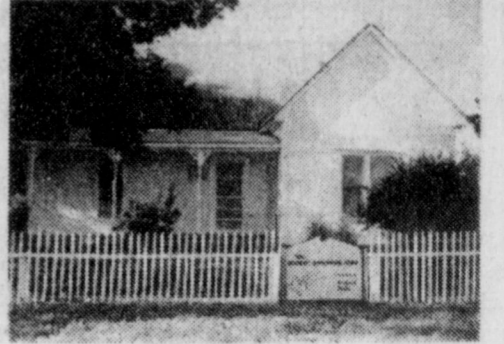

Buffalo Stadium Improvements Reported

After receiving funds from various sources, Cross Plains I.S.D. purchased used bleachers for the cost of \$50,000.

The old bleachers on the home side were taken down in June 1999. In July, ten prisoners and one guard arrived from the John Middleton Unit in Abilene and began construction on the new bleachers. The group was expected to work for two weeks, but was unable to return after six days as a result of an incident at the prison.

According to Jackie Tension, superintendent, the old bleachers were approximately fifty years old and no longer met A.D.A. (American Disabilities Act) specifications.

"One of the goals of Cross Plains I.S.D. is to improve facilities and to have one of the best physical plants of any Class A school in the area," Mr. Tension said.

The ongoing construction for the home side, as well as the visitors' side, is expected to be completed by the summer of 2000.

Local Woman Publishes Spiritual Autobiography

A local woman is featured in an anthology of spiritual autobiographies published this month by Chicago Spectrum Press. Titled *Spiritual Autographs: Southern Women Tell Their Stories*, the volume of life stories draws together a diverse group of spiritual perspectives.

Lou Rodenberger of Cross Plains is professor emeritus of English at McMurtry University in Abilene. She writes reviews and essays about Texas women writers and is co-editor of *Texas Women Writers: A Tradition of Their Own*, a history of women writers in Texas, published by Texas A&M Press.

Her autobiography is one among thirty selected to represent the varieties of religious experience among women in the South. The volume was edited by four East Texas women. It includes stories by Mary Carter Smith, Maryland's official "griot," Valerie Sayers, author of five novels, and Njoki McElroy, nationally known storyteller and poet.

SATURDAY BARBARIAN FESTIVAL PROMISES A DAY OF FAMILY FUN

The Cross Plains Barbarian Festival and Cook-off will kick off this Saturday morning, September 4, at 9:30 a.m. with a parade. The parade promises to be very interesting with numerous entrants scheduled to participate. There are many classic and antique cars, a motorcycle club with 20-25 members, the original Higginbotham's horse drawn delivery cart, the Cross Plains High School Band, several floats sponsored by local organizations, riding clubs, etc. Please come out and view the parade to show Cross Plains' support for the organizations and individuals that participate. School will dismiss at 2:30 p.m. on Friday, September 3 for the Labor Day holiday. Buses will run at this time.

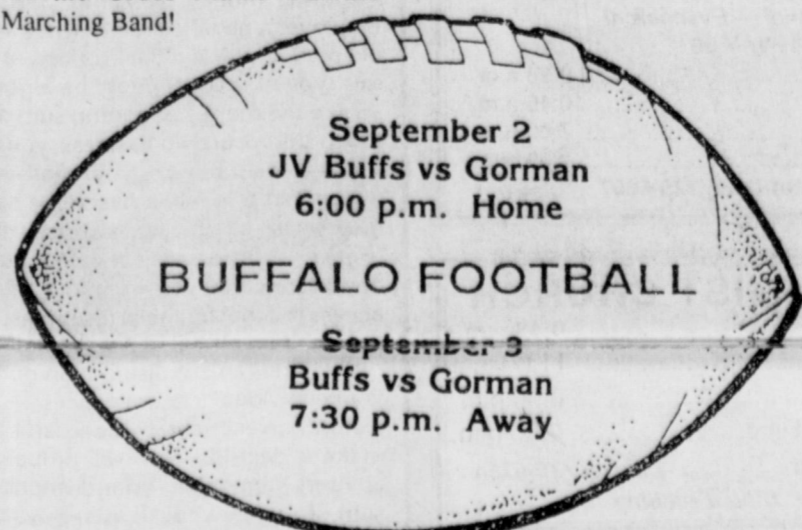
There will be no classes on Monday, September 6. Classes will resume at regular time on Tuesday, September 7.

