"CLUCK, CLUCK"

One day at lunch we were discussing how complicated preparing a chicken once was. Mother recalled chasing the chicken down, wringing their necks, either boiling them to pluck their feathers or skinning them. I remember Granny Ethel singed the pin feathers on a chicken before cutting it up. Boy did that smell!

Cutting up a chicken is almost a lost art these days. Sometimes I arrive with parts that are not quite recognizable.

Mother shocked my children when she said she remembered her grandmother, Rosa Paralee Irvin, cooking the head and the feet. The men were served first and the children last. Sometimes only the feet were available, but there was plenty of gravy and biscuits.

We have changed the order of serving over the years, or at least our family has. The children now take precedence. Maybe that wasn't a good change.

Everyone who recalls this process notes that chicken tasted better back then. By the time you went through all this you would be hungry.

Our family still uses Granny Loma's method of preparing fried chicken. She salted and peppered the chicken and put a whole raw egg or two over the meat thoroughly. Flour was generously sprinkled over the pieces until it was covered with a thick pasty batter and then it was cooked in hot oil until crisp and brown.

Now the gravy -- sometimes this throws cooks. I have had my daughters and son-in-law call and ask how to prepare gravy over the telephone. I always let the oil where the chicken was cooked cover the bottom of the skillet slightly, get it warm, and add two tablespoons of flour. Salt and pepper the mixture and stir while it browns. When it is good and brown pour in approximately 2 1/2 cups of sweet milk and a cup of water mixed. Then just bring to a boil and keep stirring till it thickens.

Now if you put too much flour it will be lumpy and if you didn't put quite enough, it will not thicken. I still have flops but trying to correct the problem results in bigger problems, believe me!

Well, I am hungry for fried chicken now. That was usually Sunday dinner when I was growing up. What kind of stories will we leave our children? Taking the frozen chicken parts out of the freezer, maybe already battered doesn't create much interest. Now faster is considered better.

Don't you feel like we are in such a rush to accomplish each day's chores that we wish every day away without treasuring any precious moments. People from the large cities find life in Cross Plains to move at a slower pace and love it. However, it feels like the weeks race by and the years are flying.

Try to capture at least one great memory this week that can be passed on to your children or grandchildren.


"It's not just individual peanut producers who are affected. The cost/price squeeze threatens related agribusiness and the surrounding rural economy."

Expert: Tap water as good as bottled water

AMARILLO-As temperatures begin to heat up and Texans reach for something refreshing to cool them off, consumers are reminded that bottled water isn't any better than tap water.

Just because a bottled water might taste better, doesn't make it safer to drink, says Extension nutrition specialist Dr. Mickey Bielamowicz.

Bielamowicz said public system waters must meet two standards. First, water must be safe for drinking and it is tested for 80 or more specific chemicals. The secondary standard applies to its taste.

According to Dr. John Sweeten, an Extension irrigation and water management engineer from Amarillo, much of the water in Texas has an undesirable taste but is not bad for

"If someone is on a restricted sodium diet, they'd be better off with bottled water or reverse osmosis," he said.

Area man builds Styrofoam, concrete home for the ages

COTTONWOOD - People are coming out to the Childress farm and rancff near here out of mere curiosity. like they did 20 years ago. They want to see Bob Childress' unique new home just like they did when his dad, Dan, now 83, built his thickwalled, adobe house across the road.

While you may have seen homes similar to Dan's adobe house, you've probably never seen a home like the one Bob is building.

In the first place, it is made out Styrofoam.

"I've never seen anything like it," Dan said Wednesday morning when I visited

In the second place, Bob's home is octagon-shaped and stuck halfway down into a wide, 13-foot deep hole that he dug in the top of a hill on the Childress farm. The first floor is underground. The second floor is above ground. The house has coneshaped roof and a two-car garage. Looking down through the home's big window frames, Bob can see 10 miles in any direction. Included is a bird's eye view of Dan's adobe home with its red roof and his brother Scott's home, which is just a little nearer. Bob can also look down and see pastures, peanut fields, grain sorghum fields and some of the 700 peach trees and 1,800 pecan trees that his dad planted almost 30 years

The view is awfully pretty, and it was very quiet when I met Bob while he was working on his place. But I think when the weather gets wild and windy, it will not be so quiet.

ago. He can also see East Caddo

Peak directly to the south and West

Caddo Peak to the west.

Bob is not worried about that, though, and is not even worried about tornadoes. He said the Sytrofoam house is so strong, he is confident it will withstand even powerful tornadoes.

