FUEL SUPPLY IS RAPIDLY DIMINISHING

French Transatlantic Plane Struggling in Head Winds

NEW YORK, June 14.—The French monoplane, Yellow Bird, her gasoline supply rapidly dwindling, was nearing the coast of Portugal this afternoon.

At 12:10 p. m. EST, the Yellow Bird had been gone 27 hours from Old Orchard, Me., where it started on a flight to Paris at 9:10 a. m. EST, yesterday.

At 11:30 a. m. EST, the French wireless station at Bordeaux intercepted a message from a steamer which relayed a message from the Yellow Bird, then half-way between the Azores and Portugal.

The Yellow Bird was struggling against headwinds, the message said, and Jean Assolant, the pilot.

was worried about the rapidly dwindling supply of fuel.

The tenor of the message indicated that the Yellow Bird would be unable to reach Paris. It appeared most likely that, if the plane made land, it would head for Lisbon and come down on the air field there.

Even if they miss their goal in Paris, however, the three French fliers (and possibly a stowaway who was reported on the plane) will have succeeded in flying across the Atlantic, making the sixth non-stop crossing from west to east in a heavier-than-air machine.

While the big French liner was fighting the winds off Portugal, the tenth anniversary of the first Atlantic flight—by Azevedo and Brown—was being celebrated in London.

Lisbon has an excellent air field near the city, where the fliers could come down.

With approximately 500 miles to go, if the fuel holds out, the Yellow Bird should reach Lisbon at about 4:30 p. m. EST, or a little later.

Testimony Introduced to Show Robison Helped Raise Orphan Children Besides 4 of His Own

AUSTIN, June 14.—Testimony that State Land Commissioner Robison took orphan children to help raise at various times in addition to caring for his own four children got before the house of representatives this morning in spite of objections. There have been 18 such children.

It was ruled that any detailed testimony along this line must be limited to persons to whom it is charged Commissioner Robison issued funds.

Dr. J. M. Robison of Houston, a son, is one of these. Bobby Robison, an orphan raised by the commissioner, was named as another.

Robison's counsel brought out a statement from J. D. Hedrick, receiving clerk of the land office that the commissioner refused to accept any return of the refunds the reappraisal expense charges until reappraisements had been completed.

R. B. Allen, Sr., house counsel, contested the accuracy of Hedrick's understanding that no personal checks were drawn on the refund account until after it was returnable to the owners.

"The checks will be the best evidence," Allen said.

H. A. Turner, cashier of the Texas Bank & Trust company where the "J. T. Robison special" account was kept was the second witness.

Turner's testimony was similar to that given at the hearing of the joint legislative committee of the regular session.

Prospects of a delay in the hearing this afternoon existed, as the house was expected to go into extended discussion of the entertainment of the wife of a negro congressman at the white house.

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\$1,137 APPLIED FOR BY CISCO PUBLIC SCHOOL

County Superintendent Believes Tuition Law Is Aid

A total of \$4,619 for tuition will be asked of the state by the schools of Eastland county to cover the tuition of the closing year, according to information received today from the county superintendent's office.

The present law provides for the state to pay any pupils' tuition in any high school or other public school to which he transfers in Texas if he has finished the highest grade of the school in the district in which he resides and if the district to which he transfers does not have sufficient tuition funds to pay his tuition. In the opinion of Miss Beulah Speer, county superintendent, this law is an invaluable aid in promoting educational interest in the rural school pupil, giving him the desire to finish an accredited high school.

The schools which are asking for this tuition money, and the amount by each, is listed here: Cisco, \$1,137; Okra, \$190; Ranger, \$189; Desdemona, \$45; Scranton, \$645; Rising Star, \$295; Strawn, \$45; Gorman, \$845; Carbon, \$495; Nimrod, \$90; Eastland, \$632. Total, \$4,619.

DO THAN LAST OF SCHOOLS TO CLOSE.

The last of the schools of Eastland county to close for the session of 1928-29 is Dothan, which has closed its scholastic work this week and which will hold a commencement program tonight. It is one of the 33 rural schools in the county.

Grammar school graduation exercises and presentation of certificates to graduates of the eighth and ninth grades will be conducted tonight. Judge W. P. Leslie, associate justice of the 11th district court of civil appeals at Eastland will deliver a general educational address. Miss Beulah Speer, Eastland county superintendent, will present the diplomas and certificates.

