a new ambulance. The Commissioners took the action Monday, November 26 during the Commissioners' Court regular monthly meeting held at the Commissioners'

Courtroom at the Callahan

County Courthouse in Baird. Bob Pipes, with the Cross Plains EMS met with the Commissioners' Court to discuss the increase in the County's yearly subsidy to the ambulance service which serves the southeast portion of Callahan County.

On a motion by County Judge Roger Corn and second by Commissioner Charlie Grider, Commissioners voted 5-0 to increase the Cross Plains EMS donation an additional \$1,000 to \$3,000 for the year.

According to Judge Corn, the City of Cross Plains has contributed \$10,000 to the purchase of a new ambulance for the Cross Plains EMS. Judge Corn said the EMS service has also received a bid to purchase the old ambulance with the funds to go toward the new ambulance. The Cross Plains EMS has also held several fund-raisers to purchase a new ambulance. The Cross Plains EMS has also received a \$30,000 matching grant from the Texas Department of Health to pay for the new \$80,000 ambulance.

A pot full of rice smoldered on the stove. The charred pan looked like it would have to be tossed, or cleaned up enough to recycle as a feed scoop for my farm critters.

article I wrote about ten years ago. A young homemaker in town was known for her stash of view and wrote a feature for the newspaper.

She maintained that cotton, plastic, salt, soda, water, aspirin, and vinegar are the most useful substances on earth. She opened cupboard doors all around the house and pulled out vinegar bottles, all open and partially empty. There were so many, they could have been lined up by notes to tap out musical tunes. Sarah posed for a picture, surrounded by her vinegar jugs and jars, while she told me how she used so much vinegar.

Struggles with a stubborn case of lice was the start of it all. A neighbor told her to use white vinegar on her daughter's scalp. Sarah said she got flak every time she mentioned it, but kept the Health Department literature on hand 'as proof. It confirmed that white vinegar is a certified method of dealing with the creepy crawlers. Lice need the body heat of the scalp to mature and survive. While it doesn't kill them, the acidic nature of vinegar makes the hair slippery, the nits can't cling and simply slide down the hair shaft.

Sarah noticed me scratching itchy, vinegar is also great for soothing the skin, and good for vinegar for soaking out swelling

Housewives soured milk for baking with a tablespoon or two of vinegar in fresh milk and a short interval to set. Aside from salad dressing and barbecue sauce, vinegar makes a delicious vinegar pie, removes catsup stains, polishes brass, retards rust, dust and grease, and kills grass. It adds sparkle and shine to fixtures, counters and chrome. With a little vinegar, you can chase away excess suds and pesky ants, keep cut flowers fresh, or deter mold.

Sarah used it in her laundry rinse water to remove soap residue, saying it almost acts like a water softener, even helping to keep drain pipes clean. She scrubbed calcium deposits around her faucets with a toothbrush dipped in vinegar. She flushed out her sink drains pouring soda into the drain and following with a few chugs of vinegar. It bubbles and froths and churns away greasy buildup.

In her curiosity, Sarah read that vinegar has been around for thousands of years. It can be made from almost anything (honey, potatoes, grain, whey, coconut, to name a few) and is the next step in the fermentation process after it has become wine. Used medicinally from Hippocrates to the Civil War and World War I, household applicaing. It has an infinite shelf life, and is essentially sodium free.

Doubtful that even the magic of vinegar could rescue my burnt pot, I soaked it overnight in a little water with vinegar. Next morning it was nearly as easy to clean as wiping out a coated pan. I guess I'll have to find something else to scoop grain for the goats.

Appraisal District building to receive **\$83,221 in repairs**

Callahan County Commissioners voted to approve over \$80,000 in repairs and improvements to the old Callahan County Hospital building just west of the Callahan County Courthouse in Baird.

The County Commissioners, during a regular Commissioners' Court meeting Monday, November 26 at the County Courthouse in Baird, voted 5-0 to approve authorizing County Judge Roger Corn to sign the necessary agreement with the Callahan County Appraisal District to make the necessary repairs and improvements. The motion was made by Commissioner Harold Hicks and seconded by Commissioner Charlie Grider to make the necessary repairs.

The old Callahan County Hospital building, which is still owned by Callahan County. currently houses the Callahan County Appraisal District and the Texas Department of Human Services offices.

Judge Corn said the improvements to the building will include a new roof using a duralast material, new air/conditioning system in both halves of the building, new windows, new doors and another coat of paint outside the building. The project is estimated to cost \$83,221.58. Contractors for the roof include Mira Roofing, Miller Air Conditioning will install the new A/C system, Lange will install the new windows and doors to the building and All-American Paint will be painting the building.

Callahan Co. Appraisal District appraiser Bun Barry said 29 new energy efficient windows will be installed on the Department of Human Services building and another 24 on the appraisal district, or west side of the building. "It should save in

the long run on utilities," Barry said of the new energy efficient windows and air conditioning

Both the north and south entrances will include new doors. Barry said a push button automatic door will be installed on the south public entrance to accommodate the handi-

Barry said the problem with the roof was discovered after some equipment at the Department of Human Services sustained some water damage.

Judge Corn said Callahan County Appraisal District will pay for 48 percent of the total construction cost \$39,918.35, while the Texas Department of Human Services will pay 52 percent or \$43,223.23 of the total project

The Peoples State Bank in Clyde will provide a loan to make the improvements and repairs to the building for up to 10 years. Barry said Peoples State Bank responded in a positive manner to the monetary difficulties faced by the appraisal district and Department of Human Services.

Barry said the Department of Human Services has renegotiated the building lease to include a monetary payout for the repairs over a term of 10 years.

Barry also said the appraisal district's taxing entities were informed that major repairs were needed to the building and the appraisal district board of directors has put additional monies into the budget to pay for the needed renovations.

The appraisal district official said the bank loan arrangements should be completed over the next two weeks and that renovations will begin after





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
