A trait of west Texas is that it goes into whatever it undertakes with a whole-heartedness that sometimes carries it to the extreme. Even the weather seems to have adopted that characteristic. Since Saturday morning an inch and building one-half of rain has fallen in Cisco. Last week-end more than three inches fell and the preceding week-end an inch fell. That makes five and one-half inches of moisture over a period of little more than two weeks.

Fall crops in this section have no lack of water now. Stock tanks and other reservoirs have been replenished. TIME TO BUILD.

There never was a better time than now to do that bit of building or repair work that has been contemplated for so long but postponed because of a fear of depression. If money is needed it can be easily obtained. Building and loan associations stand ready to supply it at fair rates. Labor is cheaper now than it has been or is likely to be once conditions

Speaking of credits, a member of the Retail Merchants association recently said that he is carrying the accounts of numbers of people who are amply able to pay but who were neglecting their bills to pile up cash reserves against hard, and it is not much fun being a times. There is no better way to precipitate hard times than that. Keeping money out of circulation is the primary cause of the depression of which we have been complaining. The stock market panic of 1929 with its attendant losses of millions turned the spending and buying public from one extreme to another. They adopted a hoarding attitude, stunned with the quickness with which their money was swallowed up in the fluctuations of stocks, determined to keep it under their thumbs. The trouble was that they mistook speculation for investment. The odds are always against the gambler. They are on the side of the investor. Values are supported from beneath.
