Four Bodies Recovered from Horse Show Stable Fire

MORE VICTIMS ARE EXPECTED TO BE FOUND

Sixty Thoroughbreds Valued at \$400,000 Also Perish

OAKLAND, Calif., Feb. 9.—Four men, possibly more, and 60 horses, valued at more than \$400,000, were burned to death early today when a fire razed the ramshackle old wooden stables used to house entries of the Oakland horse show.

Four human bodies have been recovered and firemen believed at least three more bodies would be found in that part of the ruins not sufficiently cooled to explore.

More victims are expected to be found. The bodies of the Oakland horse show were destroyed by fire early today with loss of three lives and an undetermined number of horses.

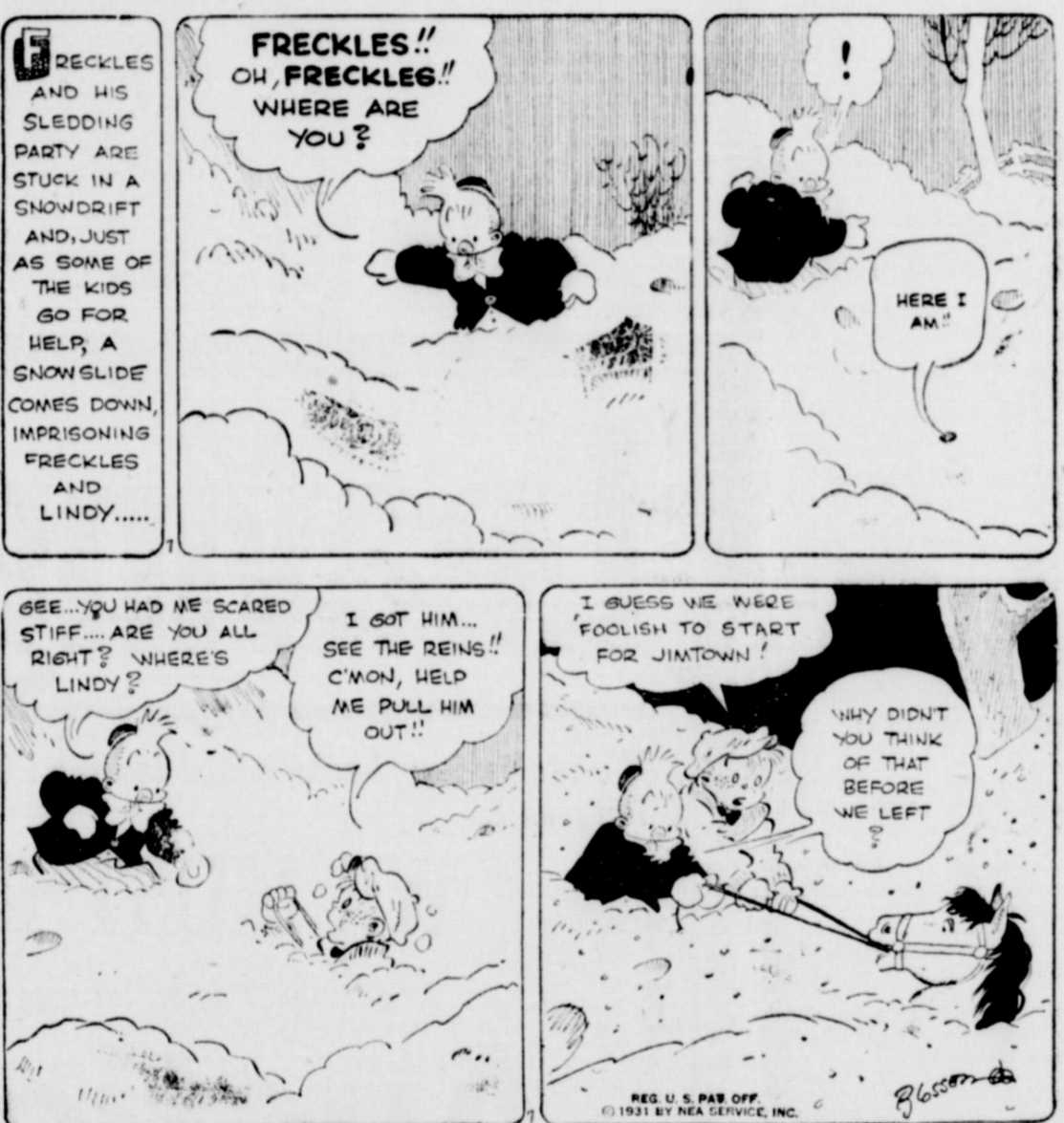

PONIES MEET LONGHORNS AT AUSTIN TUES.

