A community group of volunteers chose to culminate their efforts and repair the dilapidated homes of lowincome and disabled seniors. The wonderful idea caught on and other cities throughout the United States followed suit.

Christmas in April has chapters in 50 states and 145,000 volunteers. As of April 25, 1998, Christmas in April volunteers completed an estimated \$36 million in renovations for lowincome seniors and disabled citizens. Wow, what a terrific accomplishment. 

Eunice Starr's Life Spans 100 Years

What an accomplishment, to live an entire century! Long-time local resident Louvina Eunice Starr was born October 4, 1899, in Axtel, Texas, the daughter of George Lee and Lillie (Pearson) Eager. She was the third child of eight. Her brothers and sisters are William Luther Eager, Mary Eula Hart, Carl Lee Eager, Ara May Wiginton, Virgie Lena Eager, Mabel Jeanette Wiginton and Eldon Collis Eager. Eunice and Collis are the only two living.

Collis will be celebrating his 87th birthday on October 17. The two live independently on the family farm in the house Collis was born. The Eager home has two rooms of the original house; one of which is the parlor. It appears the same as 50 plus years ago. The piano purchased in the early 1900's adds charm and family photos tell the story of the Eager family. Collis noted that this was the room the girls visited with their boyfriends prior to going on a date. When I asked if they were chaperoned he said, "No, there wasn't any reason to. They knew what was expected of them by our parents."

Eunice is quick to credit her parents for teaching her everyday skills and guiding her spiritually. Her mother was an excellent seamstress and Eunice inherited her creative talents. Her father was a farmer and elder at the Cross Plains Presbyterian Church.

Both Eunice and Collis followed the example set by their parents of being actively involved in the church. Having joined the church when she was 11 years old, she served as a Sunday School teacher for primary class through adult. Other duties included Sunday School Superintendent and was ordained a deacon in her late twenties. Collis has been an elder at the Cross Plains Presbyterian Church since 1941.

Their faith has been a strong hold. Just last year, the two were recognized for having attended every service during the year. This is also a physical accomplishment, as they must climb the huge set of steps at the Presbyterian Church. Eunice walks free of any assistance and Collis uses a cane. Collis demonstrates his compassion by taking Ethel Sims and Mabel Halsell their Sunday School quarterly books so they can keep in touch with the

Eunice has worked in the public most of her life. She was first employed at Hatchett Variety (located in the same location as the former Lane's Variety). For twenty years she was a seamstress in the alteration department at Grissom's Department Store in Abilene. For several years she owned the florist in Cross Plains and sold the business to the late Juanita Mayes. Until she was 82 years old she helped Tim Dillard in his floral business on Mother's Day and special occasions,

Eunice loved working with the flowers and people. She remarked that those she once employed were such "sweet people". She pointed out that the floral business dealt with both happy and sad events in the lives of individuals.

Osteoporosis has dealt Eunice pain and suffering but she remarked, "If the Lord wants me to continue living I know he will help me. I love life still. I never blame the Lord for anything. He is the comforter."

Collis does most of the cooking, but Eunice likes to assist. They refrain from eating salt, sugar and fried foods. Eunice keeps busy altering her clothes by hand, as she cannot see to thread her sewing machine. She always dressed with good taste and still does.

In the past Collis walked to the cattle guard and back daily. He remarked, " I find myself getting closer to the house each time." He has such a neat sense of humor. He recalled starting to school at Deer Plains with my grandmother's brother, Oris Irvin. The two shared double seats until the 7th grade. Collis was well acquainted with all my family and made me feel at home. He retired from tending cattle in 1995 at the age of 83.

Eunice said, "I love my friends and family and enjoy being able to see them. I like to try to keep on keeping on." Her greatest joy in life has been

Big Country Beef Cattle Conference Thurs., Oct. 7

Beef Quality Management is a concept heard by all cattlemen now days. But, what is Beef Quality Management, and how much reward is possible for creating quality beef? The answers to these and other popular questions can be had at the upcoming Big Country Beef Cattle Conference to be held on Thursday, October 7.

The program is being coordinated by the Texas Agricultural Extension Offices in Callahan, Taylor and Shackelford Counties. This program will be dedicated to helping cattle producers identify management practices and cattle genetic selection criteria that will prevent the production of beef products that do not conform to industry targets and, in turn, that will enhance consumer satisfaction, increase profitability, and improve beef's competitiveness.

The conference will have a morning and afternoon session. The morning session will begin with registration from 8:30 a.m.- 9:00 a.m. at the Abilene Auction. Dr. Ron Gill, Dr. Steve Hammack and Randy Carson will then judge and evaluate live cattle and discuss the major functional traits important in today's beef production industry.

The morning progresses with presentations from the Texas Beef Council and Texas Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association. The morning session will conclude with Donnell Brown of R.A. Brown Ranch, Throckmorton. He will discuss Beef Quality Improvements through Bull Selection. Following Brown's presentation, we will depart for the Taylor County Extension Office for a sponsored catered lunch and to view exhibitors booths.

