



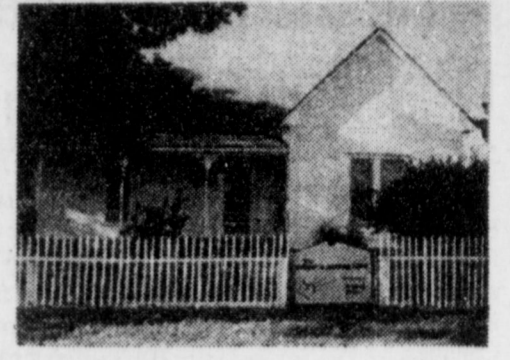

You may think I live in the "wild kingdom" by now, but being just 12 miles north of Cross Plains gives you the opportunity to see many animals. I feel like every trip to town is an adventure. If you just drive and never discover anything interesting, you've missed the boat!

When relatives and friends visit they can't believe I live out in the sticks. Of course, it only seems that way if you drive through the country route. It is only two miles off Highway 206 the other way.

Recently I saw a wild turkey gobbler in full strut, which is rare. They are beautifully colored when their feathers are spread. Usually wild turkeys are on the run, but he was handsomely displayed in all his glory.

I asked my husband why we haven't been seeing any deer and he explained that they are staying in the brush because it is the time of year for their fawns to be born.

I got a close-up of a large bobcat one evening after dark on my way home. He was just a few yards down the dirt road from the highway. This insured the fact that I am not walking at night if the car breaks down.

A few weeks ago the coyotes had been really loud down by the creek in the evenings. However this past week they are not howling. It is the opinion of some folks that coyotes do not call to each other when they have little ones in the spring. It is their way of protecting their pups. I caught a peek of two coyotes crossing the road. They were healthy looking but always appear sly.

It is time for copperheads and Richard has already killed two large ones out in the pasture. Thank goodness, I haven't seen one around the house. I would probably just freak-out if one bit me. A neighbor was talking about a sand rattler which only has a button and one rattler. This rattler doesn't make as much noise as the regular rattle snake, so you have less warning. Keep a sharp look-out for those crawling critters.

On the tamer side -- on the way to work I admire the baby miniature burros and their mothers. The two are getting their morning grooming about the time I pass by. One foal is dark in color and the other light. They are so cute with those big ears! You see burros with cow and sheep herds for protective measures.

Spring brings a new population of calves and they are fun to watch -- they are so curious. There are two small bull calves who consistently approach the pickup with great boldness. They quickly run off bucking when you reach out or speak to them.

My little granddaughter, Tatym, was approaching the two orphan calves when the little bull lowered his head and shook it at her. She decided to run but unfortunately Ferdinand pursued. He stopped before getting near her, but Mimmy was on the way for the rescue. You just never know what any animal will do. I think Tatym's small size threw the calf and he was just investigating.

### "Howdy Neighbor" exhibit at Western Heritage Classic

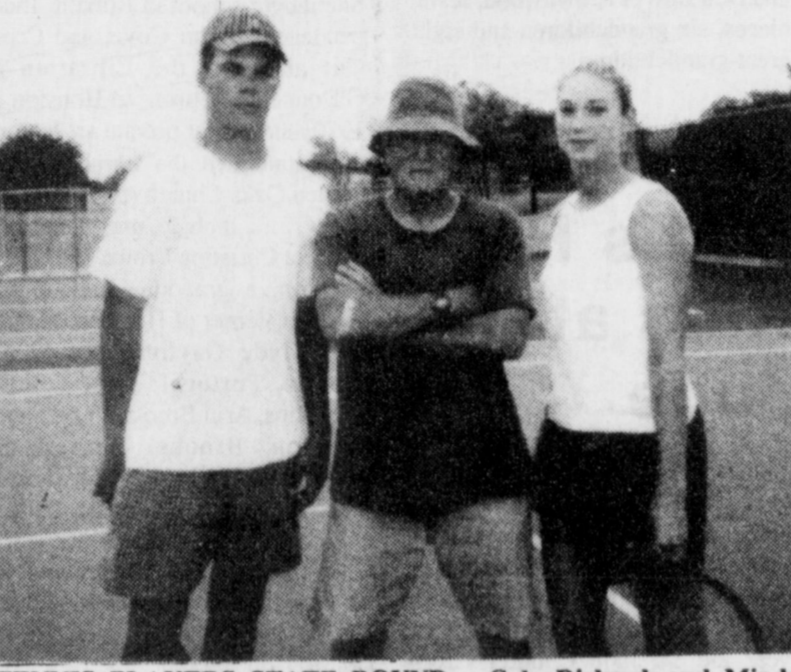

The Exhibit gives towns in the Abilene trade area an opportunity to promote history, special events and important features significant in each community. Booths will be open 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Saturday, May 8, in an open pavilion just north of the Round Building on the Expo grounds.

The Western Heritage Classic is a major event for the region attracting some 30,000 visitors and offering fun for the whole family. The Regional tournament was held at the tennis center on the campus of Hardin Simmons University.

Team members were Coby Richards boys singles and Mindy Mitchell girls singles.

Both Coby and Mindy won 1st place and in four matches never lost a set. These two are the first tennis players to come out of Regional in 1st place for boys and girls.

Mindy is also the first girls singles player to advance to state two years in a row as a Regional 1st place finisher.