West Texas Utilities Company joins new EPA initiative, reinforces environmental stewardship commitment

ABILENE— West Texas Utilities Company (WTU) has become a Charter Partner in the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) new voluntary partnership aimed at reducing emissions of sulfur hexafluoride (SF6).

SF6 is a gas used by the electric power industry as an insulator in electrical transmission and distribution equipment, such as circuit breakers. The SF6 Emissions Reduction Partnership for Electric Power Systems is an EPA greenhouse gas reduction initiative.

"We have chosen to reduce SF6 emissions to further our goals of good environmental stewardship, improving the quality of customer service and achieving economic savings," said David Teeter, WTU Director of Transmission and Distribution Operations.

EPA is pleased to join WTU in the new voluntary program. Kathleen Hogan, Director of EPA's Atmospheric Pollution Programs, said, "EPA applauds WTU as an industry leader for their efforts to reduce emissions of SF6. By joining with EPA in this new partnership, WTU is showing that protection of our

global environment and good business can go hand in hand."

Electric power companies that join the partnership sign a Memorandum of Understanding that details the roles of the partner and EPA.

According to the memorandum, partners agree to: (1) where possible, estimate SF6 emissions starting sometime between 1990 and 1998; (2) annually inventory emissions of SF6 using an EPA protocol; (3) establish a strategy for replacing older pieces of equipment; (4) implement SF6 recycling; (5) ensure that only knowledgeable personnel handle SF6 and (6) submit annual progress reports.

EPA will: (1) act as a clearinghouse for technical information on successful strategies to reduce SF6 emissions; (2) provide partners with recognition for their achievements in reducing SF6 emissions; and (3) serve as a repository for data on the emissions reduction achievements of the partners.

WTU is a subsidiary of Central and South West Corporation (NYSE: CSR), a Dallas-based public utility holding company.

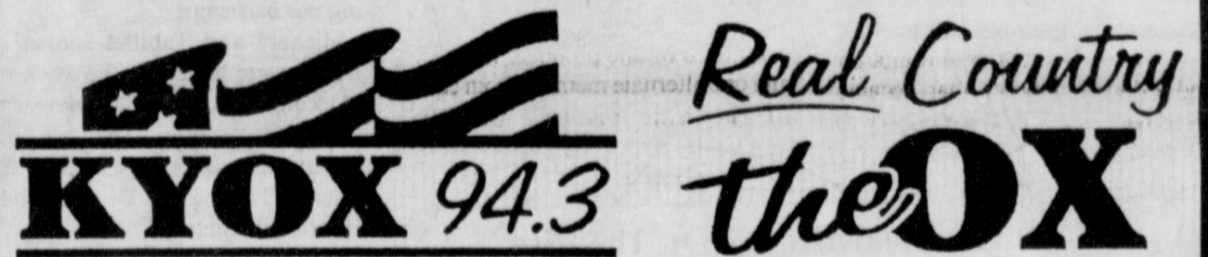

County's unemployment rate falls to 5% in July

The unemployment rate in Callahan County for the month of July dropped eight-tenths of one percentage point to 5.0%, according to jobless figures released Monday, August 30 by the Texas Workforce Commission.

Of the 5,804 civilian labor force in Callahan County, 5,512 were employed during July 1999, and 292 were unemployed, giving the county an unemployment rate of 5.0%. The county's unemployment rate one year ago in July 1998 was 4.6%.

Callahan County's unemployment rate was 5.8% in June 1999. Of the 6,021 civilian labor force in the county during June, 5,621 had jobs while 350 or 5.8% were unemployed.

Previous monthly jobless rates in Callahan County included: 4.8% in May 1999, 4.2% in April, 4.4% in March, 4.7% in February, 5.1% in January 1999, 3.7% in December 1998, 3.8% in November, 3.9% in October, 4.3% in September and

4.1% in August, according to the unemployment figures.

