over 84 percent of the budgeted \$4,600 goal, according to co-chairpersons of the door-to-door canvass, Clara Nell Spencer and Helen Freeman, which is the major part of the annual United Fund campaign in Cross Plains.

The campaign co-

chairpersons joined with Jimmielee Payne, president of the Cross Plains Area United Fund, in expressing profound appreciation to the many volunteer workers who donated time and energy to make the drive Friday and to the numerous donors for their generous contributions.

Although the campaign came up \$725.39 short of the goal which has been budgeted after first day's effort, it was pointed out by Mrs. Spencer and Mrs. Freeman that a few groups had not yet turned in collections to Terry Wyatt by 5 p.m. Friday when the bank closed. It was also pointed

out that return calls will have to be made by some workers, who found no one at home at some houses. It was pointed out by Payne and the campaign chairpersons that anyone who has been missed and wishes to have a part in the Cross Plains Area United Fund, the only sanctioned charity drive in the city they make donations at the Citizens State Bank.

The \$4,600 budget aids six charitable institutions or organizations, two local scouting programs and two local programs to help home folk of transients. The budgeted goals is apportioned as follows:

West Texas Rehabilitation

Center in Abilene is to receive \$1,300. Remainder of the funds are to be distributed as follows: M.D. Anderson Tumor Institute \$700, American Red Cross \$200, Salvation Army \$200, Texas Mental Health Association \$100, Southwest Diabetic Foundation \$200, Christmas Cheer \$300, local and transient relief \$600, Boy Scouts \$300, Girl Scouts \$300 and unallocated \$400.

"Cross Plains has always met it's obligations, exceeding them in most instances, and we are again confident the goal will be met in the next few days," the campaign officials emphasized.

Local Fire Department's Turkey Shoot Is Saturday

Cross Plains Volunteer Fire Department is sponsoring a turkey shoot Saturday, Oct. 12, at the Callahan County Junior Livestock Show barn located 2 miles north of the traffic light in Cross Plains on Highway 206.

Firing in the turkey shoot is scheduled to begin at 1 p.m. and continue through 7 p.m. Adult division shooting will be limited to .22 calibre rifle with open sights at standing position only, according to fire department officials. Targets will be at 75 feet (25 yards). Alvin Hutchins, secretary of the local volunteer fire company, stated that if a contestant does not have a rifle, one will be furnished. Additional rules will be posted at the

shoot, it was explained. There will also be a junior division in the shoot to consist of BB or pellet air rifle shot for the junior age contestants with prizes to be awarded. More details will be posted on this portion of the activity at the shoot site, it was stated.

Cost in the adult portion of the shoot will be \$3 per entry. Proceeds on this shoot will go toward helping firemen purchase a water truck to haul water to the rural fires which is so desperately needed, say local fire fighters.

Refreshments will be served by the fire department at the shoot. Department officials have invited, "Come all and let's have a good time."

Lometa Deals Herd 12-7 Disappointing 8-A Loss

Visiting Lometa Hornets spotted the Cross Plains Buffaloes a 7-0 lead before striking twice in just over a minute to disappoint the Bisons in District 8-A East Zone action here Friday.

Victor of the game here Friday could possibly have taken a giant step toward annexing a playoff spot at regular season's end. "At least we could have been in a position to control our own destiny," said Head Coach Mark Davidson. He added that it was a disappointing loss, but simply means that we must work harder and hope for someone else to do us a favor, if we are to earn a playoff spot.

Buffaloes struck quickly on a complicated play the Buffaloes worked to perfection. In the second quarter Bisons Quarterback Devin Koenig flipped a short pass to Split End Ricky White who immediately lateraled to

trailing Halfback Darin Apple who sped untouched into the end zone completing the 63-yard play. Koenig kicked the extra point for a 7-0 lead.

That marin stood until about midway of the third canto when Hornet Running Back Willie Jasso scored on a 53-yard run. An attempted placement kick went wide to the right, and Buffaloes still had a 7-6 edge.

Just over a minute later, however, the Hornets had put another six points on the board. Lometa's Johnny Molina swiped a Buffalo aerial, on first series following the Hornet touchdown, and returned it 20 yards to the Herd's one. Two plays later Lometa Quarterback Butch Campbell scored. The visitors owned 12 first downs to 8 for Cross Plains, but total yardage was almost the same. The Hornets rushed for 179 yards while Buffaloes ran for only 130, but the Herd traveled through the air for 70 yards to 29 for the Hornets, an aggregate of 200 for the Buffs and 208 for the Hornets.

