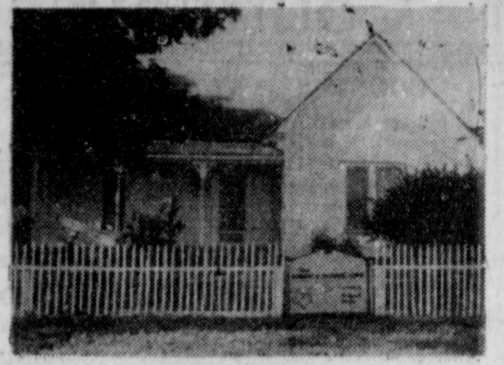

City/Rural Rides Opens

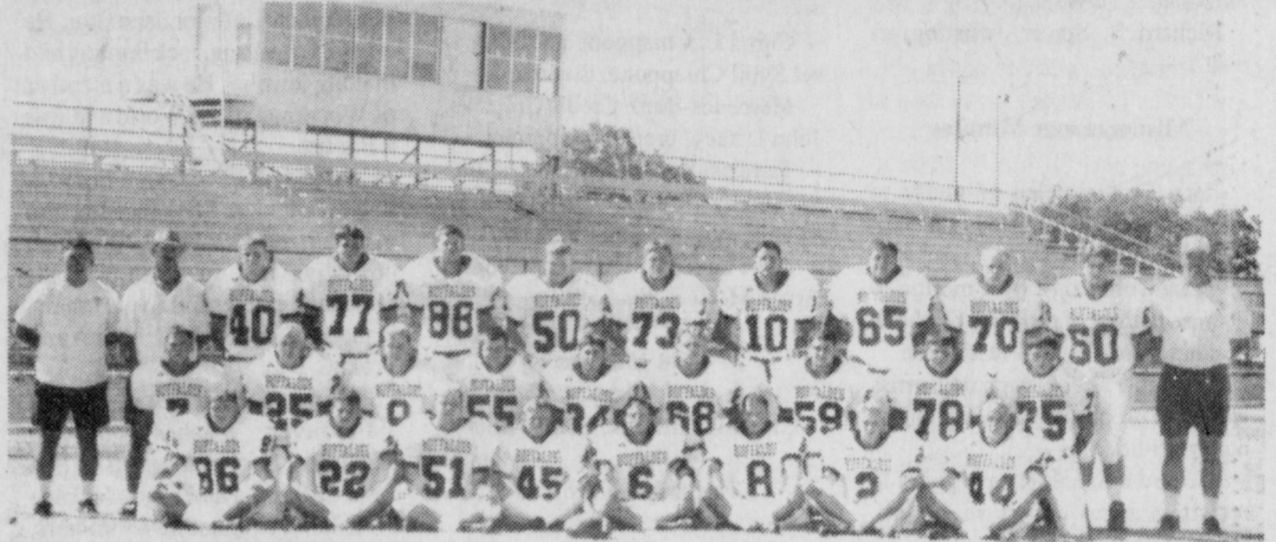

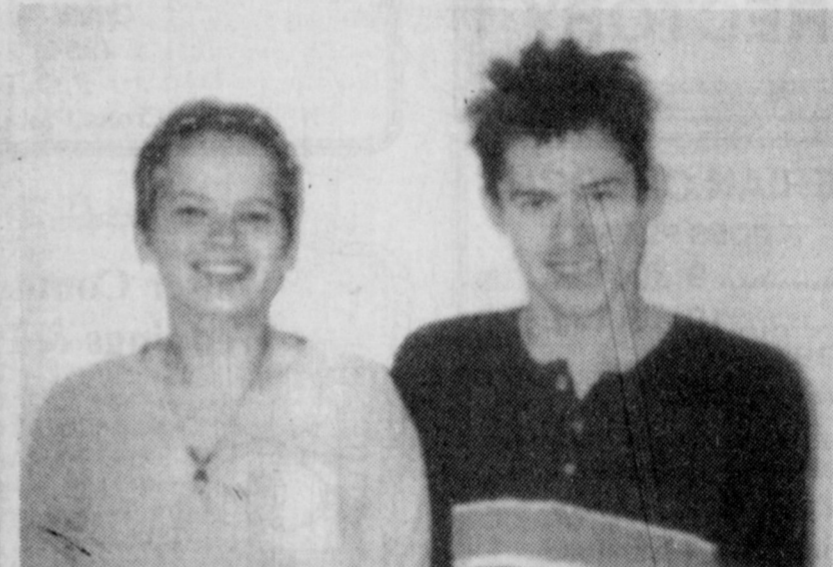
Cross Plains Varsity Named District 12-A Runner-Up

The seminar is one of five held for elected Justices of the Peace so they can fulfill their Continuing Judicial Education Requirements as set forth in Article 27.005 of the Texas Government Code. The seminar addressed topics such as Judicial Ethics, Judicial Decision Making, Traffic Laws, Inquests, Chapter 45, Magistrate Duties and Consulate Issues, Alcohol/Tobacco Laws, Landlord Tenant Issues, Contempt, Small Claims vs Justice Court, Miscellaneous Hearings and Trial Procedure.

