Councilman resigns & temporary fire marshal appointed during monthly council meeting Jan. 5

The Cross Plains City Council accepted the resignation of a councilman and appointed a temporary fire marshal during their regular meeting Tuesday, January 5.

William C. Pringle had submitted a written resignation that was read to the council. No reason was given for his stepping down from the government position.

Pringle had been appointed to finish 8 months of a previous councilmans term and then was elected to a two year term that was to end in May of this year. Jerry Cassle made the motion to accept the resignation and was seconded by Edwin Weiss which passed unanimously.

The council discussed waiting until the May elections to fill Pringle's chair on the governing body.

Cross Plains Fire Chief Bob Harrell met with the council to request a replacement for James Oscar Koenig who had given his intentions to resign from the City Fire Marshal's position in October of 1998. Koenig had been the fire marshal for many years.

Harrell was appointed as the temporary Fire Marshal by the council and a permanent replacement will be named at next months council meeting when Harrell will submit a list of names of persons interested in the job. Motion by Ray Womack and seconded by Edwin Weiss.

City Secretary Debbie Gosnell is to check with the State Fire Marshal's Office to verify the qualifications for the position of City Fire Marshal.

Other items on Tuesday's agenda: Cross Plains Police Chief Don Gosnell met with the council to give his monthly report.

There were 45 calls for service in December. Two were criminal cases, two accidents, one DWI, sixty-six traffic citations issued, thirty-eight warning tickets, three family disturbances, and four thefts. The report was accepted with a motion by Edwin Weiss and sec-

onded by Jerry Cassle. Bob Hill, the Cross Plains City

Judge, gave the council a report on his office's activities. There were 66 traffic citations, 21 remain outstanding for December and 17 are still outstanding for November. Sixteen "reminder letters" have been sent out on the outstanding citations he said.



Hammons Delivered Informative Program to Senior Citizens

Glyn Hammons, retired Abilene Social Security District Manager and current Volunteer Advisor of the National Committee to Preserve Social Security and Medicare, presented an interesting program at the Senior Citizens Center last Friday.

Ken Hargis, current Abilene Social Security District Manager, was unable to attend due to heart surgery earlier in the week. He is reported to be recovering nicely.

Hammons began by stressing that NOW is a critical time concerning Social Security's future. He felt that changes will be made within the next year or two and he is working to make sure these changes will be what "you" consider desirable.

increase in Social Security was discussed. He informed us that it is based on a nation-wide inflation factor. This year was a very small increase, according to several seniors present.

The so-called Notch babies were explained. Mr. Hammons stated that in 1972 the Social Security Administration changed the way benefits were determined because they were increasing too fast. It was recognized that the procedure would soon break the system. This affected people born in 1917 and later. Hammons said, "There was never such a thing as the Notch group."

The change resulted in the people born in 1917 receiving less benefits than those one year earlier (1916). "There should have been a phase-in period rather than the sudden change," Hammons remarked. He personally doesn't feel that anything will ever be done concerning the Notch issue, which incidentally would take a formal act by the Congress to transpire.

In accordance with the grant obligations, the facility must be opened to the general public, all other requirement have been met.






Eunice Oleta Mauldin Griffith Seale





One of my mothers quotes which she reiterated to me was, "they said was the biggest liar in the world," bar none. COULD BE! Any "theys"





One favorite saying of one of my Bible teachers was: "The Bible is its best commentary on itself." He encouraged us to read a text at least seven times before referring to what anyone else had to say about its explanation. He also encouraged us to read whatever else God said on the topic, subject or text, in the other part of the Bible. Many Bibles have a reference system to help you find such -- some help, some don't! I have traced references that left me wondering where the editor or publisher was coming from in considering them legitimate references. He had to be coming from prejudice or a preconceived idea. In that regard, another of my teacher's favorite sayings was a quote from another preacher: "The Bible sure does shed a lot of light on those commentaries!"

Try studying, for instance, all of what the Bible has to say about baptism. Let the Bible be its own commentary on the topic or subject. Isn't it interesting, for instance, that the apostle John was inspired by the Holy Spirit to record, John 3:23 -- "Now John also was baptizing in Aenon near Salim, because there was much water there (emphasis mine). And they came and were baptized." And isn't it interesting that in the record of the Ethiopian eunuch's conversion, Acts 8, that when he was baptized, "both Philip and the eunuch went down into the water, and he (Philip) baptized him (eunuch)" (emphasis and parenthesis mine), verse 38. And the next verse says "they came up out of the water ... " (emphasis mine).

These are but two of the near 100 references to "baptism" (or its derivative) in the New Testament. Does even one of them even hint that "baptism" means anything less than "immersion" -- the definition of the word "baptism" in the first place? No, someone else may make that claim, but not God in His word.

