

Gingerbread **House Contest Rules Announced**

Project Pride is hosting gingerbread house contests for individual students, individual adults, and groups.

The Student Contest is open to any student, Pre-K through high school. Gift certificates will be given to 1st place winners in each age category: (1) Pre-K and Kindergarten (2) 1st and 2nd grades (3) 3rd and 4th grades (4) 5th and 6th grades (5) 7th and 8th grades (6) 9th - 12th grades. The overall top three Gingerbread Houses will be chosen to receive Grand Prizes. The Chamber of Commerce has generously donated a \$100 Savings Bond to the 1st place winner and \$50 Savings Bonds to the 2nd and 3rd place winners. It is very important that the students do their own work. Too much help from mom and dad will hurt the child's chances rather than help.

The Individual Adult Contest is open to anyone 18 or older who is out of high school. Gift certificates will be given to 1st, 2nd and 3rd places.

Students and adults must use the following rules and guidelines:

(1) Houses must be 3-dimensional and placed on a flat cardboard or base no larger than 9" by 9".

(2) Your "house" may be a house, church, store or any building you would find in a real town.

(3) You may use any materials you wish as long as they need NO refrigeration.

(4) Do NOT put your name on a visible part of the "house." Index cards completed with your name, grade, teacher and parents (for students) or name, address and phone number (for adults) should be taped to the underside of the cardboard or base.

(5) All entries will be displayed throughout Christmas Village. You may retrieve your "house" on Monday, December 7, or Tuesday, December 8. Entries that are not picked up will be discarded or put in storage at Project Prides discretion.

(6) Winners will be judged on originality. Judging will be held Thursday evening, December 3. Winners will be notified.

The Group Contest is open to any group of 2 or more people, no age restrictions. You may be a club, a family or a group of friends. Groups. will follow the same guidelines. EXCEPT that there is no restriction. on size. Please complete your index card with the group name, contact. person, and phone number. Ribbons. and certificates will be given to 1st, 2nd and 3rd places.

Love Fund Established for Eula **High School** Freshman

A fund has been established to help pay for the medical expenses of Chris Clark, a Eula High School freshman seriously injured in a vehicle accident Monday, November 16 on FM 18.

Chris, son of Keith and Linda Clark of Eula, sustained a head injury after falling off the hood of a pickup and hitting his head on the pavement. He is currently listed in critical condition in the intensive care unit at Hendrick Medical Center in Abilene.

According to family friend Cheryl Roberts, Chris and a fellow classmate were riding on the hood of a pickup on FM 18 when he slipped off the hood of the truck. Two other boys were riding inside the vehicle. Chris was air lifted by First Flight helicopter to Hendrick after the accident. Roberts said he is blinking his eyes, is able to move the right side of his body, but is unable to move his left side at this time.

An account has been established at United Bank and Trust in Abilene for donations to help with Chris' medical expenses. The account is under the "Chris Clark Fund" and the account number is 17-478. Chris' grandparents are W.D. and Billy Clark of Cross Plains.





We welcome three new participants to the Senior Citizens Center -- Allen and Brenda Weizer of Cross Plains and Peggy McDaniel of Rising Star.




Tree orders will be taken from now until February or till the supply runs out, which ever comes first. The expected date of delivery will be on or near February 18, 1999.
