Brandon Hill deputy sheriff for CP



April 28 deadline for bidding on forfeited state land

AUSTIN-A catalogue listing 198 tracts of forfeited state land reserved exclusively for bids from Texas veterans is now available from the Texas Veterans Land Board (VLB). Bids will be opened on April 28, 1998, at 1 p.m.

"There's always a great demand for these tracts because veterans realize our forfeiture rules enable them to buy land with no down payment," said Texas Land Commissioner Garry Mauro who is chairman of the VLB. "They understand that whether it's for recreation or as an investment these tracts are a very good value."

The catalogue, which contains bidding instructions and a detailed description of each tract, can be ordered by calling 1-800-252-VETS. Located in 90 Texas counties, the tracts range in size from five to 200 acres. The tracts, known as Type I tracts, can be purchased with no down payment. Bids are restricted

to eligible Texas veterans. The VLB will finance the entire loan amount of all winning bids. There is no limit on the amount loaned or on the number of tracts that an individual can bid on. However, eligible Texas veterans are limited to one purchase in the sale.

"Since these tracts have never been offered for sale by the VLB, this sale gives Texas vets an excellent opportunity to buy good land with 100. percent financing," Mauro said.

Mauro noted that setting aside new forfeitures exclusively for bids from Texas veterans is a long-time VLB

"The Veterans Land Program is, part of a Texas tradition that goes back to the days of the Republic of Texas," Mauro said. "It's my belief that Texas veterans should get first shot at any forfeited tracts."

Tracts not sold in the April sale will be offered to both veterans and nonveterans through local real estate agents.

Texas veterans will receive a 7.64 percent interest rate with a 30-year assumable fixed-rate loan. A \$25 non-refundable fee for each bid is required.

The sale will be by sealed bid only, with a minimum bid set by the board. All bids must be received by April 28 at 1 p.m. Details of the sale can be obtained by calling 1-800-252-

Most of us remember Job as the man of faith and patience -- but in reading the Old Testament book of the Bible that bears his name, I sort of get the impression that both his faith and patience wore thin as he questioned God concerning the things that had happened to him, all the things he had lost -- his children, his possessions -- then there was the terrible disease that beset him. "Why me, Lord?

Well God, in essence, said, "There are a lot of things, in addition to that, that you don't know, Job, nor may never know." God "gave Job a test." Someone has said that Job answered every one of God's questions -- but he answered each of them with a shrug of the shoulder, saying, "I don't know!"

One of the questions God asked Job was: "Have you entered into the storehouse/treasures of the snow?" -- as if to say, "Are you aware of the secret values of the elements in snow? And the other values of its falling and of its coverage? Are you even aware of where it all comes from?" Perhaps Job scratched his head and shrugged his shoulders again, for he had never even considered that snow had any intrinsic value.

We've not had much snow here this winter -- don't usually have much. 





Falling interest rates boost housing affordability

COLLEGE STATION—Texas homes became more affordable to a wider population because the interest rate charged on home mortgage loans at the end of 1997 was the lowest it has been in two years.

"The average rate on loans, both fixed and adjustable, closed in Texas during the last three months of 1997 was estimated to be 7.35 percent," says Jack C. Harris, a research economist for the Real Estate Center at Texas A & M University. "This rate compares to 7.6 percent paid one year ago and the most recent low point of 7.21 percent during the first quarter of 1996."

The Texas Housing Affordability Index, which indicates the adequacy of a median household income for purchasing a median-priced Texas home, rose to 1.48 in the fourth quarter.

"The index means that the median Texas income of \$38,000 was 48 percent higher than the amount needed to qualify for a mortgage to purchase a home selling for the median price of \$91,000 at prevailing market interest rates," says Har-

Out of seven million Texas households, it is estimated that 66 percent can afford the median priced home, up from 63 percent last year.

"The improvement in the Index was caused solely by the lower interest rate," says Harris. "Affordability appears to have stimulated sales, as the number of homes sold through Texas Multiple Listing Services for the quarter was 7 percent higher than the number sold during the fourth quarter of
