Observations of 2 Travelers—

(Ed Note: Rev. R. E. Tatum, pastor of First Baptist Church and Mrs. Tatum returned this week from the Southern Baptist Convention held at Atlantic City, New Jersey, and has graciously submitted the following account of interest of the convention and side trips).

Leaving home we soon learned to appreciate more fully the State and the friendly surroundings we had left. On Friday, May 15, we made our way through Texas, Oklahoma and Missouri, and did not retire until we were several miles into Illinois. With only a little rain in Oklahoma and good roads all the way we were able to make over 700 miles of travel the first day. While going through Joplin, Missouri we saw the elaborate Metels of TV's Bob Cummings and Baseball's Mickey Mantle, and had our coffee break at the Mantle Restaurant.

Saturday's drive was uneventful and rather slow, but with perseverance we were able to travel over 500 miles, going through such cities as Indianapolis, and Columbus. As yet the Interstate highways around these large cities have not been built. We spent the night in Washington, Pennsylvania.

The Pennsylvania Turnpike is a beautiful drive, lined with mountains and trees, some of which were just beginning to display their spring leaves. In the approximately 300 miles we traveled on the turnpike we went through seven tunnels, the longest of which was nearly two miles, and the shortest a little less than a mile. We arrived at our destination and attended services at the First Baptist Church of Atlantic City.

The convention of Southern Baptists and that of the American Baptist Convention were held simultaneously. The voices of thousands of people singing praises to God is a joy to hear and have a part in. The speakers thrilled our hearts and sent us away with renewed zeal for the work of our Lord. At the close of the Conventions there was a joint meeting of seven Baptist groups of the North American continent, one of which was from Canada. There was one period of discussion by three leaders of each of the seven Baptist groups, emphasizing similarities and differences in the belief, operation and polity of their church and denominations.

After a hot drive to New York we welcomed the shade of the skyscrapers in the Manhattan section of New York City. As we approached the city we could see to the right the pale green symbol

Short Ballot Due In Second Primary

Saturday Opponents For County Judge

A short ballot will face local voters in Saturday's second Primary with only two contested races appearing.

Most prominent contest is that of County Judge, where the names of Herman Standifer and G. W. Hurley appear. The other race is that of Congressman-at-large.

Mr. Hurley is seeking election to the post that he has served the past nine months, having been appointed to the office following the death of the late Judge W. E. Gene Tate. Prior to being appointed county judge he had served as Commissioner of Precinct 1 for six years.

Mr. Standifer is seeking his first elective office. He is a resident of the Pottsville community.

Like the short ballot, a small turnout is expected at the polls, with many predictions being as low as 1500, county-wide. The vote, however, should reach the 2,000 mark. A contested race for Commissioner of Precinct 1 is expected to bring the total to the latter figure.

A second Republican Primary will also be held in Hamilton County. In the first primary, 11 votes were cast here, and election judge J. V. New is expecting about the same this Saturday. Balloting will take place in the building formerly occupied by the late Judge Barrow.

Eligibility of Voters
Contrary to some beliefs, a person who voted in the Democratic Primary is not eligible to switch and vote in the second Republican Primary, and vice versa. Only in the November general election may a person "split" a ticket. On that ballot names of both party candidates will appear and voters have a free choice as to whom they cast their ballot.

A. A. Brown will be election judge in the Democratic Primary, when polls will open at 8 a.m. and close at 7 p.m.

We were very sorry to learn of the untimely death of W. E. (Eddie) McNeill of Waco, who passed away at 3:55 Sunday afternoon, May 24 following a heart attack, the first he ever suffered. Eddie was born near Fairy to the late Mr. and Mrs. John McNeill in 1905. He was 56 years old. He moved to Waco with his parents when just a teenage youth. He had been employed as a cook at the Roosevelt and Rawleigh Hotels in Waco. He had been in bad health for several years.

Funeral services were held the following Tuesday, May 26 at 2 p.m. in Wilkerson-Hatch Chapel,

with Rev. R. C. Hallman officiating. Burial was in Rosemond Cemetery at Waco.

