FEAPOT INDICTMENT CASES HELD ILLEGAL

FALL, DOHENY, SINCLAIR AND DOHENY JR UPHELD BY COURT.

U. S. TO TAKE AN APPEAL

Action Taken Because of Presence in Grand Jury Room of United States Attorney.

Washington.-The Government has suffered a severe setback in its case against Albert B. Fall, Harry F. Sinclair and E. L. Doheny & Son. The criminal indictments charging them with bribery and conspiracy in connection with the Teapot Dome and California oil leases have been declared illegal by Justice McCoy in the District of Columbia Supreme Court on a technicality.

The court held that the indictments were illegal because Oliver E. Pagan, a special assistant to the Attorney General, who was assisting the special Government counsel, was present in the grand jury room when witnesses were testifying. The two Government counsel, Atlee Pomerene and Owen Roberts, also were in the room, but they were there as counsel. The presence of Pagan as their assistant made the proceedings invalid, the court held. This has the effect of wiping the slate clean so far as the criminal indictments are concerned unless the Government can have the court overruled on an appeal which will be taken.

If the court is upheld the Government counsel will bring new indictments on conspiracy charges and continue to fight the case. Advices from Atlee Pomerene, one of the special counsel, said he is not at all discouraged, and that the ruling is purely a technical point. An immediate appeal will be taken and failing to overturn Justice Mc-Coy, new indictments will be brought. The case has no connection whatever with the civil cases to break the Teapot Dome lease which is now pending in court at Chevenne, Wyo. That action is not affected in any way by bribery and conspiracy charges here.

The four indictments quashed

Albert B. Fall with accepting a brige from E. L. Doheny; Doheny with giving a bribe to Fall; Fall and Doheny with conspiracy to defraud the Government in leasing the California oil reserves; Fall and Harry F. Sinclair with canspiracy to defraud the Government in leasing the Teapot Dome reserve.

Members of Sinclair's legal staff suggested that the three-year statute of limitations might prevent resurrecion of the bribery charges if the court is upheld on appeal. However, there is a six-year statute of limitations on conspiracies to defraud the Government and two of the indict ments might be brought anew.

Flared Skirt and Marked Waistline

The outstanding themes of the later exhibitions, writes a Paris fashion correspondent in the New York Herald-Tribune, were the flared skirt, a marked waistline and the molded bodice, and, although many salons omitted one and even two of these ideas, at least one of blouses, while the latter invariably the triumvirate appeared in each collection-and obviously only one is necessary to terminate the tubular silhouette. Brief summaries of the final Paris openings are appended.

It would be patently stretching a point to describe the Callot showing as one which emphasized all of the spring vidualistic assortment of frocks which departures. The collection was so large that it naturally included most of the new themes, but none of these was made a significant feature. The skirt is short and it often terminates in a hemline flare as a result of an added flounce. The waistline is not particularly in evidence, except in several period models which exploit a slightly lower than normal line. Molded lines are generally adhered to, except, of course, in some bouffant formal gowns. The lavish ornamentation which has become the custom in Paris robes du soir this season is again sponsored by Callot, who uses lace and embroidery in her interpretations. Ensembles and tailleurs occupy prominent places in this collection, a significant trimming on the former being the lace or chiffon jabot. The outstanding color note is light except where dual color combinations are employed.

Lanvin's Ideas for Spring.

Jeanne Lanvin has never been noted for a strict conformity to the tenets of the mode, and her present collection wanders as far afield as ever. There is added width to the skirt, achieved principally through the circular cut and through plaited effects, but there is little evidence of molded lines or a distinctly marked waist. The jumper sports frock, always typically Lanvin, remains one of the noteworthy features of this collection, the new models comprising a long jumper and a plaited skirt. In many instances woolen capes accompany sweater-jumpers. Sports hosiery frequently matches the color of the accompanying frock or suit. The tailored suit appears usually in gray mixtures and shows a preference for the short jacket. Bouffant period effects are developed in taffeta and trimmed with ribbons after the traditional robe de style manner of Lanvin. Printed crepes, foulards, taffetas, chiffons and satins are employed by this mentals. Blurred prints, effected by house, the outstanding colors being red, blue and a shade which is a blending of green and yellow. Painted designs appear on several daytime frocks.

The Inner Circle

By REV. J. R. SCHAFFER Superintendent of Men, Moody Bible Institute, Chicago.

TEXT-And when James, Cephas, and ohn who seemed to be pillars.—Gal.