The Dothan faculty is Mrs. E. L. Hazelwood, principal; Mrs. Robert Sims, and Miss Pearl Donovan. The school term is eight months.

People of Texas "Congratulated" on Entertainment at the White House

AUSTIN, June 14.—A resolution congratulating the people of Texas who voted for President Hoover "upon the elaborate and brilliant entertainment graciously extended by the mistress of the white house" has been sent to the desk of Speaker W. S. Barron to be presented to the house this afternoon.

To it is attached a newspaper clipping telling of the inclusion of the wife of a negro congressman at a white house tea.

Mrs. Laura Burleson Negley, daughter of former Postmaster General Negley, is among the members who signed the resolution with Representative Carl Rountree of Lamesa. A similar resolution was offered in the Texas senate just before noon adjournment. It had not been disposed of at recess.

Senator Mergie Neal expressed regret at the occurrence at the white house and said she favored its condemnation. She said she preferred a direct condemnation rather than the resolution in its satiric form.

Mrs. Helen Moore of Texas City, other woman member of the house with Mrs. Negley, also signed the resolution. She said she had begun preparation of a resolution on the topic herself when the Rountree was presented to her.

STATEMENT EXPLAINS ENTERTAINMENT.

WASHINGTON, June 14.—A statement was issued at the white house last night in connection with the entertainment at tea by Mrs. Hoover of Mrs. Oscar De Priest, wife of the negro representative from Illinois. It said: "All the wives and families of all members of the senate and house of representatives have been invited to call at the white house at series of teas to be given by Mrs. Hoover. No names whatsoever have been omitted from the official list."

UNFORTUNATE, SAYS LOVE.

AUSTIN, June 14.—Mrs. Hoover's entertainment of a negro congressman's wife was "unfortunate," State Senator Tom Love, leader of the Hoover-Democrats in Texas said this morning. "I am glad that Al Smith Democrats did not succeed in electing a negro congressman from my former state of Missouri as they tried to do for then there would have been two to invite instead of one," Love said.

Hastening to Altar Thing of the Past

Impetuous couples on the road to Hymen's altar will now travel over a three-day period of time before being permitted to enter into the state of conjugal relations in the commonwealth of Texas, since the new marriage law became effective yesterday. The first couple to file notice of intention to marry in Eastland county under the new law is Fred Adeock and Miss Onda Buckler of Gustine, Texas. Their notice was filed yesterday.

W. L. Stephen Here on Brief Visit

W. L. Stephens, formerly cashier of the Cisco Banking company until his resignation a short while ago to take more active charge of his personal business, was back in Cisco a few hours today. Mr. Stephens owns hardware stores in Albany and Caddo. He said that the latter town is quite active now with the recent revival of oil development.

NEW ATTACK IS MADE ON FEE SYSTEM

Some Officials Getting \$25,000 Annually Say Charges

AUSTIN, June 14.—Some district attorneys and tax officials in Texas are receiving as much as \$25,000 a year in salary and fees, it was charged in the Texas senate this morning.

Most of the amount comes from fees for collecting delinquent taxes, it was stated. "If your county has an official who has sworn to uphold the law and discharge his duties and will stand back unless he gets these fees, it would be a God-send to get rid of that kind of an official," said Senator Clint Small of Wellington. "Duty can be performed various ways," answered Senator J. W. Stevenson of Victoria. "I want it performed with zeal."

Senator Walter Woodward joined the attack on officials drawing big fees. "Delinquent tax collection," he said, is the simplest duty a district attorney has. I can take any boy over 17 with average intelligence and he can do the work. There are printed forms for every step. All he has to do is fill in the names, amount of tax and the years for which it is due. County commissioners courts could hire an attorney for \$2,500 a year and do all such work for a county."

After an hour's attack on the present fee system of paying officials, the senate voted to print Senator Pink Parrish's bill which would limit any official to \$10,000. The bill had previously been reported unfavorably by a senate committee.

HOFFER NO. 1 GRAY BROUGHT IN YESTERDAY

Now Good for Five Barrels Each 4 Hours Natural

A new oil territory has been opened up about 6 and one-half miles northeast of Cisco with the bringing in of the Hoffer Oil company-Texas company No. 1 well on the Gray lease yesterday. The well was setting 5-inch casing today preparatory to completing.

