COUNTY BURN BAN LIFTED

BAIRD—Callahan County Judge Bill Johnson announced that the burn ban for Callahan County has been lifted Wednesday, October 21.

"Due to the rain we've had the past two days," said Johnson, "and many requests we have had by citizens wanting to have outdoor burns, the burn ban is lifted."

If conditions become dangerous again the judge said he would reinstate the ban which had been in affect since June 25.

Pallbearers were Randy Best, Kevin Farmer, Michael Jordan and Payton Young.





Plant your spring flowering bulbs in November or December.


-Give them the cold treatment in your refrigerator for five to six

"Getting even" or "having the last word" seem to be inborn characteristics of us humans -- not good ones, but nonetheless all too real. Yet Jesus teaches us differently. He teaches us to "love our enemies and do good to those who mistreat us," Matthew 5:45.

We usually think of courage being connected with action, but Jesus asks us to have courage in this instance through restraint. The courage to take abuse without retaliation may well be one of the greatest Christian attributes -- and Jesus is our perfect example, especially on the night of His betrayal. 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

Harris and Koenig carried the ball, then Ryan Mack passed to Koenig who pitched out to Harris. This play moved them closer to a first down, but were forced to punt.


The Mountaineers scored their first TD and 2-point conversion, with only 2:35 remaining in the 1st quarter. The score was 8-0.



Helen Groves is a genuine cowgirl. Raised on the famous King Ranch in the 1930s, horses and cattle have been her life for years.

"I've had a busy life," she said. "I learned about horses and cattle from my father, and I've loved working with them ever since. They're a big part of who I am."

And now, her pioneer spirit and legendary cutting horse abilities have given her a place of honor.

On Friday, Grove will be inducted into the famous National Cowgirl Museum's Hall of Fame for her contributions to the American West.

Groves will join a unique collection of legendary women including humanitarians, tribal leaders, artists and writers, entertainers, business women, educators, ranchers and rodeo cowgirls.

The great-granddaughter of famous ranchers Richard and Henrietta King, Groves came from an exceptional ranching background.

She started out riding Shetland ponies and dairy calves, then moved into more serious horsemanship.

"I've been riding since even before I can remember," she said. "I grew up going to roundups.'

Home schooled, Groves often accompanied her own mother to round-ups, riding on quarter horses and ponies. Eventually, she went off to boarding school, took up fox hunting, married a young doctor from Pennsylvania and became more deeply involved in her love of

A frequent cutting horse participant since 1972, her prowess has earned her the title First Lady of Cutting. She has been a finalist or semi-finalist in more than 47 major cutting horse events throughout her

In 1996, she was inducted into the National Cutting Horse Association's Hall of Fame.

Her Silverbrook Ranches in Middlebrook, Va., and in Baird are considered among the finest examples of Santa Gertrudis and quarter horse operations in the

"My job here is to get the best people I can and then let them do their job," she said. "I've never been one to have people I have to tell what to do every day. I want them to just go do it."

At her induction ceremony in Fort Worth October 30, Groves was honored along with three other living cowgirl legends and two posthumous inductees.

She said she was surprised the museum had chosen to honor her but said she was excited to be selected.

"There are so many deserving people out there, so I feel very honored," she said. "It's just a very exciting thing for me. A friend of mine wanted to (nominate) me, but I didn't know that anything would come of it."

For her part, Groves is simply glad that she has lived a very rich, interesting, constantly busy life. And she's looking forward to years

more, she said.

"I don't tend to look back," she said. "I've enjoyed just about everything I've ever done. The bad things in life you learn from, the good things you enjoy. I've never been one for looking back and reflecting — I'm too busy living."

The first matches were made in 1827 by English pharmacist John Walker.

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