Survivors include three sisters, Mrs. Katherine Ayers of Kate Ross Homes, Mrs. Esther Crocker of 727 North Tenth, Waco and Mrs. Martha Burnett of Hico; also several nieces and nephews. He was preceded in death by his parents, three brothers, Henry, Johnnie and Noah, all of Waco, and three sisters, Mrs. May Broyles of Lanham, Mrs. Lizzie Goyne and Mrs. Ruchie Crist of Waco.

The McNeill family was close neighbors of the writer and our parents for a number of years,

Mrs. Burnett and Mrs. Goyne being girlhood friends of our, and our hearts go out in deepest sympathy to the family, especially to our dear friend, Mrs. Burnett, in the death of her last brother.

Last Saturday afternoon a very devastating hail and heavy rain passed through the upper Lanham community, some four to five miles south of Fairy. We first learned of the severe hail storm through Mr. and Mrs. Marvin Porterfield, who encountered the hail just west of the Leon River on Highway 22 while enroute to visit his father, Walter Porterfield at Hamilton. They turned around and drove back home as quickly as possible for fear of damage to their car. The streak of wind and hail was something like one mile wide. It passed through the south portion of the Justin Bullard place. He practically lost his maize crop, part or most of his grain and corn was badly damaged. However, their garden and fruit crop near the home was spared as the hail didn't quite reach across the field to the north.

Jess Fulton received heavy crop damage and also the roof of his home was heavily damaged. The Lawson field just south of the old Livingston place had been planted in cotton which was up and looking pretty before the hail. Not a stalk could be seen Sunday when we were in that area. The cotton had been covered up by soil or beat into the ground. Vegetable and flower gardens received severe damage. Most all house roofs in its path received some damage especially the composition shingle type.

In talking with Mrs. O. H. Brummett five miles east of Fairy Monday night she stated that they were also caught in the path of the storm and lost their garden and had heavy damage to their grain crop. She stated that Mr. Brummett was working down near the Frank Tyler home, and she had gone for him and was caught out in the storm and took shelter at the Tyler home. She stated the ground was covered with hail there. She received no car damage, but said she found the screens and windows at their home had been pretty badly dented by the

hail. We feel sure we will learn of a number of others in the path of the storm who received damage to their crops and gardens. Too bad this had to happen, since all had the best prospects we have had in years for a good crop and gardens. We sincerely hope those who were in its path find the damage not as severe as it seems at this time.

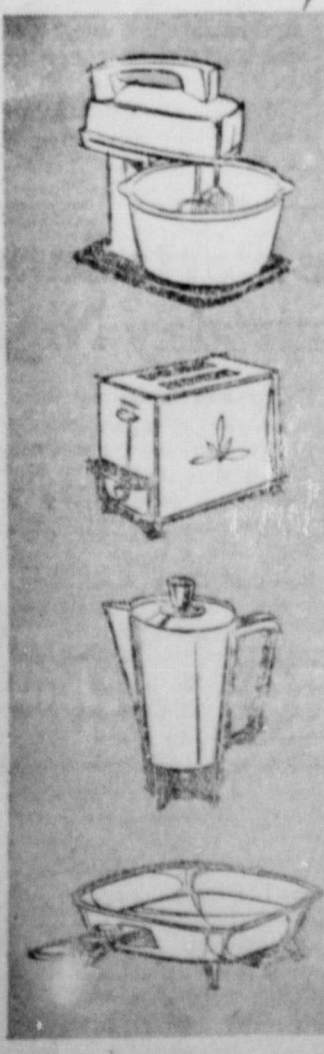

CLAIRETTE SAILOR BECOMES 'SHELLBACK'

USS Gridley (FHTNC)—Horace E. Williams, engineman second class, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Williams of Clairette, became a "Shellback" April 23 upon crossing the equator aboard the guided missile frigate USS Gridley, enroute to Adelaide, Australia. Becoming a "Shellback" is a traditional Naval ceremony held to initiate new members who are crossing the equator for the first time.

