Councilman resigns & temporary fire marshal appointed during monthly council meeting Jan. 5

The Cross Plains City Council accepted the resignation of a councilman and appointed a temporary fire marshal during their regular meeting Tuesday, January 5.

William C. Pringle had submitted a written resignation that was read to the council. No reason was given for his stepping down from the government position.

Pringle had been appointed to finish 8 months of a previous councilman's term and then was elected to a two year term that was to end in May of this year. Jerry Cassle made the motion to accept the resignation and was seconded by Edwin Weiss which passed unanimously.

The council discussed waiting until the May elections to fill Pringle's chair on the governing body.

Cross Plains Fire Chief Bob Harrell met with the council to request a replacement for James Oscar Koenig who had given his intentions to resign from the City Fire Marshal's position in October of 1998. Koenig had been the fire marshal for many years.

Harrell was appointed as the temporary Fire Marshal by the council

and a permanent replacement will be named at next month's council meeting when Harrell will submit a list of names of persons interested in the job. Motion by Ray Womack and seconded by Edwin Weiss.

City Secretary Debbie Gosnell is to check with the State Fire Marshal's Office to verify the qualifications for the position of City Fire Marshal.

Other items on Tuesday's agenda: Cross Plains Police Chief Don Gosnell met with the council to give his monthly report.

There were 45 calls for service in December. Two were criminal cases, two accidents, one DWI, sixty-six traffic citations issued, thirty-eight warning tickets, three family disturbances, and four thefts.

The report was accepted with a motion by Edwin Weiss and seconded by Jerry Cassle.

Bob Hill, the Cross Plains City Judge, gave the council a report on his office's activities. There were 66 traffic citations, 21 remain outstanding for December and 17 are still outstanding for November. Sixteen "reminder letters" have been sent out on the outstanding citations he said.

EDC makes land purchase Monday

The Economic Development Corporation of Cross Plains made a land purchase for the future growth of Cross Plains.

Economic Development Corp. Executive Director Denise Coulter said, "We need to have land readily available if a company is looking at moving to our area." A small manufacturing plant is what the development corporation is hoping to entice to move to Cross Plains.

"Something that is stable and

would furnish some jobs for local citizens," said Coulter when asked what kind of manufacturing plant. "We have some prospects, but nothing definant yet," she added.

The 22 acres of land was purchased from Fred Landolt and lies just outside the east city limits of Cross Plains on the north side of Highway 36 said officials.

The \$38,000 paid for the property had been raised from the 1/2 cent sales tax revenue's that are ear tagged for local economic development. The Cross Plains City Council approved the purchase at their last meeting.

C. P. Veterinary Clinic Opening in Summer of '99

Dr. Curtis D. "C.D." Creach, Jr., DVM of Hamilton, will be opening a veterinary clinic in Cross Plains. Dr. Creach currently resides in Hamilton (70 miles southeast of Cross Plains on Hwy. 36.), with his wife Barbie, and 9 month-old son Caden. Dr. Creach graduated from Tarleton State University with a B.S. degree in Veterinary Science and Doctorate in Veterinary Medicine. Immediately following graduation from Texas A&M in May 1996, he went to work for Washington Animal Clinic in Brenham. He then returned to his hometown of Hamilton, in May of 1997, to work with Dr. Bill Craig at Hamilton County Veterinary Clinic. The Cross Plains Veterinary Clinic

will provide comprehensive services for small and large animals. Dr. Creach is still in the process of locating a site to build the clinic in Cross Plains. When this is completed, construction at the site will begin, with an expected completion date of July 1, 1999. For those in need of veterinary services between now and then, you can contact Dr. Creach at (254) 386-3659 (home), (254) 386-7103 (mobile phone), or 1-800-330-6009 (pager) to set up an appointment. Due to current obligations at Hamilton County Veterinary Clinic, Dr. Creach will be limited to mobile veterinary services on evenings and weekends until the clinic is constructed and open full time.

Hammons Delivered Informative Program to Senior Citizens

Glyn Hammons, retired Abilene Social Security District Manager and current Volunteer Advisor of the National Committee to Preserve Social Security and Medicare, presented an interesting program at the Senior Citizens Center last Friday.

Ken Hargis, current Abilene Social Security District Manager, was unable to attend due to heart surgery earlier in the week. He is reported to be recovering nicely.

Hammons began by stressing that NOW is a critical time concerning Social Security's future. He felt that changes will be made within the next year or two and he is working to make sure these changes will be what "you" consider desirable.

The 1.5 percent cost of living increase in Social Security was discussed. He informed us that it is based on a nation-wide inflation

factor. This year was a very small increase, according to several seniors present.

