Chamber of Commerce recognizes health care agencies, says good-bye to Steve Mack family and hears a volunteer speaker who knows what he talks about.

Calling for volunteers, and more volunteers, Robert Echols, of Albany, issued a clarion call for small communities in Texas to wake up and make themselves great by helping each other.

Speaking to the assembled members, business executives, dignitaries and other guests who attend the Cross Plains Chamber of Commerce Annual

Banquet on July 19, Echols indicated that small towns were the backbone of America and could all be economically strong and viable places to live by working together and by acting as partners rather than competitors.

The keywords for action, said Echols, are volunteers, partnerships and communication. Indicating that local government officials and professionals can't do it all, he said, volunteers are the answer if small com-

munities are to come to life and build quality-of-life environments that make rural America strong. Volunteerism is the secret of small town vitality and livelihood.

Robert Echols knows what he talks about when he speaks of volunteering. He has recently returned from his own triumphant visit to Washington, D.C. where he received one of the nation's coveted 47 Thomas Jefferson Volunteer Awards of 2001.

Echols is General Manager for the Best of the West Motels, a chain of 10 motels and serves as President of the Texas Forts Trail Board of Directors. He also serves as a member of other regional organizations and community theater projects. In all these positions he racks up countless hours of volunteer work.

The Youth Rally will be held August 8, 9 and 10 in the downtown





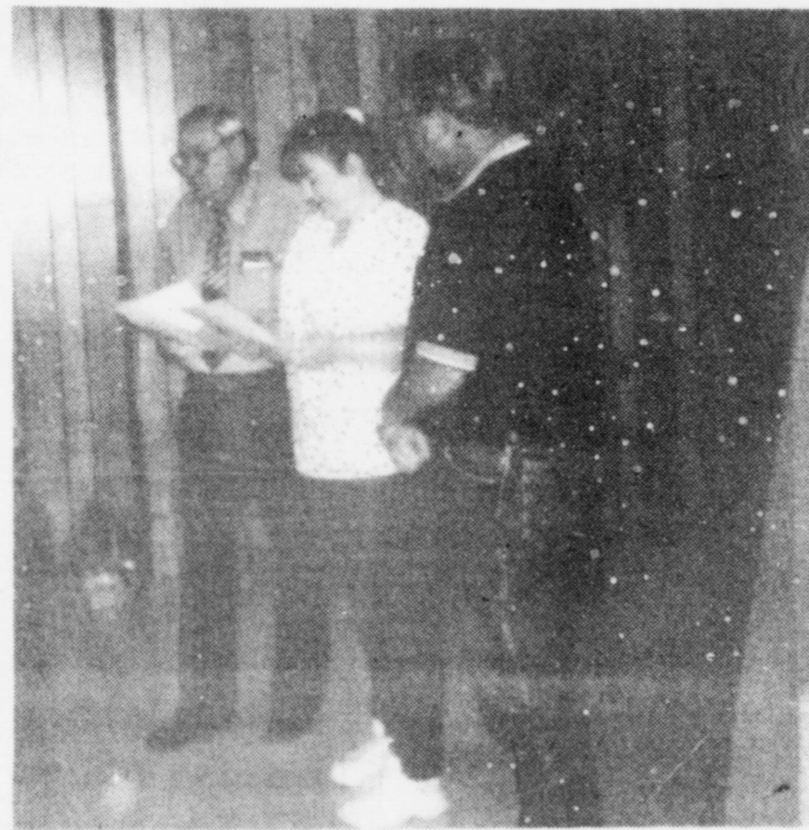
