"My Last Christmas????"

At this time of year, our minds automatically turn to the first Christmas. This year, however, my mind is turned to the reality that this is one of my last Christmases, perhaps the very last. In October of 1999, I was diagnosed with Lou Gehrig's Disease, or ALS. My quality of life has deteriorated since that time to a very frustrating level of physical ineptness, especially with my hands. I will not try to list the multitude of small manipulations of everyday life that I can no longer do.

I feel fortunate that my disease does not require radical surgery or therapy, convalescence, trips to Houston for treatment, or other interruptive procedures. Several friends my age have cancer or heart problems, catastrophic disorders. My disease, in contrast, is a calm, gradual, disgusting, maddening encroachment on the quality of life for me and my family and friends. It is a surreal nightmare from which the only awakening is death.

What is one to do in this situation? I grappled with the ultimate reality and decided to do nothing different

Juakana Scott, affectionately known by her family and friends as Kanie, died December 16, 2000, in the Brownwood Regional Medical Center with members of the family at her side. She had waged a courageous one-year battle with cancer but passed from this world peacefully.

from what I have always done enjoy my family, my work and my - but to a greater degree of life comfort in that knowledge. Like the mythic Sisyphus in Camus's discussion of absurdity, I find some comfort in knowing the rules, what to expect, and what not to expect, from life.

I have chosen as my model for living the rest of my life an example told to me by Keith Wells, a close friend and one of the few bonafide heroes I know. As a marine attacking the Japanese fortress of Iwo Jima in World War II, Lt. Wells knew that chances were good he and many of his men would be killed in the coming battle. Wells made his decision not to despair but instead to do what he had been trained to do up to the time he could no longer do that. He remained true to the code of a warrior. I have made the same decision. I am, in a sense, dead already. I will work and write as long as I am able and then accept the inevitability of death, a reality that has been here since I drew my first breath more than sixty years ago. I long assumed I would die in battle, as so many young men did in the wars that bracketed rather than interrupted my life. I remember several friends and a multitude of acquaintances who did not live this long.

I do not know when the end will come or what physical failings will accompany my last gasps on this earth. I just know for certain that the end will come. But I have known that all my life. Dying is part of living. Christ proved that centuries ago with the death of his physical body. With that knowledge, I can face this Christmas the same way I have all of those other wonderful with love, hope Christmasos and joy.

And I am beginning to be curious about what waits for me on the other side.




BFI Announces **Pickup Changes Effective January 2**

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County oil and gas totals lower in Sept.

Oil and gas production figures for September 2000 in Callahan County have recently been released by the Railroad Commission of Texas, and the month's oil production and natural gas production were both lower than in the previous month.

Total gas production in Callahan County for the month of September 2000 was 108,749 MCF. One MCF is equal to 1,000 cubic feet of natural gas.

Total crude oil production in Callahan County for the month of September was 22,227 barrels of oil.

The total oil production in Callahan County during August 2000 was 24,351 barrels of oil. Total gas production in August was 116,994 MCF of natural gas.

Other oil production months for Callahan County include: September 1999 with 21,222 barrels of oil, October with 22,873 barrels, November with 21,686 barrels, December 1999 with 22,404 barrels, January 2000 with 22,083 barrels, February with 22,175 barrels, March with 22,292 barrels, April with

Oil and gas production figures for September 2000 in Callahan County 20,013 barrels, May with 21,121 barrels, June with 23,990 barrels of

oil and July with 20,385 barrels. Big Country area counties oil and gas production for September 2000 include: Brown, 138,520 MCF of gas and 8,186 barrels of oil; Coleman, 156,510 MCF of gas and 27,400 barrels of oil; Eastland, 419,084 MCF of gas and 22,568 barrels of oil; Jones, 56,830 MCF of gas and 61,312 barrels of oil; Runnels, 105,141 MCF of gas and 46,592 barrels of oil; Shackelford, 382,414 MCF of gas and 76,410 barrels of oil; Stephens, 778,600 MCF of natural gas and 236,677 barrels of oil; and Taylor County, 26,729 MCF of gas and 49,220 barrels of oil.

The state's top oil producing county in September was Gaines with 2,717,561 barrels of oil. The top gas producing county in the state in September was Zapata with 24,776,336 MCF.

Texas' oil and gas production in September came from 144,276 oil and 53,980 gas wells.

Many USDA programs available for rural Texans

USDA Rural Development has numerous programs that help rural residents to he able to buy or build a home, repair and/or improve their existing home, go into business for themselves, live in a decent and affordable apartment, drink clean water and have a dependable sewer system, or have updated community facilities — such as fire trucks, hospitals, or community centers.

The Rural Housing Service (RHS) offers loans and grants to verylow, low, and moderate-income persons in towns and cities meeting certain population requirements. There are several programs offered under RHS with varying requirements to aid qualified persons to buy a home, repair their home, or build/maintain multifamily housing units.

RHS also administers the Community Facilities programs that provide Loans and Grants to Governmental Entities (such as towns, cities, counties, hospital, schools, or fire districts, etc.), Nonprofit Organizations and Indian Tribes to construct and improve facilities providing essential community services, and for the purchase of major equipment (such as X-ray machines, fire trucks, etc.) which will provide an essential service to rural residents.

