HOUSTON, Sept. 27.—Sun Oil's No. 48-Mitchell in the northeast portion of the south Liberty field has been completed at 3,530 feet, flowing 1,000 barrels pipe line oil.

The A. & P. Production company's No. 3-Whitehead at Pierce Junction was brought in Wednesday with an initial flow of 800 barrels at 4,540 feet.

At Hill, the Republic Production company's No. 109-Dolbear is good for 300 barrels.

WICHITA, Kans., Sept. 27.—Aladdin Petroleum corporation Wednesday drilled in the second producing well in the Bruce pool of western Butler county. Tank-egg is being moved in and the well will be tested as soon as possible. Wilcox sand was hit at 2,093 feet and 1,000 feet of oil rise in the hole. The well is estimated at 140 to 150 barrels.

TULSA, Okla., Sept. 27.—Interest of the oil industry shifted here Thursday following the consummation of two big oil deals entailing the expenditure of \$2,100,000.

The Wallace Cully lease in north Allen area and 5,000 acres of scattered undeveloped leases in the Oklahoma City district were purchased by the Sun Oil corporation.