He is confident it will last, too. "This is a 600-year house," he said as he patted the Styrofoam walls.

The Styrofoam walls are not really just plastic, of course. The Styrofoam is a form, so to speak, for concrete. Bob bought the Styrofoam forms from a New Mexico company. Each form is about three feet in length and about one foot high. The forms are almost a foot thick and hollow. You stack them on top of each other and glue them together. Then you pour concrete down into them and insert vertical steel support rods every foot or so down through the cement.

When you have don all that, Bob said, you have created a very sturdy concrete wall that is covered in several inches of Styrofoam for insulation.

"Good homes that are being built now have an insulation factor of R-17 or 19," Bob said. "This one is R-

He will brick the outer walls and cover the interior Styrofoam with wall board. Dan graduated years ago from

Oklahoma A&M with a degree in animal husbandry, then worked for the U.S. Forestry service for more than 30 years. Bob graduated from Colorado State University with a degree in forestry and range management and also worked more than 30 years for the U.S. Forestry Service. He retired last year.

Despite their career overseeing forests, neither seems to think much of wood as a building material. Dan preferred adobe. Bob prefers

plastic, steel and concrete. There is a minimum of wood in his new home. "Yes, I know about trees and I

know they rot and burn," Bob said. Bob is supremely confident in the durability of his plastic and concrete home and cannot think of a natural force in these parts that could seriously harm his 2,800 square-foot home, not even fire because of the lack of wood.

"In fact," he said, "I am considering not even insuring it."

In addition to its construction, the home will feature other innovative iucas.

It will have a geothermal heating and cooling system that takes heat from water pipes buried in the ground during the winter, and uses the relative coolness of the water for

cooling in the summer. With the Styrofoam insulation and the geothermal system, it will be inexpensive to stay comfortable.

"They tell me it should cost about \$600 a year, including hot water," Bob said.

In addition, Bob plans on free water. He will construct gutters around the cone-shaped roof and channel the rain water to a big steel tank behind the house.

He figures an inch of rain on his roof will provide 1,000 gallons of water, and annual rainfall in this part of Callahan County is about 24 inches. Bob believes he and his wife Lavonne can easily get along with 24,000 gallons a year.

I asked Bob if his motive for constructing such an energysufficient house was motivated by his years of working as a conservationist.

"That, or I'm just chintzy," he said and laughed.

Bob said the construction cost of this home would not be any more than the average new home, but the savings in energy and maintenance costs would make his home more economical in the long run.

Construction began last September with the digging of the hole on top of the hill. Bob expects to finish by December.

His father Dan, however, was skeptical about the December

"He's in no hurry," Dan said of his son. "He's having too much fun just building it.'



Retail Sales Are Up Here

John Sharp, State Comptroller for Texas, reported retail sales in the City of Cross Plains are 0.05% higher in 1998 compared to 1997.

The state comptroller released the city sales tax rebates to the Texas cities Monday, July 13, including those for Cross Plains.

Sharp said the City of Cross Plains is reporting 1998 one and one-half percent city sales tax payments running 0.05% above the 1997 payments of the tax. Cross Plains 1998 sales tax payments have amounted to \$48,569.64, while the 1997 sales tax rebates were \$48,541.29.

The city's monthly sales tax check for July 1998 was \$5,878.95, an increase of 1.52% from the \$5,790.83 payment made in July of last year. Other Callahan County towns re-

porting sales tax payments include: -The City of Baird reported that sales tax payments in 1998 are

2.76% higher than the 1997 payments. The city had received \$42,112.47 so far in 1998, while the 1997 tax payments to the city totalled \$40,978.19.

The town's monthly payment for July 1998 was \$4,208.87, a decrease of 4.04% from the \$4,385.39 payment made in July of last year.

-The 1998 sales tax payments in the City of Clyde are 9.69% above tax payments made to the city in 1997. The sales tax rebates for the City of Clyde have amounted to \$84,735.08 so far in 1998. The 1997 payments to the city during the same payment period were \$77,246.99.

-The City of Putnam is reporting the 1998 payments to the town totalled \$6,034.93, up 9.92% from the 1997 payments to the city in the amount of \$5,489.96.

Putnam's tax payment for the month of July 1998 was \$705.07, which was 5.91% lower than the \$749.43 payment made in July

County-wide, sales tax payments for 1998 in Callahan County are running 5.33% above the 1997 payments in the county. Callahan County towns have received sales tax payments in 1998 amounting to \$181,452.12, while the 1997 payments to the county towns totalled \$172,256.43.