DALLAS, Feb. 9.—With more than half of their current schedule ahead of them the pupils of Coach J. W. St. Clair, head mentor of basketball at Southern Methodist University, are bowing their necks in determination to bring to their school a Southwest conference championship. They have won four games out of as many starts against conference rivals, all on their home court, and will journey to Austin next Tuesday night to meet the Longhorns in their first tilt away from home. Four other conference battles that they will fight against the odds of being in the enemies

territory will be against the Baylor Bears at Waco, Texas, A. & M. at College Station, Rice at Houston and T. C. U. at Fort Worth. Three other games, one with the Aggies and two with Arkansas are to be played on the home court. The guarding of Capt. Skeeters and McLaughlin has done much for the Mustangs in getting them off to a flying start in the conference race. In these two men Coach St. Clair has the best combination of defensive men in the entire southwest. Not only has their defensive work keep their opponents from scoring, but their floor work has enabled Williams, Reynolds and Johnson to chalk several counters. The fact that Williams and Reynolds are leading the conference in scoring honors is evidence of the support they receive from their guards. If the Mustangs can finish the season with as much fight and ability as they have displayed so far this season, they should not lose more than two games, which will be sufficient to bring to them their first Southwest conference basketball championship.

PERENNIAL CHAMPS



If the Horned Frogs fail to finish at the head of the Southwest conference this year, it will be the first time in three years that Wendell "Doc" Sumner and Buster Brannon have not played with champions. Sumner and Brannon were team-mates with the Athens Hornets when they won the state and national high school basketball championships in 1929. Last year both were members of the T. C. U. freshmen team that won the industrial league championship of Fort Worth and the Southern A. A. U. championship, playing under the colors of Senepps Aces. Brannon, in 1926, was a member of the Pine Bluff, Arkansas, team that won the state championship and went to the semi-finals in the national meet at Chicago. Sumner, as a sophomore, has won a place in the Frog starting line-up as forward. Brannon has started but one game for the Christians, but has played in each one and may start against the Bears at Baylor Saturday night.

"JEZEBELIAN HERESY" THEME OF MINISTER

The Rev. Bruce C. Boney at the First Presbyterian church Sunday morning centered his thoughts around the "Jezebelian Heresy in Thyatira" and said in substance: "The woman sheltered by this church, and for which the church was censured was not a low-brave; was not physically given to shame. Her ostensible freedom from moral turpitude was what rendered her so dangerous to the church—respectable people do not take traps or reprobrates for their patterns. Like Jezebel of Old Testament notoriety, she was more like a brilliant Phoenician princess, intelligent, attractive, able even to influence 'my servants' from right to what she made appear right, and altogether a desirable acquisition for the church. But when we search for the fault of Jezebel in the Old Testament, we find that in her subtlety, she did not even suggest to Ahab the abolition of Jehovah worship, but persuaded him to apotheosize Astarte and Baal, or institute a heterogeneous worship for the northern tribes. To the destruction of herself, 70 sons of Ahab, her 400 votaries, or priests of Baal, and the Ten Lost tribes of Israel, this anomaly or religion was wrought out. The warning against a repetition of this in Thyatira was the burden of the message of God to that church. The preacher said 'When religion lowers its standards it brings shame upon itself, and endangers the souls of its membership.' Preceding the sermon Ruling Elder, E. P. Crawford gave a report of the fifth annual convention of the men of the Presbyterian church of Texas. Mr. Crawford, who was accompanied by F. D. Pierce and Rev. B. C. Boney, said that the assembly was for all Presbyterian men in Texas, regardless of north and south denominational boundary lines, and declared that it was evident that those present—representing both U. S. (South), and U. S. A. (North) were for union. Speakers of national reputation were heard: D. T. W. Currie of Texas, and Dr. H. T. Kerr of Pennsylvania, moderators of their respective general assemblies, were among the speakers, as were President John H. Burma of T. N. Y.