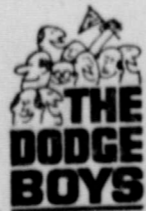

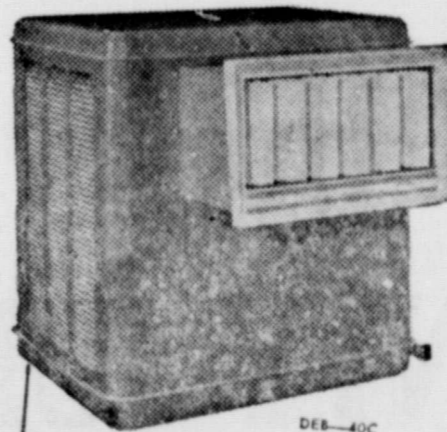

On the Home Range

Eat a good breakfast every day!

Breakfast should contain about one-third of the total daily food needs. Pattern for a good breakfast goes something like this: fruit, cereal, eggs, toast and beverages.

bread, and by preparing eggs in different ways.

Avoid a rush in the morning by getting the fruit or juice ready as far as possible at night when you finish in the kitchen. Use the "in-season" fruits such as cantaloupe and strawberries. Get the coffee and beverage ready to go.

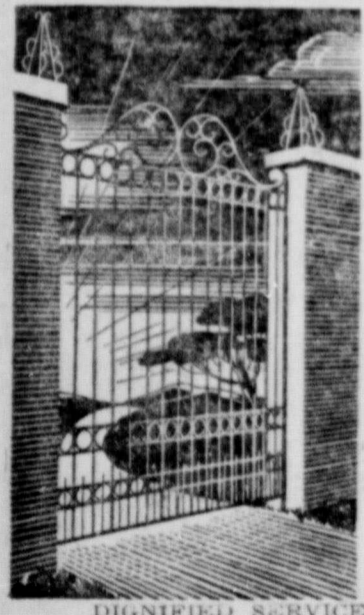

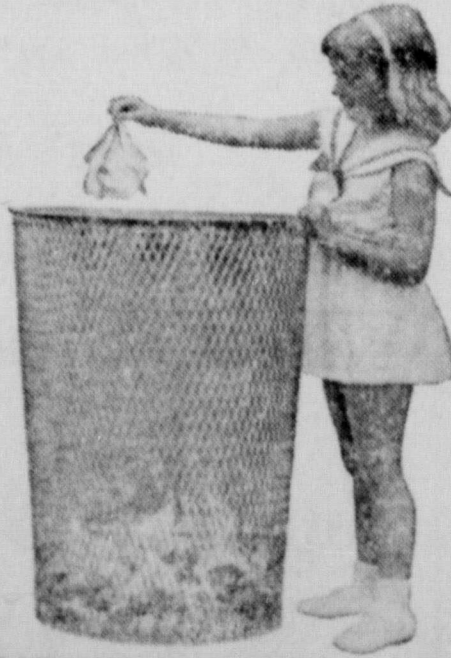

HAMILTON-CORYELL SCS News

By A. L. MILES

Long or short range forecasting of trends in agriculture is a hazardous business. However, the Statistical Reporting Service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture does this from time to time. Some of their projections are given below for your consideration and guidance. Quotations are from USDA Statistical Reporting Service for April 1964.

"Beef Cattle: Fed cattle prices this spring probably will increase in response to smaller supplies. Prices will probably improve in the second quarter. The increase is expected to be carried into the third quarter.

"Cotton: Mill consumption of cotton is expected to increase slightly this season and exports of cotton during the 1963-64 crop year are expected to total 1.8 million bales more than in the previous season. However, despite increased use and exports, carryovers of all kinds of cotton August 1, 1964, is expected to total nearly 13 million bales—the largest carryover since

the record high in 1956. "Beef imports will be smaller than in 1963. "Wool: U.S. Mills are expected to buy more domestic wools than foreign wools during the spring and summer this year because domestic wool prices have not increased as much as those of foreign countries.

