Residents of Cross Plains asked to participate in assessment Feb. 11-13

Rural Resource Team to visit

All members of the Cross Plains community are invited to participate in a community assessment on February 11-13. On Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday of next week a Rural Resource Team will be in town meeting with different community segments. The team will be composed of individuals with expertise and experience in economic and community development in a rural setting, including representatives from our Resource Conservation and Development Council, West Central Texas Council of Governments, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, USDA/Rural Development, and the Texas Rural Development Council.

At the meetings the following four questions will be asked of those present: 1. What are the strengths and assets of our community? 2. What are the major challenges and problems of our community? 3. What projects would you like to see implemented in the short term? 4. What projects would

you like to see implemented in the long term? Please consider these questions carefully and be present to voice your concerns about our community and express your vision of the future of Cross Plains. You may attend either the meeting of the segment with which you most closely identify or at the most convenient time. There is a schedule of the community segment meetings on page 5.

Following the community segment meetings the team will present an oral report of what they heard and preliminary recommendations Friday morning at 10:30 a.m. This information will be used later this year in a Strategic Planning Session conducted by WTU.





Keffer Meets With Area EDC Directors

Economic Development Corporation directors from Clyde, Baird and Cross Plains met jointly Thursday, January 29, to discuss the possibility of forming a county wide economic development corporation and bring to county voters an election to collect a one-half of one percent county wide sales tax to be used for econemic development.

The meeting took place at the Clyde Intermediate School Library. The meeting was the third joint session of the three economic development corporation boards. The joint EDC boards have previously held meetings in Baird and Cross Plains.

Clyde EDC board president Tom Bailey introduced Rodney Lewallen, Baird EDC board member, who gave the EDC members a report on forming a county wide economic development corporation and calling an election to collect the one-half of one percent sales tax.

According to Lewallen, new state legislation would be needed before Callahan County could petition for an election. State law now requires all county landowners to sign a petition to call for an election to collect the county wide sales tax for economic development.

District 60 State Representative Jim Keffer of Eastland, who was guest speaker for the joint meeting, said the next state legislative session will be held in January 1999 and new legislation to create county wide economic development corporations will be discussed during the session. Keffer, who represents Callahan County, is a member of the state legislative Economic Development Committee. He's the only rural lawmaker on the committee.

Lewallen told the EDC members that it would be a minimum of 17-18 months before any petition could be brought to hold an election for collecting the county wide sales tax for economic development.

EDC board members did agree to have each of the three EDC boards appoint two members to form a county wide Steering Committee to get the word out on a county wide economic development corporation. Lewallen said the one-half of one percent county wide sales tax would bring in approximately \$100,000 per year. Currently, the cities of Clyde, Baird and Cross Plains each collect one-half of one percent in sales tax for their local economic development. Clyde's sales tax for economic development brings in about \$45,000 per year. Baird and Cross Plains each collect about \$25,000 per year for economic development. Lewallen said the maximum sales tax gollection rate in Texas is 8 1/4%. The cities of Baird, Clyde and Cross Plains all collect 7 3/4% in total sales tax.

State Rep. Keffer encouraged EDC board members to continue their efforts in forming a county wide economic development corporation. "Nobody is going to take care of Callahan County except Callahan County. This is where you live and work," Keffer told the EDC members.

Keffer said Callahan County is competing with 253 other counties in the state to lure businesses here. He said one thing Callahan County has over many other counties in the state is Interstate 20. He brought up the attempt by Hamlin to bring a Texas Youth Commission facility there, but he believed its lack of an Interstate connection was a deterrent to getting the facility.

Keffer also discussed Amarillo's EDC benefit package offered to a Coleman business and the business declaring bankruptcy soon after. Keffer said Amarillo EDC deserved what they got by luring the business away from a small Texas community. The state representative said he hopes legislation will be brought up in January to possible prevent what happened to Coleman.

Attending the joint EDC session were the three Democratic candidates for Callahan County judge-Winford Hogan, Roger Corn and Bill Holloway. Representative Keffer said economic development starts with county officials and he was glad to see all three county judge candidates attending the EDC meeting.

Keffer told the EDC members Eastland County mirrors Callahan County in several ways. He said the geographic area is the same type of problems. The state representative said there needs to be input from some of the smaller communities in Callahan County before considering a county wide vote for an economic development sales tax. The need for input form community leaders in Putnam, Eula, Cottonwood, Rowden, Oplin and the Denton Valley areas was suggested.

Clyde EDC members attending the session included Tom Bailey, Bill Walton, Susan Anderson, Monty Howard, and Doyle Robertson. Cross Plains EDC members attending the joint session were Steve Mack, Denise Colter and Keith Lawrence. Baird EDC members attending were Rodney Lewallen and Felix Manion. Also attending form Clyde were Tim Powers, Jean Gilmore, Jack Eppard and Mayor Mery Warrick.

The next joint session of the Clyde, Baird and Cross Plains economic development boards has been tentatively planned for late spring or early summer in Baird.

Cross Plains ISD **Receives Grant**

Cross Plains ISD has received a grant in the amount of \$98,600 from the Telecommunications Infrastructure Fund Board.

This is the third round of TIF grants, each designed to provide public schools with the necessary equipment to allow students access to the Internet. This third round was a non-competitive award process designed to level the playing field across the state, with a cap on each award of \$100,000. TIF awarded more than 600 grants to individual districts of campuses within districts.

TIF was created by the 74th Legislature, under House Bill 2128, and is designed to provide grants and

loans to improve telecommunications infrastructure around the state. TIF serves K-12 public schools in this effort, as well as institutions of higher education, public libraries and non-profit health care facilities. The most recent grant award stresses the importance of modernizing the infrastructure of K-12 public schools as a part of the overall plan to increase the economic competitiveness of Texas.

The district fulfilled a series of TIF requirements in order to receive funding. Some of the TIF requirements included creating a technology task force consisting of teachers, administrators, students, and community members, and submitting an approved technology plan.

"We are very pleased to receive this award," said Superintendent Tennison. "We will use TIF funds, along with the matching funds we have committed to the project, to bring the Internet into the classroom as a teaching tool."

Cross Plains ISD committed \$10,000 in matching funds to the project. The money will be used to purchase the necessary telecommunications equipment to provide a direct connection to the Internet, wiring of classrooms, and the purchase of computers. The funds will be used at the high school and elementary campus, according to Superintendent Tennison.







DALLAS - Need help in filling out those tax forms? A total of 70,802 North Texans received free tax help at more than 300 Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) and Tax Counseling for the Elderly (TCE) sites last year.

VITA/TCE offers free tax help to people who cannot afford to pay a tax preparer. Both programs also give free tax help to disadvantaged people and to those who cannot speak the English language. The TCE program generally offers free tax help to people over age 60.

IRS Acting District Director Ellen Murphy encourages anyone needing help from VITA/TCE volunteers to bring all their income information, including forms W-2 and 1099; social security cards or Individual Taxpayer Identification Numbers for all dependents; and any other useful documents and forms. Those items could include: lists, receipts, bills or statements of medical, taxes, home mortgage interest, contributions and miscellaneous expenses and copy of last year's tax return.