More than twenty-five years ago, Robert E. Speer opened the student conference at Northfield with a stirring message

on "The Inner Circle." It made a deep impression on some young men gathered there, and resulted in their unswerving devotion to Christ through all the years since. In it he pointed out that there are degrees

of discipleship among Christians. Some remain always on the outer edge -they are the border-line folks. Others cross the Jordan and dwell in the land. A few are not satisfied anywhere but in the City of the King. They want to be near the palace and

the throne, nothing less than the best. Think of the multitudes that followed Jesus. There are at least twelve different references to the great crowds and throngs that were drawn together by the uniqueness and mystery of Christ's ministry. Out of these thousands. He chose only seventy, who were sent out two by two into the cities and towns of Israel. Besides these, He chose twelve to be His companions, who were trained to carry on His work after He had gone. Then, among these twelve, we find an Inner Circle of three, who entered into experiences and privileges which the others did not share. Three outstand ing events in the life of Jesus are participated in by these three disciples. The raising of Jairus' daughter, the transfiguration of Christ, and the tragic sorrow of Gethsemane.

A question always arises in the consideration of this inner circle-did Jesus love these three more than the others? Was He partial to them? Why were they selected out of the twelve for these experiences?

First-They Wanted to Be Close to Christ.

Desire was to them the spring of activity. The character of these men, their temperament, their personality suggest that one thing alone motived them-a heart passion for Christ. They were men of deep emotions, lofty ambitions, fiery enthusiasm, strong determinings. They were the kind of men, who, if they set their heart or anything, were pretty sure to get it. From the very first they loved Christ with undivided passion. They gave their whole lives to this one thing-devotion to Him. Is it any wonder, then, that they found this place of special privilege? Certainly Christ is available to all, and we can have as much of Him as we purpose to have. The Apostle Paul would have been in that inner circle had he come in contact with Christ earlier, for the great passion of His heart was "For me to live is Christ." None needs to be shut out, who wills to be included.

Second-They Were Willing to Pay

the Price. It costs something to belong to the inner circle. Leadership and privilege cost something in every realm of life: these come only as rewards of devotion, sacrifice, and unremitting effort. It is just as true in business, profession, science, politics, every realm as in the apostolic college, the best costs the most. "They while their companions slept were upward toiling in the night" has always been true of those who attained the summit. It cost something to brave ridicule in entering the death chamber; to climb the steep ascent of snowcapped Hermon, to face the uncertainty with Jesus in the garden, but they paid the price. The reason why the inner circle is not larger today after 1900 years is because disciples are not willing to pay the price. Recently a student spent three years preparing a thesis of 30,000 words, on the subject "The Color of the Migrating Pigment in a Crayfish's Eye." Comparing this with the time that is spent in getting acquainted with Christ through His word, or in the secret place of prayer, or laying His claims upon the hearts of men, we can easily understand why we are shut out from the inner circle. It takes time to be holy, it costs the legitimate pleasures of the world, it demands the sacrifice of good things to attain the best.

Third-They Expected Rich Compen-

These men did not know what experiences lay before them, but they were willing to take a chance. They believed in Christ and were confident that if they followed Him with deathless devotion they would be rewarded. Surely they were. Any price they paid to attend the funeral was compensated in the resurrection they witnessed; any toil that had been expended to climb the mountain top was compensated by the sight of the dazzling glory of Jesus, and the sound of the Father's voice breaking the silence. The peril of Gethsemane was compensated in hearing Jesus pray.

It is still true for those who will follow all the way; experiences await them that cannot be related, that no others can share.

Are you in the Inner Circle?
Have you heard the Master's call?
Have you given your heart to Jesus!
Is He now yours, all in all?





> Austin. Texas .- J. K. Baker of Coleman and E. A. Berry of Houston have been appointed members of the Commission of Appeals to aid the Court of Criminal Appeals in catching up with its docket, under the act of the last Legislature. They assume their duties at once and receive \$6,500 per annum, the same pay as members of the court. The appointments are for two years.

Mr. Baker is a well-known lawyer of his section and Judge Berry long Lemur is like himself. Mr. Owl, of has been in the practice of law. He now is chairman of the State Democratic Executive Committee and at one time was Assistant Attorney of Criminal Appeals.

The appointment of Messrs. Baker and Berry further complicates the contest over the Dallas district judgeship, created under recent enactment. It was believed for a while that W. W. 




