**Business Strength Maintained**

Texas' 40-month business upswing is the longest of the postwar era (except for the Korean War period), according to the UT Bureau of Business Research.

While the business activity index slipped two percent in May, average for the first five months of 1964 is seven percent above the same period in 1963.

"It now seems reasonable to expect that before any adjustment occurs, Texas business will surpass even the 45-month rise of activity from October 1949 to July 1953," Bureau Director Dr. John R. Stockton predicted.

**Mental Health**

County Judge C. L. Abernethy of Plainview heads a statewide committee which is taking a long, hard look at what Texans are doing about mental health problems.

The 112-member citizens committee expects to have its report ready by August. But comments at meetings have indicated strongly that the committee will tell Texans that mental health work should begin in the local community.

Judge Abernethy said the old concept of isolating mental patients far from home is far less effective than treatment in their home towns.

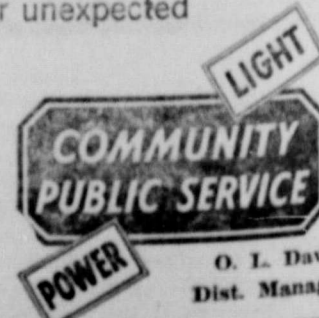

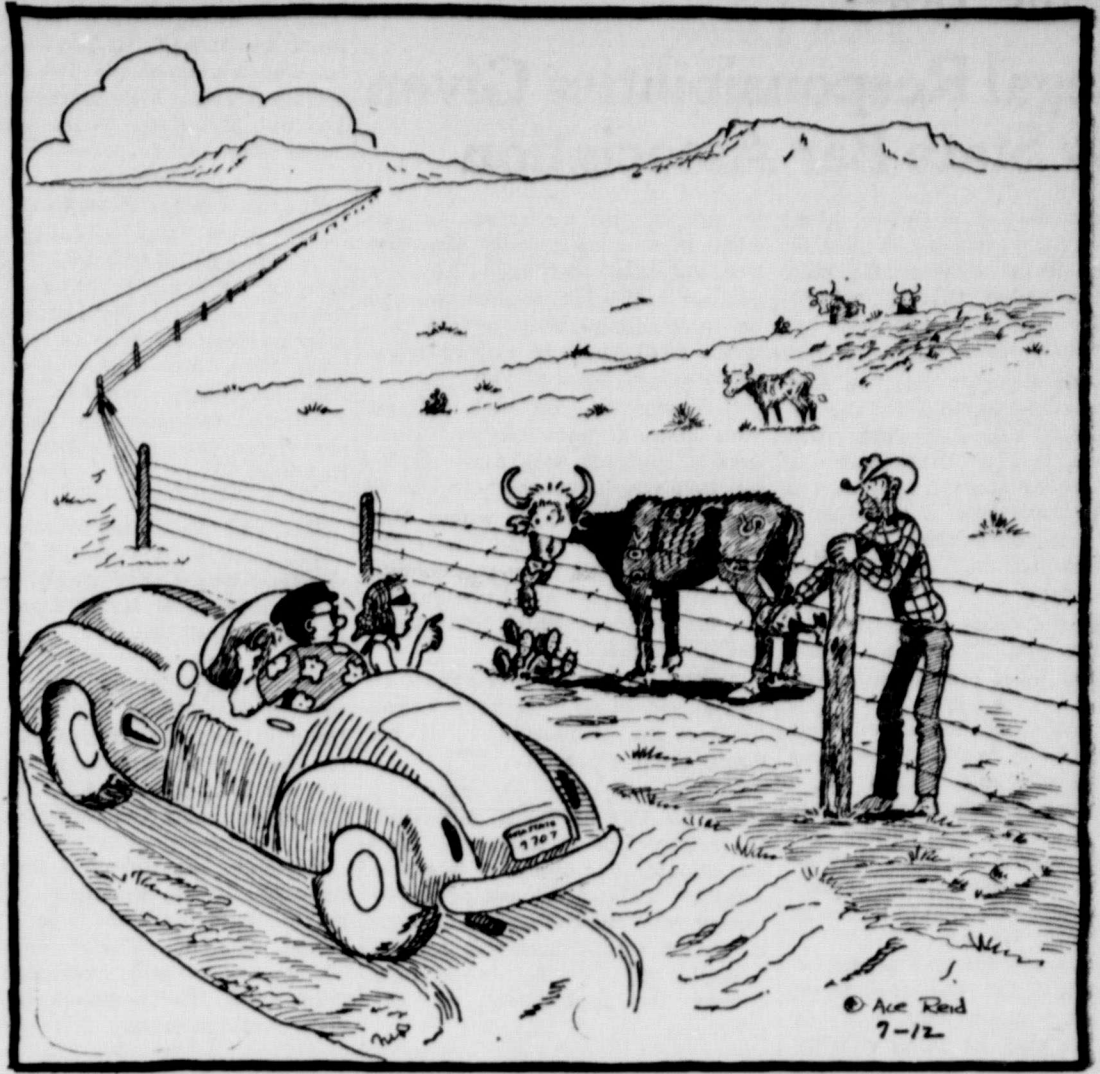

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

The Hico Civic Club closed out June Dairy Month with a dairy tour and barbecue. One of the purposes was to say "thank you" to some forty dairy families in the Hico area.

It was my privilege to attend the activities and visit with the businessmen and dairymen of the area.

There have been many changes in dairying in the last ten to 15 years. One dairyman at Hico told me that he had more money invested in his milk tank alone than

he had invested in his entire dairy equipment including the barn in 1950. Not many years ago dairymen thought their cows were doing good when they produced 8,000 pounds of milk per year. Today dairymen talk about having a herd average of 12,000 pounds production per cow.

There are several places over the county and some in Hamilton where live oak trees are dying. This is not something new. The disease is Live Oak Decline and was observed in central Texas in 1833.

Several people are concerned about losing the oak trees and have requested information on the disease. I wrote to our Extension Plant Pathologist for the latest information on the tree disease.

Leaves of the affected live oak may first be a yellowing followed by death of certain branches, or of the entire tree. In some cases the tree dies rather suddenly. More often the decline is very slow, taking one or more years and is first evidenced by a general thinning of the leaves and dieback of branches. This condition progresses until defoliation is complete and the tree is dead. Dark streaks are often observed in several affected limbs and

trunk specimens.

Two scientists studied the disease over an eight year period. They reported that the environment had little effect on the disease for the disease was observed to affect yard trees as well as forest trees, young as well as old trees, trees on both acid and alkaline soils, trees on a sandy and heavy clay soil, and trees on wet and dry soils.

As yet, no recommendations for control of like oak decline has been formulated. However, any tree which is properly fertilized, watered and pruned will probably have a better chance of surviving than neglected trees. Ned Chapman of Hamilton told me that he has had some success of controlling the disease by pruning.
