
Cross Plains Volunteer Fire Department Fish Fry Deemed a Huge Success

Cottonwood Defeated Anson with Only Three Players in 1932 **District Basketball Shootout**

COTTONWOOD NEWS

It's absolutely true! According to Corneilus Elliot, who told the story, and Parker Coppinger, who played in the game and attested to Elliot's veracity. Both attended the 32nd annual meeting of the Cottonwood Historical Association on May 5.

The game was for the district championship, played in Anson, and talked about foul-play, the referees persistently awarded the Cottonwood players 27 fouls, removing five of the eight team members left to play for Cottonwood, the final four minutes were fast and furious, according to Elliot, as Parker Coppinger began shooting and making goals with both hands. District 4-H Judging Reported