"Wheat: Record exports during July-December substantially reduced stocks by January 1. And this high export level is expected to continue during the remainder of this year."

In addition to these short range projections Mr. George W. Kromer of the Economic Research Service made some observations on the agricultural outlook for the next five years. He stated that no one could foresee exactly what is going to happen to agricultural production and income five years from now. The five year outlook is conditioned on several assumptions. 1. Normal weather; 2. National economic growth of four percent per year; 3. Wheat program resulting from the 1963 referendum and 1963 programs for other commodities to continue through 1968; 4. No major wars or other international crisis; 5. Population growth to reach 206 million by 1968; 6. Consumers income or buying power to increase 15 percent; 7. Food for Peace exports to grow at the same rate.

After stating these assumptions the following projections were made:

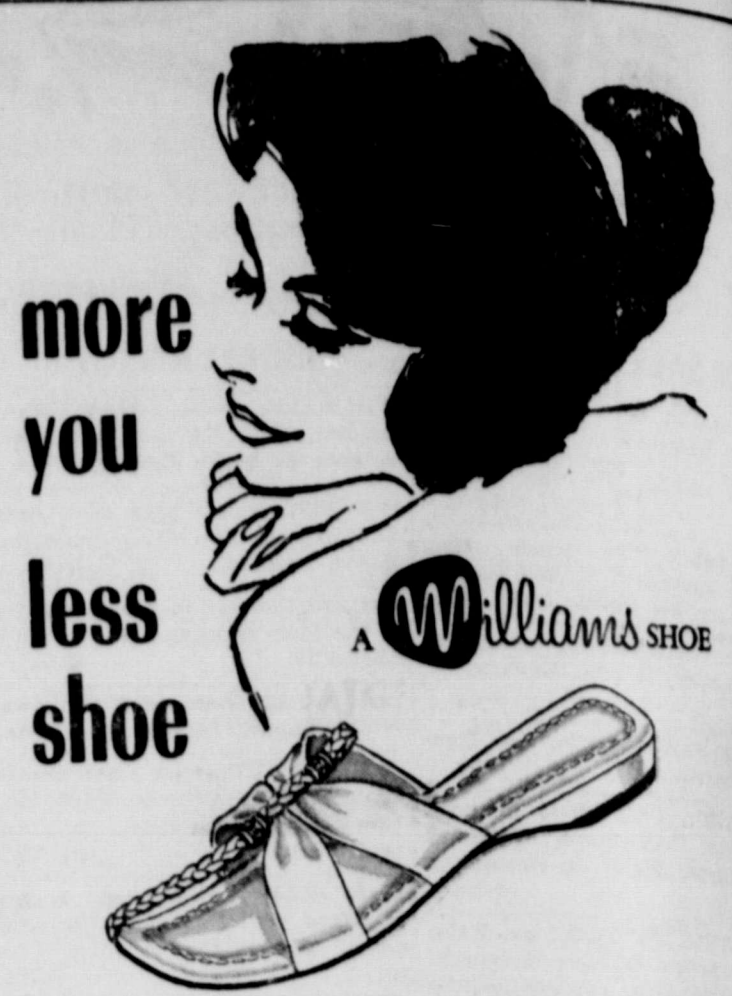
"The technical revolution, that caused agriculture's output in the 1950's to grow faster than domestic and foreign markets will continue, probably at a slower rate.

"Under the assumed conditions, farm output is projected 11 percent higher in 1968 than in 1963.

"These levels of production will provide the consumers with more meat and poultry than ever before. Retail prices are expected to rise only because the consumer demands more convenience foods.

"Larger quantities of farm products will be shipped overseas, probably seven to eight percent more than the record year 1963. "Gross farm income would be about eight percent larger in 1968. But farm production expenses would be larger too, leaving net farm income slightly less than in 1963."

These observations and projections are given the farmers and ranchers of the District for their study and consideration in making plans for future soil and water conservation programs on their land.