Big Country area counties, bordering Callahan County, and their unemployment rates for July 1999 include: Brown, 4.0%; Coleman, 5.9%; Eastland, 5.4%; Jones, 3.3%; Runnels, 4.2%; Shackelford, 5.4%; Stephens, 4.6%; and Taylor County, 3.7%.

The unemployment rate in Texas for July 1999 was 4.9%, up from the 5.4% unemployment rate reported in June 1999. The state's unemployment rate one year ago in July 1998 was 5.3%.

Of the 10,460,700 civilian labor force in the state, total employment was 9,952,200 in July. Total unemployment in July 1999 was 508,500.

The United States unemployment rate was 4.5% in July 1999. The U.S. unemployment rate for the previous month of June was 4.5%. The United States unemployment rate one year ago in July 1998 was 4.7 percent.

National Peanut Board Nominees Sought - Sept. 27

USDA Ag Secretary Dan Glickman will appoint one Texas peanut farmer to the National Peanut Board from a list of nominees submitted by the Texas Peanut Producers Board as outlined in the new Peanut Research, Promotion and Education order that became effective July 30. The Order was favored by 66.56 percent of the producers who voted in a national referendum between May 24 and July 2, 1999.

The Order is authorized under the Commodity Research, Promotion and Consumer Information Act of 1996 and was developed to finance a coordinated program of generic promotion, information, and related research designed to maintain and expand markets for peanuts via a 1

percent national checkoff on all peanuts produced and marketed in the U.S. beginning with the 1999 crop.

The Order will be administered by the National Peanut Board composed of one producer member and one alternate member from each of the nine primary peanut-producing states. The minor peanut-producing states will be represented by a one at-large producer member and a one at-large alternate member.

The Texas nominees will be selected at a special meeting being called by the Texas Peanut Producers Board. According to TPPB Board Chairman Billy Shannon of Quitaque, the nominating meeting has been set for 10:00 a.m., September 27, 1999, at the Taylor County Expo Center, 1982 Lytle Way, Abilene, Texas.

USDA personnel will be present to oversee and to verify eligibility and count ballots. Texas peanut farmers have a vested interest in this new program and the Texas Peanut Producers Board encourages them to make every attempt to participate in this Board member selection process. Any person engaged in the production and sale of peanuts and who owns, or shares the ownership and risk of the crop is eligible to have his/her name placed for nomination.

Big Fires Start Out Small — Don't Blow It

WEST TEXAS—The Texas Forest Service urges homeowners with property in or near wildland areas to act now to protect themselves from severe wildland fire like the siege of 1998 that burned 142 homes and structures and 193,377 acres.

The potential for another wildland fire of that magnitude exists throughout much of the West. Many states suffered an extremely dry spring with precipitation levels well below normal. Drought conditions exist throughout West and Northeast Texas and are currently classified as "extreme." In addition, increasing numbers of people have built homes in or near wildland areas that do not have full time (paid) fire departments. These areas depend on local volunteer fire departments to provide protection. Volunteer departments can be overworked in a short while during times of extreme fire danger.

Homeowners in these areas must be responsible for reducing fire hazards on their property. "There are a number of things that homeowners can do that will go a long way toward protecting their homes from wildfires," said Ed Brown, West Texas Wildfire Prevention Team Information Officer. "We strongly encourage homeowners to make their homes more fire-safe now, before the fire season gets worse than it already is."

To that end the Texas Forest Service has launched public education campaigns that outline the steps homeowners should take to protect their homes. For instance, these campaigns recommend that homeowners clean flammable vegetation and debris within 30 feet of their home and outbuildings, trim trees 15 feet away from roofs and keep garden hoses connected to a water supply at all times. Also a 5-gallon garden sprayer charged with water is good to have handy just in case of wildfire. Please don't park vehicles on dry grass. The hot exhaust can ignite tinder dry fuels underneath. Know if your county is one of the many throughout Texas that is under a burn ban order, and please comply with it.