### TMCN Luncheon Held Locally

Texas Midwest Community Network held a luncheon in Cross Plains at Jean's Feed Barn on April 28. Denise Coulter, Economic Development Corp. Coordinator for Cross Plains, delivered a brief welcome and stated that 13 communities were represented.

Nicki Harle, representing Texas Midwest Community Network, noted that the luncheon was the largest in attendance in a series of three. She reported on Texas Midwest Community Network Day in Austin which was attended by 400 individuals. A tourism workshop will be held June 8 in Abilene and she encouraged community leaders to attend.

Spokespersons from Albany, Eastland, Cisco, Baird, Rising Star and Cross Plains presented updates of their community's progress and upcoming events.

Lisa Sanders, Regional Coordinator for Texas Forts Trail, was the guest speaker for the luncheon. The Texas Forts Trail is a heritage tourism partnership of the Texas Historical Commission and encompasses a 650-mile loop of West Central Texas, covering 25 counties.

Her presentation explained the promotion of tourism through eight Texas Forts including Fort Chadbourne, Bronte; Fort Griffin State Historical Park, Albany; Fort Phantom Hill, Abilene; Fort Concho National Historic Landmark, San Angelo; Fort McKavett State Historical Park, Jacksboro; Fort Belknap, Graham; and Fort Mason, Mason.

There has already been a 25 percent increase in visitation to Texas since the Fort Trails were established. Tourists want to see cowboys and animals and as she stated, "We have both!" We just see them every day and think nothing about their novelty.

Sanders works closely with the Albany Fandangle and remarked how the publicity of the Fandangle and the Fort Trails benefited both. The final location will be the Eula Community Center for an industry sponsored lunch, plus a presentation of TDA Laws and Regulations by Billy Henderson.

The event will award 3 CEU's for holders of a Texas Department of Agriculture pesticide applicator's license.

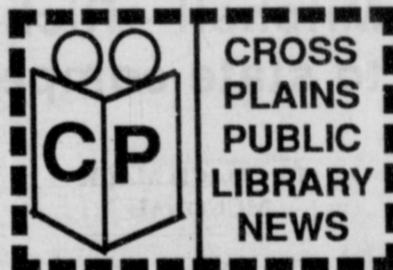
## Kids And Bikes Help Kids at St. Jude

### Making potato lefse..

I walked into the kitchen as Sweet Pea was dusting herself liberally with flour. Cheeks. Shirt. Hair. And an extra dab on the nose. Then she slapped her hands together and flour dust powdered the air, settling on the table, the chair, the floor, and the dog.

I spoke to the flour-daubed child, and she answered. She acted as if everyone walks around with flour on their nose.

It's a ritual. She and Peanut were getting ready to make cookies.

It's all Mrs. Barstad's fault. I wrote a feature story about her once. We were all living on the West Coast, but she was from Minnesota and frequently made potato lefse for her family and friends.

She told me the story would best be told by demonstration, so she invited me to her kitchen.

The whole house smelled warm and fragrant, as she greeted me with smiling eyes, wearing a bright blue sweatshirt painted with chickadees in the snow. They may be Minnesota's state bird, I'm not sure, but they are esteemed, she says, because they sing to you on cold winter mornings.

Mrs. Barstad loved chickadees, and was very proud of that sweatshirt. She said it reminded her of her home town and all the relatives back home. And she loved to make lefse. Even more, she loved to watch people eat her lefse.

She ushered me into the kitchen where she had a teapot brewing under a knitted tea cozy. The pot itself was from Sweden, a treasure from her mother and the Old Country. We ate home-made sugar cook-

ies and drank tea while we talked about her family in Minnesota and her years of making lefse.

After a bit, she went to the counter where she had potatoes already cooked and mashed. All the ingredients were laid out, ready for use, and I thought how organized she was. Half done already. This would be a snap.

Wrong. Preparing potato lefse is for people who have time to cook, and who love lefse so much they don't mind the time it takes.

So Mrs. Barstad began. "Step One," she said. "First, you throw a little flour around." She dipped her hands into the flour bin, slapped some on her sweatshirt, patted her hair, and dabbed her cheeks. We laughed.

She said there's a reason for this. Once you've tossed some flour around, you don't mind the mess that accumulates when preparing the dish.

When we were finished and cleaned up and enjoying the lefse of our labors, I took a picture of Mrs. Barstad serving up a plate of the Scandinavian specialty. She looked like she was having a great deal of fun. Her eyes were glowing, her cheeks were rosy, her hair and shirt were still dusted with flour.

So when I taught Peanut how to bake cookies one day, Sweet Pea poked her head around the corner and told me I forgot the most important thing about cookie baking.

She took over. "First," she said, "you throw a little flour around..." The air was thick with the ritual of two little cooks in my kitchen, and laughter.

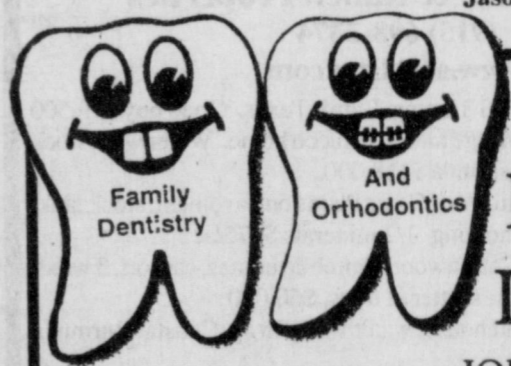