After lunch we will resume with the afternoon portion of the program with Emory Boring, Extension Entomologist, and his discussion on External Parasite Control. Prior to a 2:30 p.m. break, Dr. Dan Hale, Extension Meat Specialist, will discuss and take producers through a Beef Quality Challenge. During his session, Dr. Hall will provide producers with a background on the factors that influence the value and quality of cattle as well as demonstrate the difficulty in attempting to estimate value when simply looking at a feeder calf or finished feedlot steers.

Following the break, the program's final discussion will be on the Cattle Market Outlook with Dr. Jason Johnson, Extension Economist. The program will conclude at 4:00 p.m. Two CEU's will be offered for the day's program.

Emergency Farm Loan applications being accepted

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by fire hazard that occurred on August 1, 1999, and continuing are being accepted at the Farm Service Agency (FSA) office located in Anson, Marilyn Richer said today. Callahan, Eastland, Jones, Shackelford, Stephens, and Taylor Counties are among 227 counties in Texas recently named by President Clinton eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the fire haz-


Marilyn Richer said farmers may be eligible for loans up to 80 percent of actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 3.75 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FSA emergency loan," Marilyn Richer said. Farmers participating in the Federal Crop Insurance will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until September 1, 2000 but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the farming season," Marilyn Richer said.

FSA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognize farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.

The FSA office in Anson is open from 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Nathaniel J. Swift completed 2nd summer of military training

Midshipman 3/C Nathaniel J. Swift completed his second summer of military training at the US Naval Academy on August 20, 1999, and has resumed his academic studies in the field of Aerospace Engineering. Midn. Swift completed two cruises during his summer training. The first cruise, Atlantic Patrol Training, Midshipman, (LANTPATRAMID) lasted three weeks and was spent on board YP 687, a Naval Academy Yard Patrol training vessel that is 105 feet long and carries a crew of 21 3/C midshipmen, 3 1/C midshipmen, 3 enlisted sailors and 3 officers. Training commenced with a four-day work-up period prior to getting underway. The seven ship Bravo Squadron left the Academy headed for Cape Cod Bay and conducted training exercises while en route. These evolutions consisted of Defensive Tactics, Underway Replenishment, Leapfrogs, Visual Communications, Towing Exercises and anchoring drills. While in Cape Cod Bay, the squadron made a three-day port call in Boston, MA. Upon arrival in Boston, Midn. Swift participated in line handling and sail hoisting on USS Constitution, the oldest commissioned ship in the Navy. Each midshipman was allowed two days of liberty in port with the remaining day spent on duty. While on liberty, Midn. Swift visited the New England Aquarium, Copely Square, Harvard University and Fenway Park. After departing Boston, the squadron headed south to Long Island Sound where a second port call was made in New York City. The squadron moored near the heart of Manhattan next to the USS Intrepid Air and Space Museum. Again the midshipmen were given two days of liberty and one day of Class of 2004.

duty. In New York, Midn. Swift visited the Empire State Building, Times Square, Madison Square Park, USS Intrepid Air and Space Museum, and various other sites of interest along Broadway. He also visited Smithtown, Long Island with some of his crewmates. The squadron returned to the Annapolis area July 29 and anchored in the Chesapeake Bay within sight of the Naval Academy. According to tradition, Midn. Swift officially became a Youngster, Academy slang for Midn 3/C, upon sighting the Academy's Chapel Dome. On the morning of July 30, Midn. Swift was awarded the Command Assistant pin for his performance during the cruise in a ceremony on board YP 687 before the squadron passed in review of the Commandant of Midshipmen, Rear Admiral Roughhead, USN. The cruise ended with the Pass in Review.

Midn. Swift's second cruise, on board NA-15 Frolic, began August 1. Frolic is a 44-foot long, single mast sailing vessel assigned to the Academy's Command Seamanship Training Squadron. Each vessel in the squadron had a crew of six 3/C midshipmen, two 1/C midshipmen and two active or retired officers or sailing instructors. After a seven day work-up, which included a two-day sail in the Chesapeake Bay, the squadron departed for Portsmouth Naval Shipyard, Portsmouth, NH. Upon arrival, after five days at sea in the open ocean, with 4-6 foot seas for three of those days, all hands were granted weekend liberty in Portsmouth, NH, and Kittery, ME. The squadron got underway August 16 to return to the Academy via Long Island Sound and the New Jersey Coast. The CSTS cruise ended upon return to the Academy as Reform of the Brigade of Midshipmen commenced. Midn. Swift earned the Navy D Qualification during this cruise which will allow him to act as senior skipper on any sailing vessel and is valid for the rest of his life. Obtaining the D qualification included being recommended to take a written exam, passing the exam, and also passing another exam on celestial navigation. Next summer Midn. Swift hopes to take a cruise on board a Fleet Ballistic Missile Submarine and to Plebe Summer Weapons Detail for the

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
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