Production now is rated at about 5 barrels each four hours. About 300,000 feet of gas accompany the oil which is flowing naturally.

The Eastland Lake sand was topped at 3,446 feet and drilled to 3,451. At that stage the hole rapidly filled with oil and later began making heads. The well has been drilled about two months. It is located half a mile west of the Hoffer-Thomas-Hittson No. 1 which was drilled several years ago and which produced, after a shot, for about 30 days.

Storage is being built on the lease. The test is located on a tract of 160 acres, pooled.

CONCERT AND CARNIVAL AT LAKE POPULAR

In the water carnival Forbes Wallace, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. Wallace, and Miss Dorothy McDonald carried off the honors.

Forbes won the 100 yard swim dash and the half mile swim. Miss McDonald won the 100 yard girls dash and the egg and spoon race. The "Walking the Greasy Pole" stunt proved more popular than any other feature because of the humor it provided. Three \$1 bills were placed on the end of the pole which was laid over the water.

Those entering the contest were required to walk this pole, which was copiously greased. A sudden ducking was the portion of all of them though one man, who had worked his way to near the end of the pole, made a sudden dive in falling and jerked off a part of the prize.

Somebody ought to get credit for the way the Yankees are sticking in the race without Babe Ruth, Bob Meusel, Mark Koenig and Herb Pennock and there's not much need of going any farther than the little Cincinnati lawyer.

When a great baseball machine begins to crumble, history records that it can't be put back together a moment's notice.

It certainly looked like the beginning of the end for the world champions along in May, but almost overnight Huggins got the Yankees on their feet, even in the face of bad breaks.

2-Man Team—There always has been a suspicion that the Yankees were only led as Ruth and Gehrig. Ruth, ten out of the game two weeks ago, and Gehrig is hitting poorer than at any time since he won his stars as a major league star.

But the Yankees keep rolling along on the heels of the Athletics waiting for Connie Mack's highly-reputed machine to crack under its terrific pace.

When Ruth and Meusel were laid low by illness, Huggins courageously benched Koenig and injected three reserves in the Yankees' lineup on June 1. In addition, Dickey, who played in only 10 games last season, was doing practically all of the catching and short stop was far from a settled problem.

Keeping Pace—Yet the Yankees have kept pace with the Athletics during June and gained ground on the other contenders. They have won nine out of their last 12 games and improved their percentage from .536 to .624 and their standing from third place to second place. Their position, however, in regard to the Athletics remains the same—8 games behind—as Philadelphia has won eight of its last 10 games.

The stellar playing of young Sam Byrd in Ruth's place, the work of Gene Robertson at third, Bill Dickey's splendid catching and the unexpected form of Ed Wells, rookie southpaw, have stood out in the comeback of the world's champions. Byrd is hitting .340 and Robertson .320. Wells has won two of his last three starts. Dickey is catching like a veteran and hitting above .300.





Attractive Cisco Homes

The home of Mr. and Mrs. Alex Spears, 400 G avenue, is the southern type characteristic of the colonial period. A two-story, square house with tall columns on either side of the entrance, an open sun-porch on the south, and a vine-covered porte-cochere on the north, is well set back in a broad yard shaded by immense post oak and pecan trees. Climbing rose bushes and maderia vines frame the doorway and almost reach the petunia-filled window boxes on the second story. The curbed flower beds at the front, containing birdal wreath, canna, and chrysanthemums extend to the porch trellised with rose, on the south. Between the porch columns are boxes of geraniums, wandering jew, and petunias with pots of sword-fern and hanging baskets of jew and maiden-hair fern forming a charming background for the wicker chairs and porch-swing. A row of nasturtiums incloses chrysanthemums, petunias, daisies, and a strawberry vine in a square bed beyond the porch. On the north side, beds of zinnias border the drive and encircle the pecan trees in the parking. A blanket of ivy covers the chimney and the porte-cochere to mingle with a maderia vine, which growing from the rear, climbs to meet it. In the back yard, a huge dunn-berry tree bends over the rear entrance to form an ideal place for the child's swing or playhouse and opens the way for the orchard of peach trees beyond.