CHIP is a State of Texas program to provide insurance for children up to their 19th birthday. Income guidelines for the program are very generous. The most the insurance can cost is \$18 per month to cover all the children in the family.

Results Named For State Cross Country Meet

Well if you spend much time around the Cross Plains area, you know that winning is very important to the students, as well as the Community. This past weekend seven of the hardest working young men got to compete in the State 1A Cross Country Meet. If you don't quite understand the motivation and discipline these 7 young men displayed throughout the year, let me just try to help you understand. Everyday, these men started running at 6:45 a.m. and ran for about 30 minutes. This gave them just enough time to get a quick shower and make it to class on time. In the afternoon they would go to football practice for two hours and get home before dark with just enough time to eat, do homework and get into bed. These 7 men would either play a football game on Thursday or Friday night depending upon whether JV or Varsity, then would have to be ready to go to a Cross Country meet by 7 a.m. Sunday was a day off, and by Monday it was time to start over again. Now let's talk about the state meet.

The Meet took place November 11th in Round Rock, near Austin, at Old Settler's Park. Each of these young men, along with 108 others from around the state competed in a three mile race to determine the state champion. There were 12 full teams and 24 other individual competitors all fighting for the same goal, to call themselves the best. If you have ever been to a cross country meet you know that when the athletes are

through with the run they are completely exhausted, sometimes to the point that most of us can only imagine. The Cross Plains runners not make this race an exception to that. These young men ran through mud and water, up and down hills, just to see how good they could do.

This being the first state meet for any of these young men, as well as myself, we didn't know where we would fit in as far as the other teams were concerned. Finishing was the main goal, as it is in every race, but they still wanted to prove that they deserved to be competing for the Championship. The team finished 11th out of the 12 teams, but those watching knew that Cross Plains had earned their spot among the state's elite running programs. With four freshmen: Andy Bennett 77th, Ryan Mack 91st, Randy Duncan 93rd and Casey Pack 104th, the future looks very bright. Also returning next year will be Josh Hopkins who finished 66th overall in the competition. Two seniors that will be sorely missed are Kyle Wilson who finished 90th, and Nick Dimitri 82nd.

These young men made it a pleasure to coach this year, and I want to thank them for all of their hard work. As a coach, my job was easy, all I had to do was tell them where to run and they did it without complaint. I want to thank them for allowing me to go on this ride. They deserve all the credit they get and probably even more.