Cross Plains' leading rusher was Apple who collected 79 yards and the touchdown on 17 carries. Willie Jasso was the Hornets top ball carrier with 103 yards on 18 carries.

Top Buffalo defender was Linebacker Tommy Ames who had 10 unassisted tackles and 6 assisted tackles.

Athletic Director Davidson repeated that it was a disappointing loss, "A win could have put us in a commanding position to make the play offs". He added that we fell down in special team assignments, too.

The loss leaves Cross Plains with a 1-4 season mark, and a 1-1 District 8-A East Zone record. Third conference opponent will be Rochelle Hornets, who will host the Herd for a 7:30 p.m. kickoff Friday.

October Is School Attendance Month

Once during each school year one month is set aside during that time when the State of Texas officially counts attendance in the public schools in the state to determine how much money each individual school is due. This year the count is being made during the month of October, and the following statement was released from the office of Lee Thompson, superintendent of Cross Plains Schools, about the count and its ramifications.

The following, in part, was released latter part of last week.

"October is the state appointed month for the official attendance that is used in determining the amount of money that the school will receive from the state. For each day of average daily attendance (ADA), the school will receive a minimum of \$1,200. There are approx-

imately 20 attendance days in October, so each day a student is in school earns approximately \$60 from the state.

"Attendance is counted once a day. This is period 2 in grades 7-12 and approximately 9:15 a.m. in elementary. Parents are encouraged to schedule dental appointments and other necessary appointments after that time of day. Remember that each dollar from the state is one less that the school would have to raise in local taxes.

"The school administration appreciates your cooperation in this matter, and will work with the public in any way to encourage regular attendance by our students throughout the entire school year, but especially during the October attendance period."

The policy development committee is currently accepting suggestions for resolutions. Producers are encouraged to contribute their thoughts to the committee at this time. All recommendations received by this committee will be considered in drafting tentative resolutions to be voted on at the annual meeting. The committee will also receive recommendations made by the county commodity divisions.

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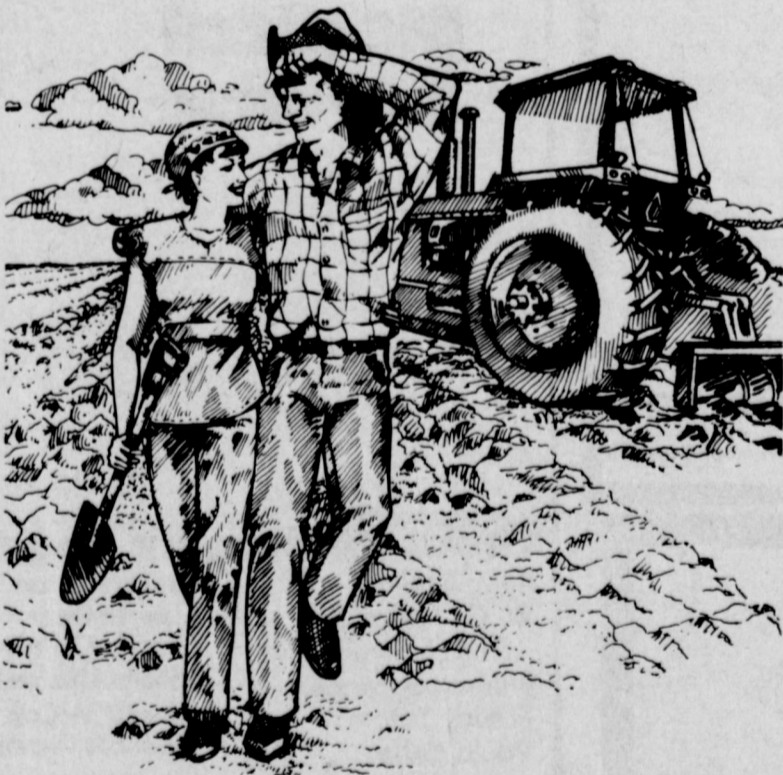

reported that fibrocystic lumps disappeared or decreased in 22 of 26 women who took vitamin E, 600 units daily, for 12 weeks.
