

Senior Class sponsors are Charlene Fleming, Roy Richey and Mike Cavender.



The Texas Coalition for Vehicle Choice (TX-CVC) is reminding parents and students to act responsibly and encourage safe and sober driving for graduation festivities. According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), in 1997, alcohol was involved in 38.6% of fatal crashes and that one alcohol-related fatality occurred every 31 minutes. Close to home, 49% of all crashes that occurred in Texas were alcohol-related.

The Coalition is calling for students, parents, and teachers to encourage and support safe driving efforts. Barcellona suggests these four simple messages to help make this years graduation safe, fun and memorable:

\*Keep it alcohol-free. Sponsors of graduation parties should ensure that no alcohol is served to minors, and take extra steps to guard against alcohol being brought in.

\* Don't drink and drive. Three in every ten Americans will be involved in an alcohol-related crash at some time in their lives. Positive peer pressure can discourage alcohol-impaired persons from driving. Refuse a ride from anyone who has been drinking. Party sponsors/parents can also help by providing "nohassle" free rides home.


\*No sleepy drivers. Make proper arrangements if a party is expected to let out late. Parents need to let teens know that it's okay to call home or some other responsible party if they are too tired to drive.

\*Always wear your safety belt. Even if you are a sober and alert driver, others on the road may not be. A safety belt is your best protection in an automobile crash, and a good defense against drunk drivers- not only graduation night but each time you travel by car.

## Number of Texans at risk for blindness expected to grow

AUSTIN-Vision care professionals fear an aging population and an increase in the number of people with diabetes will lead to more cases of blindness. According to the Texas Commission for the Blind, an estimated 1,000 Texans needlessly lose their sight each year because of glaucoma and diabetic eye disease.

Most alarming is the number of cases of diabetes in Texas, which has exploded in recent years. There are now more than 1.6 million Texans with diabetes, increasing the chances that more people will suffer permanent vision loss since diabetes raises the risk of developing diagnose glaucoma or diabetic eye disease before sight is impaired. Timely treatment can slow or even stop the progression and preserve sight.

Dr. Berger said certain factors increase the risks of developing vision-threatening diseases. The Texas Commission for the Blind has developed an "Eye-Q" test to help determine if a person is at risk: You are age 45 or older

You have diabetes You are African American and older than age 40

You are Hispanic You have high blood sugar You are than 20 percent over your ideal weight

## Keeping an Eye on Texas **Food Safety Tips**

As summer temperatures heat up in Texas, so do grills across the state. By following these simple tips, grilled food can be safe and healthy for everyone:

- Scrub the grill grate with a wire brush to loosen stuck-on food particles, then spray it with oven cleaner and rinse thoroughly.
- Thaw meat in the refrigerator or a cooler, not on the counter top or the picnic table.
- Grill hamburgers at 160 degrees Fahrenheit to ensure proper cooking.
- Prevent food cross-contamination by using clean dishes and utensils ime cooked and uncooked food is carried to and from the grill.

air out of your house when it's drying clothes. And for every cubic foot of air it blows out, a cubic foot of hot outside air gets sucked in that your air conditioner has to cool down. Run

your dryer late at night or early morning and you'll have lower electric bills. Even better, use a "solar powered" clothes dryer: a clothes line in the back yard!

2. Have your duct system tested for air leaks. Many think that windows and doors are the major cause of a home's energy wasting air leaks. But according to recent research by the Department of Energy (DOE), gaps, joints and disconnections in the typical home's duct system are much more significant. The DOE states that the typical duct system loses 25 percent to 40 percent of the energy put out by the central heat pump or air conditioner. Leaks are usually the biggest problem. Authorities recommend having a contractor seal them with a brushed on "mastic". Duct tape often dries out and fails. It turns out duct tape is great for many things, but sealing ducts isn't one of them!

3. Ask your air conditioning contractor to perform an Infiltrometer "blower door" test. The blower door is a computerized instrument originally invented by the Department of Energy. It pinpoints where your home's worst air leaks are, such as duct leaks, and also measure how leaky the overall house is. While most homes are still far too leaky, some are now quite tight, and need mechanical ventilation to ensure their air in-

need this done every month to ensure safe and efficient operation. Some such as electronic air cleaners need, to be thoroughly washed.

5. Have your air conditioner cleaned and tuned. A pre-season tune up is a great investment. It reduces the chances of breakdowns in the middle of summer and more than pays for itself through more energy efficient operation. Make sure the contractor cleans both the indoor and outdoor heat transfer coils, and check refrigerant gas charge by measuring "superheat" or "subcooling". 6. Consider replacing your old air conditioner or heat pump. Just like a car, central cooling equipment doesn't last forever. If your system is over 12 years old, and you are planning to stay in your home more than a few years, many authorities recommend replacing it before it fails permanently. A new system improves comfort, is more dependable, creates less air pollution and pays for itself through energy savings. New units are up to twice are energy efficient. Choose one with an EPA "Energy Star" label.

'It doesn't have to be that way said Dr. Brian Berger, M.D., medical consultant for the Texas Commission for the Blind. "The problem is that too many people put off getting regular eye examinations which can detect the diseases in their early stages."

Blindness caused by glaucoma and diabetic retinopathy can literally sneak up on a person, health experts say. There is usually no pain, no symptoms and seldom any noticeable changes in vision, until it's too late.

To raise awareness about the problem, May has been designated National Sight Saving Month. Free vision screenings in cooperation with Prevent Blindness Texas are being held in communities across the state.

"Vision loss from these diseases is usually permanent," said Dr. Berger. "But regular eye examinations can catch diabetic eye disease and glaucoma before they do their damage.".

Because these diseases often produce no symptoms, regular checkups in which the pupils of the eyes are dilated are the best way to

"If you can answer 'yes' to more than four of these items, I urge you to discuss this test with an eye care professional," said Dr. Berger.

Texans who lack health insurance to cover medically-necessary treatment to preserve their sight can benefit from a recently-implemented program called the Blindness Education, Screening and Treatment Program (BEST).

"The BEST program is designed for Texans who need vision- related medical treatment to save their sight, but who cannot afford it," said Ron Lucey, Consumer Resources Coordinator for the Texas Commission for the Blind. "It's supported by a voluntary contribution of one dollar every time a Texas resident applies for a new or renewed driver's license."

I don't always know what to call dinner. The French and Italian have a good system, so I often take my cue from them. 