Some examples of eligible types of community facilities are:

-Health Care Services such as hospitals, outpatient clinics, rehab centers, group homes, visiting nurse and home health care providers, nursing homes, assisted living facilities, etc.

-Community, Social or Cultural Services such as schools, libraries, community centers, social services, buildings, museums, theaters, day care facilities, etc.

-Fire, Rescue and Public Safety

Services such as fire stations, fire trucks, rescue vehicles, equipment, etc.

-Transportation Facilities such as streets, buses, airports and hangars, railway spurs, etc.

-Industrial Park Sites (only land acquisition and site preparation).

The Rural Business-Cooperative Service (RBS) offers aid for several different programs relating to business programs. Population limits for RBS assistance range from very small towns to cities up to 50,000. The majority of RBS loans are guaranteed loans which are made in conjunction with a private lender; however, there are other programs which offer direct loans and even some grant funds.

A community's needs for safe and sanitary water and sewage treatment may be met by the Rural Utility Service (RUS) which offers aid to rural communities of less than 10,000 in population. Public bodies, nonprofit corporations, and rizil Indian tribes that are unable to obtain credit from other sources at reasonable rates and terms are eligible for assistance. There is also a program for aid in emergency situations where a rural community has had a significant decline in quantity or quality of drinking water due to the occurrence of a natural disaster.

Rural Development has a very diverse mission area for the purpose of helping improve the quality of life of rural Texans.

More Funds Available for Weatherization

TXU Electric is more than doubling the amount of money the company has been spending on weatherization for its low-income customers here in Callahan County and in other counties they serve. Effective January 1, 2001, TXU will make \$5 million available for energy efficiency programs that give low income families the opportunity to receive valuable

weatherization services at no cost. The TXU boost came about Housing and Community Affairs do the work. This can include insulation and caulking as well as replacement of inefficient air conditioner, heating units and refrigerators at not cost. In some cases, the program can also cover repairs needed to complete the work; it would replace a window frame, for instance, if the existing frame had rotted and couldn't therefore hold weather-stripping.

People whose homes are



because of a legal challenge before the Public Utility Commission of Texas by Texas Legal Services Center and Texas Rose (Ratepayers' Organization to Save Energy). "Up until now the biggest drawback was that there wasn't enough money in the TXU program," said Randy Chapman, Executive Director of Texas Legal Services Center. "The additional funding makes this a good program."

The TXU money will be combined with government funds for a piggyback weatherization program under which local agencies under contract to the Texas Department of weatherized can expect a substantial drop in their utility bills, too. "Because of increased energy efficiency, people can expect a 30-50 percent decrease in their utility bills," said Carol Biedrzycki, Executive Director of Texas Rose. "The piggyback weatherization program is the most effective way to keep utility bills affordable for low income Texans."

PET TALK

If you can't teach an old dog new tricks, maybe you can teach him to file letters and deliver mail.

Some companies are allowing their employees to take their pets to work, a move designed to help worker morale and relieve stress. The idea is not a bad one at all, says a Texas A&M University animal behaviorist.

Dr. Bonnie Beaver, a professor in the College of Veterinary Medicine, believes the current trend may continue to grow, but it has to be monitored to be effective. While some employees may enjoy taking their pets to work and avoid a case of homesickness, for others it may mean getting sick, period.

"Some people are allergic to animal hair and having a dog roaming the office is not going to be their idea of a good day," says Beaver.

"The companies that allow pets at work need to set certain guidelines, foremost among them the well- being of their own employees. You have to consider common courtesy to one another. That

means the pets must be well mannered and be well-trained." Many of the companies that

allow pets at work are located in California, where trends often originate before spreading to the rest of the country.

Beaver says another consideration deals with the needs of the pet. Some may require frequent trips to go outdoors, and these interruptions could disrupt a business routine.

In addition, there's the competitive side: while businesses may be in a dog-eat-dog world, tensions can also build where pets are concerned.

"Dogs can go after each other and fights can occur," Beaver explains.

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Statewide transportation goals to be developed

ABILENE, Texas - Texas needs clear and specific transportation goals — covering such issues as congestion relief and safety objectives — to evaluate the effectiveness of mobility efforts across the state, John W. Johnson, Texas transportation commissioner, said today.

Such goals will help state and local officials make sure transportation users benefit the most as infrastructure decisions are made, according to Johnson.

"We need to do a better job of evaluating issues from the user's perspective," said Johnson. "That means we must measure our progress in ways that are meaningful and understandable to the users of the system."

Johnson today announced a work group — made up of elected officials, business leaders and transportation experts from around the state—to provide input to the Texas Transportation Commission on developing goals and priorities to tee, chaired by Sen. Florence Shapiro, have urged transportation commissioners to adopt useroriented goals, said Johnson.

"They pointed out that our planning process is so complex that it is difficult for citizens to assess how decisions are made and judge if they are appropriate," said Johnson. "Often, we are pleased because we have added a new lane to a highway, but the real issue is have we reduced congestion."

The work group will develop goals on such transportation issues as urban congestion, the time it takes to travel from city to city, safety and rural transportation needs.

"We need to set high, easily deinable statewide transportation standards and then work together to achieve those goals," said Johnson.

The establishment of transportation standards will compliment an ongoing effort by the Texas Department of Transportation to update the state transportation plan,
