"LAWS AMERICANS MUST OBEY"

An exchange in a very fascinating article recites a story of the "laws Americans must obey." They run into many thousands and each year the nation, the states and county and city governments add new statutes to a long list. A summary shows that a total of 1524 new laws was enacted by the 71st congress. These new statutes brought the total of federal laws enacted during the present century at about 25,000. It is estimated that more than 50,000 federal laws have been placed on the books since the first congress assembled in 1789. Most of these were private measures but there are about 10,000 federal laws in existence which must be obeyed by all citizens.

State and city and county laws must also be complied with. They bring the total of laws enforced throughout the United States to an appalling number, variously estimated at between two million and ten million. Michael J. Hickey, secretary of the national industrial council, found that 17,015 new laws were approved in 43 states in 1927; that in 1928, when only nine state legislatures convened, 2908 laws were added; and that in 1929, with the number of legislatures in session again reaching 43, 16,921 laws were enacted. A record kept of the number of bills submitted in the New York state legislature between 1915 and 1930, inclusive, show that 68,192 were introduced during that period and 12,121 passed. A famous justice of the supreme court of the United States is quoted as having returned this verdict, "The United States is the greatest law factory the world has ever known."

Are Americans law mad? Thomas Jefferson contended that "a people the least governed are the best governed." If so, men and women who call themselves Jeffersonian democrats, in recent years, have forsaken his advice and are among the maddest of the mad.

BIG SLUMP IN WORLD SHIP BUILDING.

Now it is known that although merchant ship building is being carried on in smaller volume than at any time in the last four years, the United States is holding its own. Since the first of the year ship construction throughout the world has fallen off more than 325,000 gross tons, two-thirds of the decrease being accounted for in Great Britain and Ireland. In Germany the decrease is more than 30,000 tons. As for the United States, construction dropped only 1027 tons and France gained almost 60,000 tons.

There is a National Pecan Marketing association in annual convention at Jackson, Miss. This association is composed of approximately 2700 pecan growers in Mississippi, Florida, Georgia, Alabama, South Carolina, Louisiana, Arkansas, Texas and Oklahoma. H. G. Lucas of Brownwood was re-elected president. It is a non-profit cooperative organization and its board of directors the governing body of the organization, is composed of representatives of the body. It was organized in Jackson last fall with H. G. Lucas of Texas as president. Jackson is the permanent meeting place of the association. A reminder that the pecan is a fast growing industry and that Texas pecan is in demand in the markets of the world.

A BOOST FOR DAIRYING

The drought and depression of the past year have put a lot of folks to thinking more intelligently than they ever did before. For one thing, it has stopped indiscriminate spending to some extent, and bank reports show more money in their savings departments than for some time. One Missouri banker who has authority for the statement that wages earned are saving part of their wages than ever before, as his bank books will attest.

But now comes a report from Pulaski, Ark., that should be of especial interest to farmers. The county agent, J. W. Sargent, says that while one-fourth of the farmers of that county required drought relief assistance, and were rationed out feed, food and clothing, and furnished seed and fertilizer, not a single dairy farmer in the county is listed as asking for help.

He gives figures to show that while the 1930 cotton crop of the county brought \$900,000, the dairy products brought \$1,600,000. Not

considered in these figures are the milk, butter and cheese consumed in farm homes and sold on the Little Rock market. He adds that with these figures the dairy products easily totaled two million dollars. Just completing a survey of 150 dairy farms of the county, Mr. Sargent says these men have averaged \$540 each month during the hardest year that the county has ever known, making a total sum of \$810,000.

That is a boost for dairying in a state where there is more cold weather than in Texas, and where dairy cattle have to be placed in the barn a goodly portion of the year.—Sherman Dem. crat.

Did You Ever Stop to Think?

Paul M. Pearson, governor of the Virgin Islands of the United States, says: That every man has an opportunity to work at the greatest art in the world and to become a great artist. A greater art than poetry, music, drawing, painting, sculpture, or architecture is the art of living with people. I would not underestimate the skill or spirit which catches, possesses, or creates beauty in these great art forms but by any measure the art of living with people requires greater and more varied qualities. The material with which one works is alive and reacts to every act. It is controlled by mind, will, emotion, prejudice and superstition. What skill, intelligence, patience, sympathy and spiritual powers are required in using such materials!

To get important results the artist who works with people must have great faith in them, expect great things of them. People tend to do what is expected of them. The artist must himself exemplify high ideals. As Emerson says: "If you would lift me up, you must be on a higher ground. If you would liberate me, you must be free." In working his ideals into the souls of those with whom he labors, the artist is like the musician on a lake whose melody is sweeter than he knows.

What courage must the artist have who works with people. Content to be misunderstood. "It takes a bolder front to step up to a man one knows and one's enemy and cooperate with him than it does to do a little simple, thoughtless outside thing like stepping up to him and knocking him down." Few of us have the taste, or talent, or opportunity to express ourselves through the art forms of poetry or painting or music, but there is no man so poor, so busy, so handicapped, but that he has the opportunity to express his best self through the most difficult, but the most supreme art, the fine art of living with people.

TEXAS CRUDE AVERAGE IN MARCH JUMPS

AUSTIN April 20. — Production of 730,888 barrels of petroleum per day during March caused an increase of 7.1 per cent over the daily average production during February, according to the Bureau of Business Research at The University of Texas. This figure was still 12.1 per cent below the daily average production during March of last year, however, and the production of an average of 693,125 barrels per day during the first three months of this year was 16.3 per cent below the daily average production for the first quarter of 1930.

Increases in daily average production were recorded in two of the seven regions of the state, the East Central Texas field continuing to climb in production rate, showing an increase of 115.9 per cent over the February daily average production and an increase of 428.9 per cent over the daily average production during March of last year.

Daily average production in the Panhandle amounted to 33,413 barrels during March, compared to 54,338 barrels in February and 90,210 during March of last year; in north Texas, 58,763 barrels, compared to

59,877 barrels in February and 970 in March, 1930; in West Central Texas, 25,288 barrels, compared to 24,425 barrels in February and 930 barrels in March, 1930; in Texas, 235,562 barrels, compared to 244,712 barrels in February and 336,310 barrels in March, 1930; East Central Texas, 134,562 barrels, compared to 62,525 barrels in February and 25,440 barrels in March, 1930; in Southwest Texas, 71,100 barrels, compared to 78,938 barrels in February and 63,110 barrels in March, 1930; and in Coastal Texas, 151,288 barrels, compared to 134,712 barrels in February and 184,570 barrels in March, 1930.

Daily average production throughout the United States amounted to 2,222,693 barrels during March, compared to 2,127,588 barrels during February and 2,538,520 barrels during March, 1930. Imports amounted to 235,152 barrels per day, compared to 259,178 barrels during February and 264,057 during March, 1930.
