Williamson Dam Shadows Site of Ancient Indian Community

By W. H. KITTRELL, Jr. Archaeologists and students of rival West Texas colleges have recently announced discoveries of the relics of prehistoric Indian villages in their respective trade territories. After waiting quietly for further announcements from similar West Texas institutions, Cisco, the home of Randolph college, is pleased to offer for the inspection of a waiting world the site of an historic Indian metropolis under the very shadow of the Big The Cisco entry in the ar-

chaeological sweepstakes has artifacts and everything, just like its West Texas rivals, sides a number of relics that the McMurry and Texas Tech finds did not have, for the tin cans, broken bottles and discarded casings of the Ford-Volstead age are mingled indiscriminately with the arrow heads and pottery of the Comanche and Kiowas. This proves the superiority of the Cisco locale over the deserted and barren wastes that held the secrets of the under-privileged aborigines who inhabited the windswept plains further west, for the same attractions that made the sulphur spring four miles north of Cisco the capitol of an Indian paradise are as pleasing to the white man as they were to his predeces-

Lying in a pleasant valley rimmed by stone studded hills, a little over a mile downstream from the canyon now spanned by the mighty Williamson Dam, this location was known far and wide among the nomadic Indian tribes as the most desirable spot in all the far reaches of West Texas, and many were the bloody battles fought for the possession of It

Hole, just below the sulphur spring, has never been known to go dry. Tall pecan trees bore heavy yields in the fertile soils, plum thickets and algerita berries flourished, and game of every sort was abundant. Red and yellow ochre, so soft and pure that it may be used to mark on paper, provided the pigment necessary for war paints and tribal decorations, and an outcrop of flint supplied the materials for munitions of war. The sulphur spring was an ideal setting for the medicine man, and to his lodge by its healing waters the tribesmen brought their sick.

The spring is in a slight ravine, and just above it, at the foot of a hill where the signal fires were lit, there was a level clearing where the Indians set up their tepees. In this favored spot now stands the com-fortable ranch home of the Winston brothers, and a little beyond it is the log house erected by Aaron Robinson nearly 50 years ago. A half century of civilization has served to crase much of the surface evidence of the Indian occupation, but the generations of Red Men who so long dwelt there left the debris that tells the archaeologist this history and the measure of their civilization. The rains of the centuries have brought down from the hills above a covering of soil for the site of the village, while erosion has taken a lesser toll from its level surface. In the edges of the defiles that encroach upon it are frequently found pieces of pottery and pieces of flint, and occasionally well formed arrow and spear heads are revealed. Last week a former Ciscoan who had once lived on the place found several arrow heads in a casual search of an hour or so. All of them were found in a few

yards of the spring, and the

foot of a little knoll where the arrow makers are said to have plied their trade.

The popularity of this place with the Indians is well established. For some years after the Robinsons had settled there parties of friendly Indians would come and ask permission to drink of the spring, and to camp a while where their ancestors had lived so long. The elder Indians would tell of the past glories of the place that was once the Mecca of all the Comanches, and sigh to see its the hand of the white man.

The settlers saw no reason to regret the change for fertile fields replaced the grassy meadows that the Indian loved; fruit trees and vineyards had been planted, and in the place of the wickiup there was solid log houses of the owners, and cabins of the negroes they brought with them from East Texas. Game was still plentiful. Deer and wild turkey provided meat for the larder, and bear and panther gave zest to the hunt.

Within recent years oil development has enhanced the desirability of this particular piece of land. Names of the men who escaped probably will not be available until mid-afternoon or later. Prison Record Clerk Benton at Huntsville said about 500 men are kept on Clemens farm. He did not, how ever, have a list of the men kept on Camp No. 3.