The so-called Notch babies were explained. Mr. Hammons stated that in 1972 the Social Security Administration changed the way benefits were determined because they were increasing too fast. It was recognized that the procedure would soon break the system. This affected people born in 1917 and later. Hammons said, "There was never such a thing as the Notch group."

The change resulted in the people born in 1917 receiving less benefits than those one year earlier (1916). "There should have been a phase-in period rather than the sudden change," Hammons remarked. He personally doesn't feel that anything will ever be done concerning the Notch issue, which incidentally would take a formal act by the Congress to transpire.

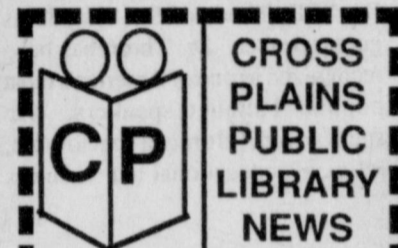

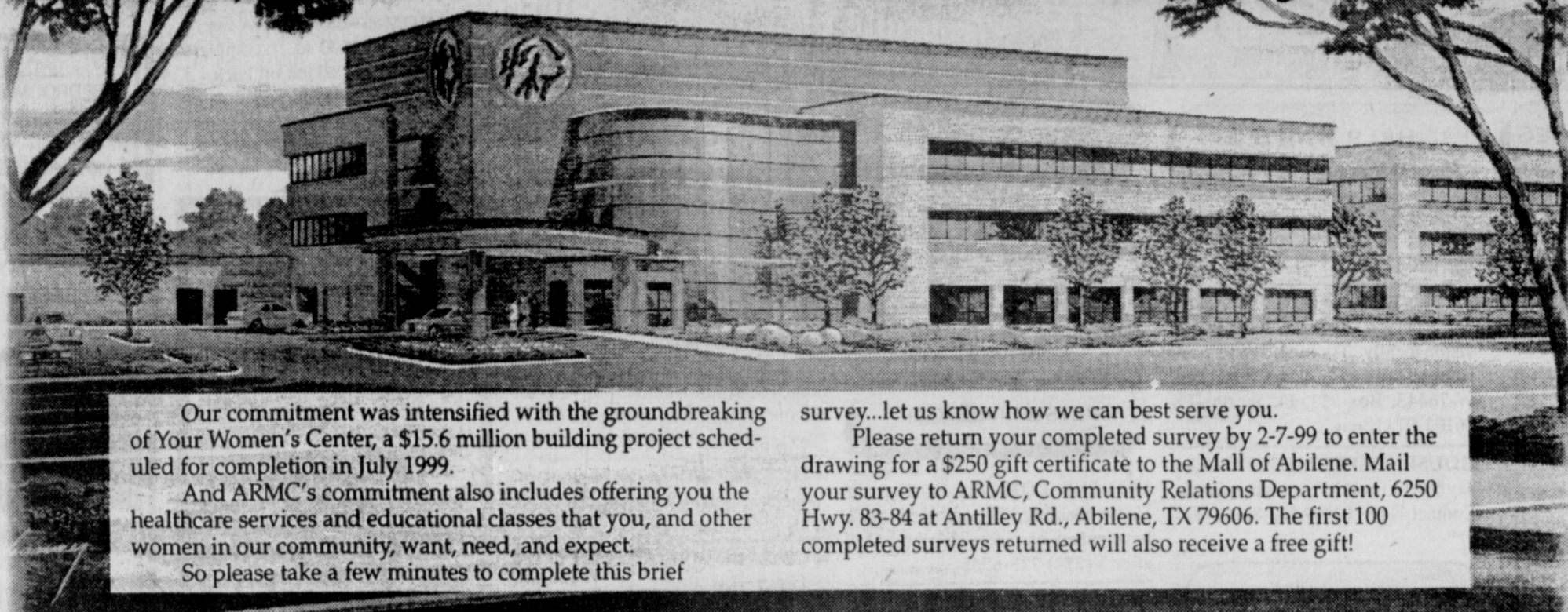

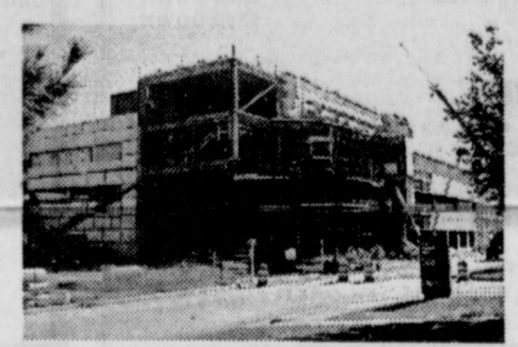
