BUTLER TRIAL IS CANCELLED BY NAVY DEPT

Reprimand Administered by Secretary of Navy Adams

WASHINGTON, Feb. 9. -The Butler-Mussolini incident apparentwas a closed chapter today with all the figures concerned declining further enlightenment on the abrupt ending of the internationally famous

The general court-martial of Major General Smediley D. Butler scheduled to begin next Monday in Philadelphia was called off with dramatic suddenness last night by Secretary of Navy Adams. At the same time Adams, who instituted the preceedings after Butler's Philadelphia speech concerning Premier Mussolini of Italy, made public the text of a reprimand administered to the veteran marine officer.

Adams gave as the basis of his action a letter from Butler in which the general stated he "greatly regrets the incident and the fact that my indiscreet remarks have caused mbarrassment to the government.



LEGISLATURE New President CONSIDERING DIVORCEMENT Precendent Cited in **Disjointing of Pack**ing Industry

AUSTIN, Feb. 9 .- The oil industry will be broken into four branches if plans before the Texas legislature prove successful.

Rep. R. J. Long of Wichita Falls said the proposed program as he understands it calls for an act prohibiting the same persons engaging in oil production, oil piping, refining and marketing.

A precedent is set for the di-vorcement legislation by a bill already before the house providing that the same or interlocking managements cannot control competing rail and motor lines. Divorcement of the packers from allied industries is cited as another precedent for the proposed plan.

Tom Cranfill, Dallas, president of the Independent Oil Men's association, was here today for a conference with other oil men. He declined to say what plans are in mind. The bill, however, has been knocked out to Long and other legislators.

Graves of Georgetown, the house of representatives today sus-tained the action of its committee killing the bill to repeal the search and seizure act. Boney at the First Presbyterian church Sunday morning centered his thoughts around the "Jezebelian Heresy in Thyatira," and said in substance: "The woman sheltered by this church, and for which the church was censured was not a low-brow; was not physically given to shame. Her ostensible freedom from moral turpitude was what rendered her so dangerous to the church-respectable people do not take tramps or reprobates for their patterns. 