I encourage you to consider the two savings of my teacher and see if they don't make Godly, Biblical sense... Can we study further?

seconded by Ray Womack. Donna Wagner met with the council concerning Avenue I in western ·Cross Plains.

Avenue I is designated as a City Street, but has never been opened. Wagner requested the council trade 50 feet of property designated for Avenue I for 50 foot of her property west of the present Avenue I between 11th and 13th Streets. The reason for the trade was to allow Wagner more property on the west side of her home which sets on the east side of the designated Avenue I.

Jerry Cassle moved to give Wagner the 50 feet designated for Avenue I in exchange for Lot 3, of Block 94, and Lot 1 and Lot 8 of Block 95, in the Central Addition. The motion was seconded by Ray Womack and approved.

After a closed door session the council approved the purchase of 22 acres east of Cross Plains by the Cross Plains Economic Development Corporation.

Development Corporation representative Denise Coulter said the land will be used as a possible site for a small manufacturing plant in order to bring some jobs to the local community.

"When someone is interested in moving a business to a new location, we need to have a site where they can build," said Coulter. "The land will be purchased with funds collected from the Economic Development Sales Tax," she said.

The pasture land is located just east of the Cross Plains City limits on Highway 36 and has been studied for access to city utilities.

Jerry Cassle made the motion to approve the purchase and was seconded by Edwin Weiss.

Key completes deployment to Mediterranean

Navy Petty Officer 2nd Class Christopher Key, son of Kayla King of Weatherford and Alan C. Key of Cross Plains, recently completed a six-month deployment to the Mediterranean Sea aboard the destroyer USS Stump, home ported in Norfolk, Virginia.

During the deployment, Key participated in several major international exercises to increase battle readiness and interoperability with other naval forces. These exercises included Sharem 125, Matador Livex '98 and Rescue Eagle '98 While deployed, Key had the opportunity to visit Spain, where crew members participated in community relations projects. While visiting Odessa, Ukraine and Constanta, Romania, crew members renovated housing for children affected with active tuberculosis and HIV. Destroyers, like Key's ship, have traditionally been the workhorses of the U.S. Navy, defending battle groups against threats from land, air, above and below the sea. Equipped with Tomahawk cruise missiles, Harpoon anti-ship missiles and Sca Sparrow Missiles, USS Stump is capable of hitting enemy targets hundred of miles away. In addition, Key's ship carries two helicopters with sonar and torpedo capabilities, expanding the ship's reach. The 1992 graduate of Cross Plains High School joined the Navy in September 1993.

concentrating on ways to preserve Social Security for the Baby Boomers. If no changes were made in the system, which is based on intermediate projection, full benefits could be paid until 2034. After that time, only 75 percent of benefits could be paid. Some support extending the retirement age and privatization theories are also being researched. A one percent increase in Social Security tax from the employee and the employer is another possibility.

Mr. Hammons expressed that the best chose in his opinion would be a "medium range" -- .vith some privatization. "We neeu .. be cautious in what we sacrifice in th present Social Security program toward privatization," he stated.

Investing Social Security funds in stock market could prove risky, and it would benefit private investors rather than helping individuals. If the market fell, it could affect Social Security benefits. Currently Social Security funds can only be invested in government securities.

"Chances for a decision may be likely this year," Hammons noted. He encouraged citizens to contact their representatives now, as to their opinion on how the situation might be determined.

Aspects of disability social security, formulas for determining social security benefits, explanations of SSI, Medicare and Medicaid were presented. An interesting fact was that SSI is administered by the Social Security office and Medicaid by the state, but neither are paid out of Social Security allocations, but rather general funds.

Conner explained to the commissioners about information on bridge inspections that had been mailed to them. TxDOT inspects all bridges in the state as required by federal and state laws.

A bridge northeast of Putnam, on County Road 314 across Battle Creek, brought the most concern as it had been previously recommended for closure and Conner again advised the same action.

Five other bridges were recommended to be "in need of attention" by Conner. These bridges have flat metal plate decking which lowers their weight rating. "Corrugated metal decking would be a better choice of material," said conner. "These bridges are not unsafe, but could be improved," he added.

The location of the five bridges with metal plate decks are on CR 484 across Mexia Creek, on CR 305 just north of FM 2945, CR 429 near Cross Plains, and two bridges on CR 406 near the Dressy Community (southeast of Cross Plains).

Commissioners decided to take no action on the matter. Conner is to send Commissioner Holland estimated cost for replacing the Battle Creek Bridge. If the bridge is replaced Callahan County would pay 10%, the State of Texas 10%, and the Federal Government 80% of the costs.