The tax rebates in Callahan County for the month of July were \$21,229.74, which was 7.97% higher than the \$19,661.10 collected and paid to the communities in July 1997.

crease; Stamford, \$306,716.59. 5.45% increase; Cisco, \$136,738.01 in 1998, 4.31% increase; Eastland, \$363,657.91 in 1998, 5.65% increase; Merkel, \$90,535.33 in 1998, 15.02% decrease; Ballinger, \$332,396.33 in 1998, 9.59% increase; Coleman, \$292,095.28 in 1998, 3.50% increase.

State-wide, sales tax payments in 1998 are 11.51% ahead of 1997 rebates, according to Sharp's figures. The state comptroller has sent out checks totalling \$1,250,354,321.07 so far in 1998, while the 1997 payments to the state's cities amounted to \$1,121,281,590.38.

Merchants collect the state and local sales tax and send it to the Comptroller's office with their tax returns the local one percent sales tax each month to local governments. Cities and counties may levy a combined tax of up to two percent above the state's sales tax. Clyde, Baird and Cross Plains all collect 1.50% in local sales tax.

This month's payments include local sales taxes collected by monthly filers on May sales and reported to the comptroller in June. Businesses file sales tax payments either monthly, quarterly or annually depending on the amount of sales tax they collect.

All local sales taxes must be approved by local voters and may be used for any legal city or county expenses. Most areas put the money in their General Fund and use it for normal operations like fire fighting, maintaining roads and law enforcement, Sharp said. CPISD Dress Code Transfer Policy

established to teach grooming and hygiene, instill discipline, prevent disruptions, avoid safety hazards and teach respect for authority. Since personal appearance has a direct influence upon an atmosphere conducive to learning and the propriety of dress and neatness in grooming reflects upon the general school environment, students are expected to come to school appropriately dressed and neatly groomed.

Appropriate standards include, but are not limited to the following standards which shall apply to students Pre-K through 12:

1. No haircuts or non-haircuts which the principal believes will cause disruption of classes. Hair shall be groomed or cut in such a manner that it will not hang over the eyes. Boy's hair length shall not reach below the collar, "tails" are not permitted. Hair shall not be held by rubber bands or the like. Unusual or disruptive hair styles shall not be permitted. Hair coloring or dyeing of hues that do not occur in any natural human hair is prohibited.

2. Girls shall not wear halter tops, nor shall they have any part of their. midriff showing, and otherwise should be properly dressed for

3. Students shall not wear tank tops or similar garments, or see-through

4. Boys shall not have sideburns below the ear lobe.

5. No pants or shirts shall be worn that demonstrate obscene, lewd or profane language. There shall be no pictures, logos or advertisements for tobacco, alcohol, drugs or controlled substances. Pants will be pulled up at all times. Baggy pants shall not be worn on campus. The principal will have the discretion to determine appropriateness. No "co-ed naked" T-shirts shall be worn.

6. Hats, caps and other headgear must be removed upon entering building. On first offense, headgear will be confiscated for the day. On second offense, headgear will be confiscated until the end of the semester.

7. No. P.E. shorts shall be worn in the buildings.

8. Boys shall not wear earrings.

9. Shorts and dresses shall be no shorter than four (4) inches above the shorts. Shorts must be hemmed I.S.D. and square on the bottom. On first

offense the student will be sent home to change, or will be issued sweats for the remainder of the day. On the second offense, the student will be sent home to change and will not be allowed to wear shorts for the remainder of the school year.

10. The principal, in connection with the sponsor, coach or other person in charge of an extracurricular activity, may regulate the dress and grooming of students who participate in the activity.

11. Boys shall be clean shaven at all times. Beards and mustaches are prohibited.

12. No head bands or arm bands shall be permitted.

13. Tattoos will not be allowed to be visible at school or school activities. If a student has a tattoo, he/she will be required to have it covered at all times.

Cross Plains I.S.D. Transfer Policy

Effective since the fall of 1997, Cross Plains I.S.D. does not accept new transfer students who live outside the district boundaries.

Power or Attorney for Students Who Do Not Live with Parents or Legal Guardian

The Cross Plains I.S.D. Board of Education recently adopted a policy stating "any student who does not live with a parent or legal guardian (court appointed) must have a Power of Attorney filed with the County Clerk's Office and the Cross Plains Schools." The form must state the student's name and with whom the student is residing. This must be signed by the student, a parent and the person with whom the student will be living.

This form will give the person with whom the student is living the authority to sign all school forms and to give permission to participate in school activities and functions. The designated person will be responsible to the school for this student's actions.
