





My mother's parents lived in Cross Plains and my dad's parents lived in Baird. We traveled by train when we came for a visit from Fort Worth. We'd visit in Baird for two or three days and then ride to Cross Plains with relatives and visit there two or three days. 

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

Texas Lottery Sales In Callahan County Increase

han County rose 3.7 percent, according to Texas Lottery Commissioner totals released for the 2000-2001 fiscal year.

Lottery sales totals in Callahan County are calculated from August 31, 2000 until September 2001.

Lottery sales in Callahan County totalled \$2,021,988, up \$73,839 from the 1999-2000 total of \$1,948,149. The 2000-2001 total was only the second time lottery sales reached over \$2 million in the County. The total, however, was over \$650,000 lower than the \$2,693,328 reported in lottery sales in the 1997-1998 fiscal

According to lottery sales totals, the six lottery sales retailers in Clyde sell 65 percent or 6.5 out of every lottery ticket in Callahan County. Cross Plains sells one out of four lottery sales tickets or 21 percent of the County's total. Baird's two lot- from the County's number three tery retailers sell one lottery retailer in lottery tickets to the ticket out of every seven tickets number five retailer with or 14 percent of the County's \$179,959 in 2001.

Thrifty's Food Mart, located at I-20 and Cherry Lane in Clyde, was the top lottery retail seller in Clyde, jumping over Howle's Kountry Store to regain the top spot. Thrifty's had \$381,224 in lottery sales in 2001, while Howle's had \$373,074 in total lottery sales in 2001. Thrifty's Food Mart has been the number one seller of lottery tickets for five out of the past six years.

Howle's Kountry Store, located at 105 South First Street West, fell from the number one lottery ticket retailer to number two with total sales of \$373,047

Lakeway Grocery Store, located at 114 South Main Street in Cross Plains, took over the number three position in the County and number one spot in Cross Plains with lottery sales of \$247,718 in 2001. Skinny's, located at Ave. F & Fourth Street in Cross Plains, dropped

Skinny's, located at 1-20 and Cherry Lane in Clyde, jumped from the number five lottery seller to number four with 2001 sales of \$228,292.

West-T-Go, with an address of 1033 Cherry in Baird, maintained the number six spot with total Texas Lottery sales of \$150,265 in 2001.

Allsup's, located at I-20 and Coleman Highway in Baird, was again the County's number seven lottery sales retailer with total sales of \$134,671 in 2001.

Tally's, located at 1060 FM 603 in Clyde, took over the number eight position in Callahan County with total lottery sales of \$117,035

Allsup's at Cherry Lane and I-20 in Clyde, dropped one position in the County for lottery sales from number eight to number nine. Allsup's had lottery sales of \$110,840 in 2001. Lawrence Brothers IGA, located at I-20 and Cherry Lane in Clyde, maintained the number ten lottery retailer in Callahan County with total 2001 sales of