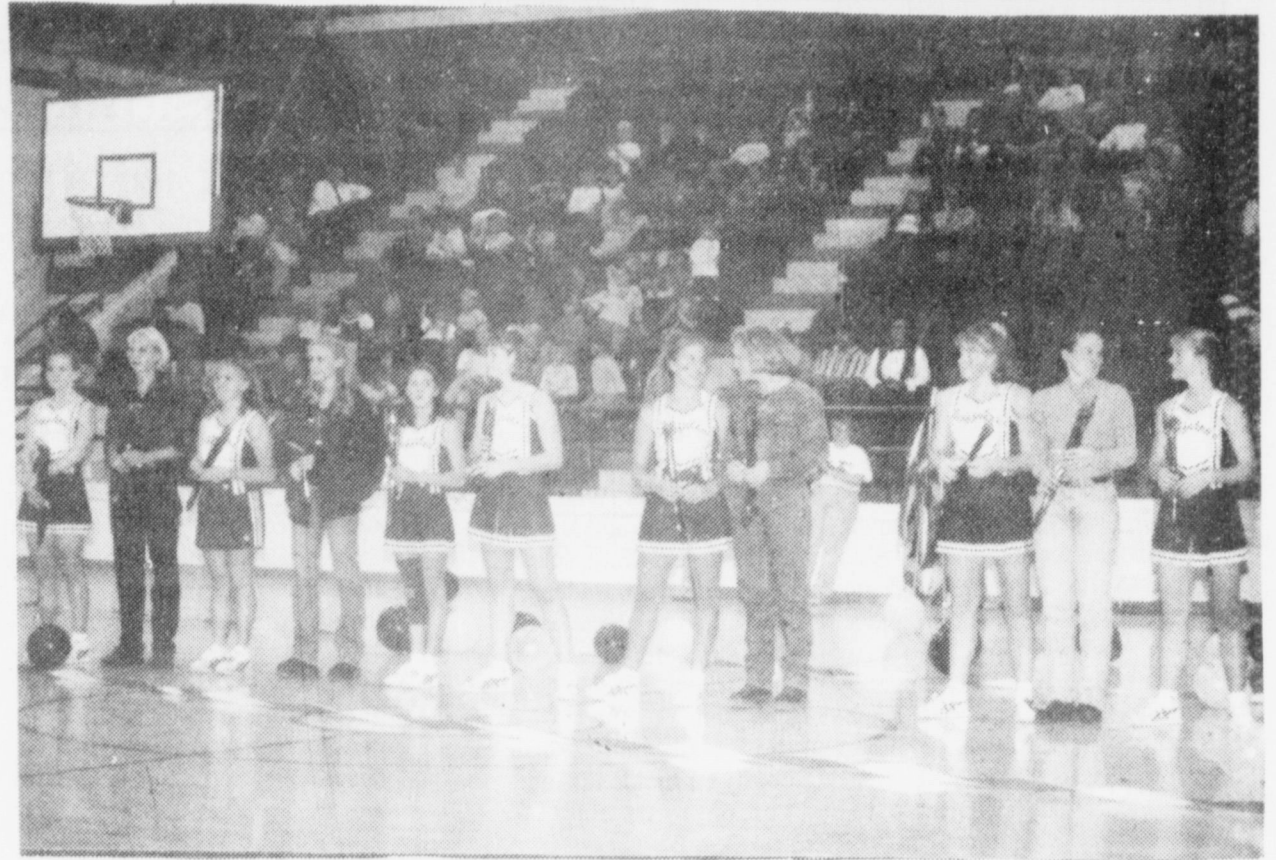

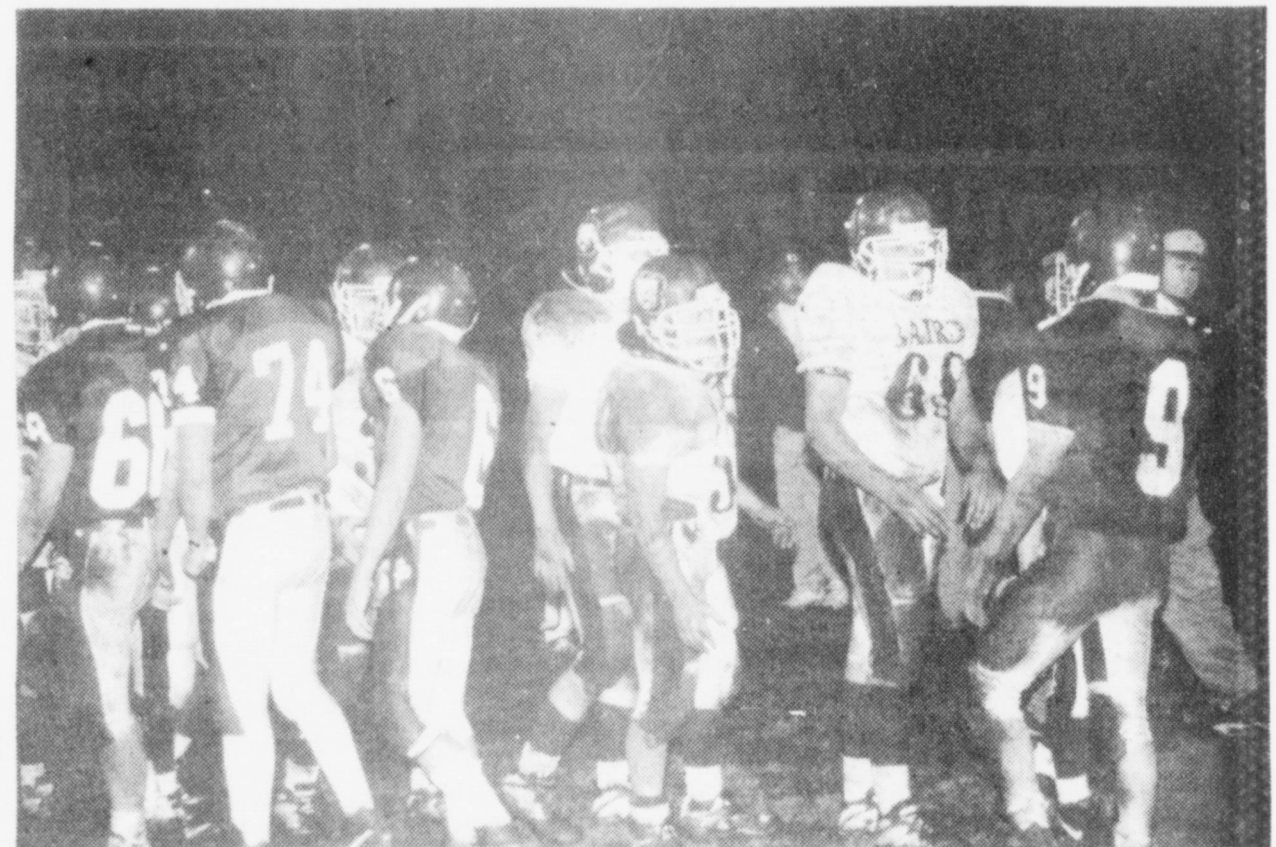
Cody Reed, a senior in Cross Plains High School has been named to Who's Who Among American High School Students 1999-2000, an honor for 5% of our nation's high school students.
